Proclamation – Pennsylvania 811 Safe Digging Month Perkasie Borough

WHEREAS, the month of April 2023 is recognized as "Pennsylvania 811 Safe Digging Month", and the initiative sponsored by Pennsylvania 811, a utility notification information center with over 50 years of continuous service to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and

WHEREAS, Pennsylvania 811 received over 1 million excavation notifications in 2022, and transmitted approximately 6.8 million notifications to their member facility owners and operators allowing essential utility and construction crews to provide vital underground services and repair of critical infrastructure to communities throughout Pennsylvania, and

WHEREAS, when contacting 811, at least three business days before digging, a homeowner or a contractor is connected to a unique service that notifies the appropriate underground utility operators in the municipality in which the work will be performed, and

WHEREAS, by notifying 811 of their intent to dig, the homeowner or contractor is knowingly helping to protect the underground utilities, themselves, the work crew, and their neighbors from any unsafe digging practices within their community, and

WHEREAS, upon receiving the notification from Pennsylvania 811, the facility owners and operators disperse to the said work site to mark the approximate location of their underground utility lines with flags, paint, or both, to establish an eighteen-inch tolerance zone of the outside wall or edge of their line or facility, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Perkasie Borough, in support of the Pennsylvania Underground Utility Line Protection Law, PA Act 287 of 1974, as amended, does hereby proclaim April 2023 as "Pennsylvania 811 Safe Digging Month", and encourages all Pennsylvanians to visit the Pennsylvania 811 website at www.pa1call.org for information about digging safely.

WHEREAS, by prior resolution, the Borough Council designated a handicapped parking space in the area of 116 South Fifth Street; and

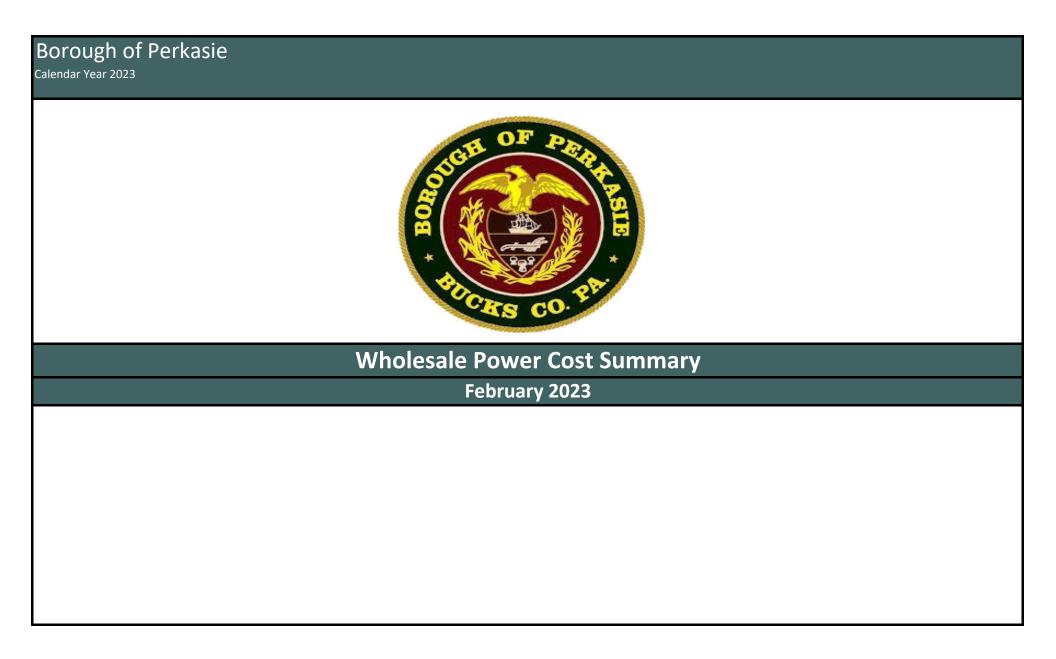
WHEREAS, Council has been informed that the resident on whose behalf the handicapped parking space was designated no longer resides in that area; and

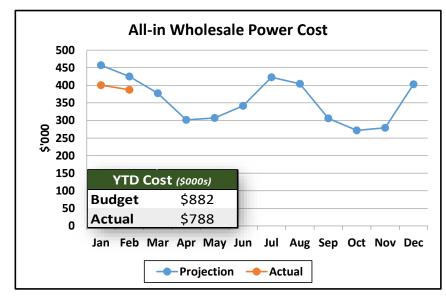


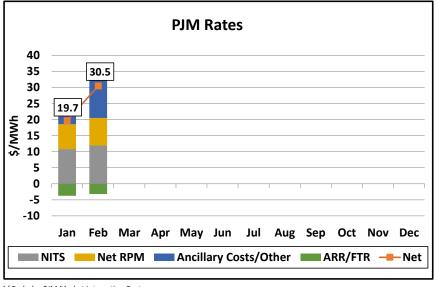


2023 Year to Date Wholesale Power Summary



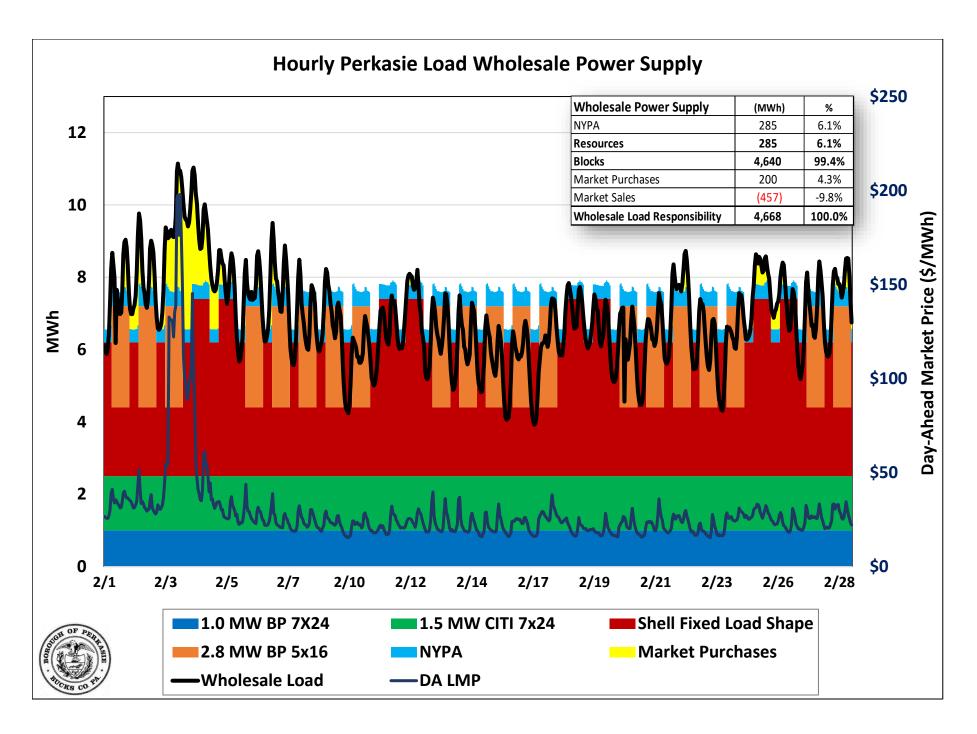

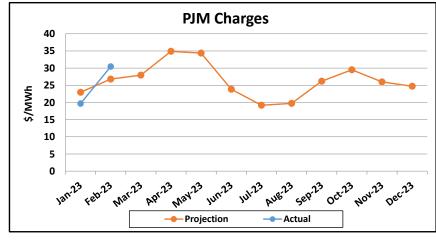

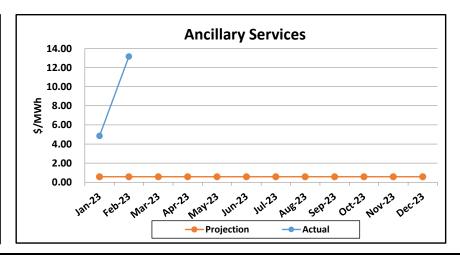

SUBJECT: Adoption of the International Property Maintenance Code 2018

For the last 30 years, Perkasie Borough has been using the BOCA National Property Maintenance Code/1993. I would like to start using the International Property Maintenance Code 2018 (IPMC). I have looked though both of these code versions, and the 2018 IPMC has more information in the way of definitions, along with a commentary section, which is helpful. No drastic changes have been made in the 2018 IPMC.

Attached to this memo is a draft ordinance that includes an updated "Modification of Standards" section. By adopting this ordinance, once a new version of the IPMC is released/printed, it will automatically adopt the new version, similar to what occurs when the Uniform Construction Code is updated.

At this time, I am requesting that Council authorize the Borough staff to start using the 2018 IPMC and that they proceed with adopting this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 135 TITLED "PROPERTY MAINTENANCE"

OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF PERKASIE INCORPORATING THE 2018

INTERNATIONAL PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE

The Borough of Perkasie hereby ordains as follows:

Section 1. §135-1. Adoption of standards by reference.

A certain document, copies of which are on file in the office of the Borough of Perkasie, being marked and designated as the "ICC International Property Maintenance Code First Edition, 2018", as published by the International Code Council. INC., be and is hereby adopted as the Existing Structures Code of the Borough of Perkasie in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; for the control of buildings and structures as herein provided; and each and all of the regulations, provisions, penalties, conditions and terms of said "ICC International Property Maintenance Code / 2018 are hereby referred to, adopted and made part hereof, as if fully set out in this chapter with the additions, insertions, deletions and changes, if any, prescribed in § 135-3 of this chapter.

Section 2. §135-3. Modification of standards.

The ICC International Property Maintenance Code/2018 is amended and revised in The following respects:

- A. Section PM 101.1(page1-1, fourth line): Insert "the Borough of Perkasie".
- B. Section PM 103.5 (page1-4, fourth line): Insert Appropriate Fee Schedule.
- C. Section PM 111.5 "Postponed hearing" shall be amended to read as follows:
 - Section PM 111.5 Postponed hearing: when a quorum of Borough Council is not present to hear an appeal, either the appellant or the appellant's representative shall have the right to request a postponement of the hearing.
- D. Section PM 112.4(page1-16, fifth line): Insert "one hundred dollars (\$100.00)" and "one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00)".
- E. Section PM 302.4 (page3-2 second line): Insert "twelve (12) inches".
- F. Section PM 304.14 (page 3-8 first line): Insert "May 1st and October 1st".

- G. Section PM 602.3 (page 6-2 fifth line): Insert "September 1st and May 1st".
- H. Section PM 602.4 (page6-3 third line): Insert "September 1st and May 1st".

Section 3. § 135-4

Nothing in this chapter or in the Property Maintenance Code hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding impending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed as cited in § 135-2 of this chapter, nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this chapter.

- <u>Section 4.</u> Any existing ordinance is hereby repealed to the extent that it is inconsistent with the terms of this amendment.
- **Section 5.** The International Property Maintenance Code, as amended from time to time, is hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference as the Property Maintenance code for Perkasie Borough, Bucks County, Pennsylvania.

Attached is a site drawing, cost estimate, required letter of match, and resolution needed for the DCNR grant application for Kulp Park Improvements, Phase 2.

This grant application and project would be considered Phase 2 (of 3) for the rehabilitation of Kulp Park. Phase 1 was completed by the Borough with the rehabilitation and improvements to the tennis and pickleball courts. Phase 2 would specifically include:

- ADA parking and accessible path to the baseball field and dugouts
- Field rehabilitation which includes removal of the dirt infield to be replaced with a grass infield, infield drainage, replacing the backstop, moving the first base fence to align with the backstop, and adding a third base fence for safety which aligns with the backstop
- Adding additional fly ball netting along the first base as suggested by our insurance provider
- Updated LED lighting

These improvements still do not include the grandstands, snack stand, or scoreboard. Also, please note, due to the high costs associated with the above improvements, additional features that were originally discussed such as basketball court rehab, basketball court lighting, and baseball dugouts will not be included in this grant application and are noted for a future and possible Phase 3 of the project as noted in the site drawing.

The teams that currently rent and use the field have vocalized the need to address the playability and lighting of the field. In its current state, it is outdated, deteriorating and unsafe, and previous teams have left due to the conditions of the field. By focusing this phase on these items, we can ensure the continued and expanded use of the field.

The total cost for the Phase 2 improvement, including DCNR's grant request and Perkasie Borough's required funding breakdown, can be seen below:

Total Cost of Phase 2 \$ 893,499.76 DCNR Max Grant Request \$ 250,000.00

Non-Cash Services \$ 81,981.14 – through the Electric & Public Works Departments

Fees In Lieu Cash Match \$ 138,619.36 Additional Cash Required to Finish the Project \$ 422,899.26 Kulp Park Improvements Project, Phase 2 March 31, 2023 Page 2

Please note the total project includes a 10% contingency which equals out to \$81,227.25.

To assist with the funding, we would intend to apply for a DCED Greenway, Trails, and Recreation Program grant. The DCED grant application would be due by May 31st and has a maximum request of \$250,000, which, if awarded, would bring the additional cash required to finish the project to \$172,899.26. We would also intend on searching out and applying for any additional funding sources to secure as close to 100% funding as possible.

If Council is in support of the project and would like to apply for the DCNR grant, we would need to approve both the letter of match and resolution on Monday evening.

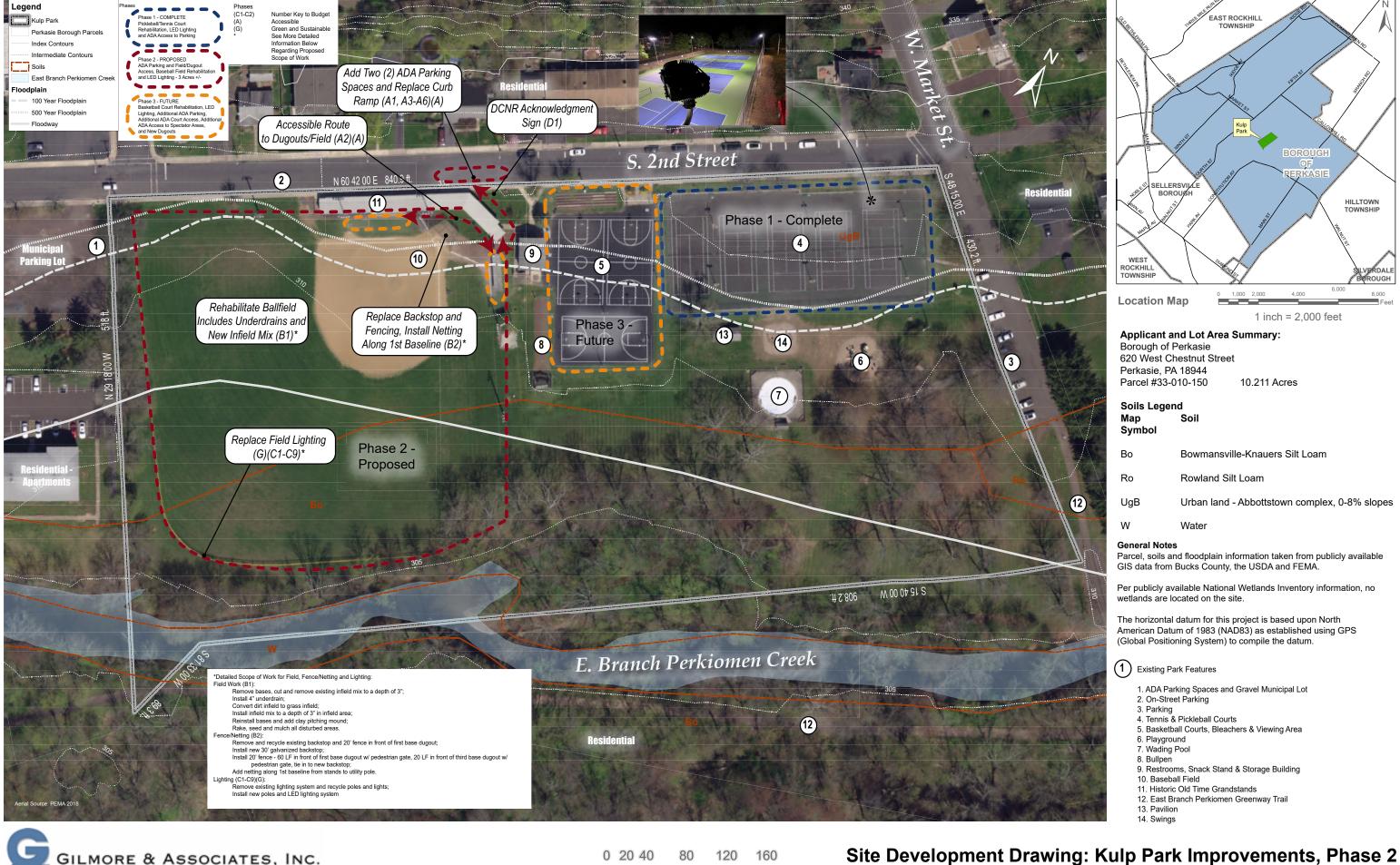

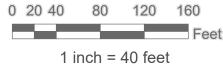

Perkasie's women business owners find support in community

When she was considering a location for her business toward the end of last year, Hope Wilson looked no further than her hometown of Perkasie Borough.

In addition to a growing reputation as a small-town food and beverage destination with fun events, Wilson found a tight-knit group of female entrepreneurs with a vested interest in helping each other succeed.

"I love how supportive the community has been," said Wilson, whose Highly Mystical Creations is one of three women-owned businesses in the Dragonflies Healing Salon and Spa on Callowhill Street. "I've had so much support from all the other women that it's truly heart-warming. This community is full of businesses wanting to help each other thrive and grow together."

When Wilson opened Highly Mystical Creations in January, she became the most recent in a long line of female entrepreneurs to set up shop in Perkasie. About four out of five brick-and-mortar businesses in the borough's historic district — about 40 locations in all, not including dozens of home-based businesses — are owned and operated by women.

Some of them have been around for a long time. The Treasure Trove, for example, an antiques and collectibles store, has been a fixture in the borough for 43 years. Frox, a women's clothing boutique, is celebrating its 20th year in Perkasie while Dragonflies owner Jessica Smalley will reach the decade milestone later this year.

Christine Seel, assistant professor of business and information management at Delaware Valley University, said Perkasie reflects a growing trend across the economy, with a significant increase in women-owned businesses over the last decade.

"Not only have more women struck out on their own by becoming self-employed, but the growth rate of women-owned businesses employing others far outpaces that of those owned by men," she said.

There are many theories why women might tend to dominate businesses in small towns like Perkasie, including a need to have the freedom to balance work with family responsibilities, access to dedicated funding, and special government programs and initiatives to encourage female entrepreneurship. But women business owners in

Perkasie say it mostly boils down to a sense of camaraderie and shared success among what Kelli Laustsen, owner of Bloom Flower Co., called " a sisterhood of businesses."

Recently appointed executive director of the Perkasie Towne Improvement Association, the borough's business development group, Laustsen said she received a warm reception from other female entrepreneurs when she opened seven years ago. "I owe a lot of my success to the incredible support system of women-owned businesses in the borough," she said. "We have a special woman-based community network that uplifts and empowers one another."

Even before she took over PTIA in July, Laustsen made a point to collaborate as often as possible on special events that draw visitors to town. From special First Friday programs, seasonal offerings like the Shop Hop featuring more than a dozen businesses on April 1 to celebrate Easter, and an occasional Coffee with a Cop get-together at a local restaurant, "we've realized we are stronger together," she said.

Cathy Weierbach, who will have operated Perkasie Florist in the borough for 29 years this October, agrees that with unity comes strength. She credits "a sense of family" and "small-town togetherness" to explain why Perkasie has such a strong concentration of successful women business owners.

"I think the more women businesses in an area the more they will attract more women in business," said Weierbach. "The woman-owned businesses in town support each other and I think that shows strength among us that may attract other women."

Wilson has already adopted that philosophy with Highly Mystical Creations, which offers crystals, incense, tarot, plants, and self-care products for well-being. She has an entire section in her store dedicated to products made by local female artisans.

"I am beyond grateful for my experience and all the support that I just want to follow the example and help as many other entrepreneurs myself," said Wilson. "We want to give back to the community as much as the community supports one another."

PERKASIE PIONEER

One of the borough's first prominent women business owners was Lizzie Johnson, a Philadelphia-trained milliner who had worked at Strawbridge & Clothier in Philadelphia before she married and moved to Perkasie, where she opened French Millinery on Fifth Street in 1895.

The craft of millinery arts, or making hats and other headwear, was one of few professions considered a respectable business owned and operated by women in Victorian society.

Johnson frequently advertised her spring and fall sales in the newspaper, writing her own advertising copy. In 1901, she reminded shoppers that she did a cash-only business. "For there is no hen that scratches for nothing and neither do I," she warned debtors. And there was the reminder that "there is nothing to make a lady feel more delightful than if she has a beautiful stylish hat to wear on Easter morning."

In 1909, Johnson bluntly wrote about the hat business. "We have been in Perkasie for the last 14 years, and in these 14 years, we can give you the names of milliners that came in Perkasie and went out again. That shows that our work gave good satisfaction as our business is growing every season so much more. With all the opposition it always makes it so much better for us," she wrote in her spring ad.

For the next 21 years – a total of 35 years in business, Johnson fought off competition from other milliners, and eventually department stores, when hats and bonnets were a big deal in Perkasie. A month after her 1934 Easter sale, Johnson fell ill at her Fifth Street home and passed away from a stroke at the age of 66.

In August 1934, Miss Alta Landis acquired Johnson's business and reopened it as the Vogue Millinery Salon, which became the Vogue Shoppe at Sixth and Chestnut streets, one of Perkasie's more successful businesses.

Perkasie museum named to National Register of Historic Places

PERKASIE — The Perkasie Historical Society Museum has been named to the National Register of Historic Places.

Located at 513 W. Walnut S., the former Lehigh Valley Transit Trolley station was one of the properties chosen for the national registry by the National Park System's selection committee.

The process began more than 25 years ago when Donald Lederach, then Perkasie's Community and Economic Development Director and later vice president of the Perkasie Historical Society, successfully completed the initial Resource Survey, leading the National Registry to grant eligibility status in 1998. An additional nomination form was submitted by Scott Bomboy, now a Perkasie Borough councilman, in 2016.

In 2018, Louise Doll, vice president of the Perkasie Historical Society, submitted an Addendum Application with supportive documents and related information needed to move the application into the nomination and approval process. Then, in June 2022, the Pennsylvania State Historic Preservation Board approved the nomination of the trolley station and recommended progression to the National Registry. Finally, on March 14, 2023, the Perkasie Historical Society received formal notification of the inclusion into the National Register of Historic Places.

Other National Registry designations in Perkasie are the 1832 South Perkasie Covered Bridge in Lenape Park and Perkasie Park on S. Ninth Street, which was selected in 2017.

The Lehigh Valley Transit Company built the late Victorian, one-story building in 1911 and 1912. Rugh & Lange, a prominent Lehigh Valley architectural firm, designed the station to serve the Liberty Bell trolley line. At the time, the trolley and railroad were in competition for transportation of people and goods to and from Philadelphia and Allentown.

The trolley station closed in 1951. In the following decades, a series of small businesses occupied the building until the Hartzell-Crouthamel American Legion Post 280 acquired it for meetings and social gatherings. In 1991, the Legion donated the building for \$1 to the Perkasie Historical Society to use as a local historical museum. In 2011, the museum was renovated to reflect its earlier role as a trolley station.

The society retained the integrity of the building, including the waiting room, ticket areas, windows and porch details. The historical society uses the building for displays and to house the organization's numerous collections. Rick Doll and Matt Lynch are the museum curators.
