# PERKASIE BOROUGH ORDINANCE NO.

#### AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF PERKASIE, BUCKS COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 180 OF THE PERKASIE BOROUGH CODE OF ORDINANCES PERTAINING TO PARKING REGULATIONS

WHEREAS, the Pennsylvania Borough Code at 8 Pa.C.S.A. § 101 et seq., authorizes the Borough Council of the Borough of Perkasie ("Borough Council") to make and adopt ordinances that are consistent with the Constitution and laws of the Commonwealth when necessary for the proper management, care and control of the Borough and the maintenance of peace, good government, health and welfare of the Borough and its citizens; and

**WHEREAS,** the Borough of Perkasie, in furtherance of the authority noted previously in this ordinance, has determined to amend the provisions of its Code of Ordinances so as to add no parking restrictions from West Spruce Street to the intersection with South 7<sup>th</sup> Street; and

**WHEREAS,** after public hearing, the Borough Council deems it to be in the best interest and general welfare of the citizens and residents of the Borough to amend its Code of Ordinances so as to modify the parking restrictions; and

**WHEREAS,** Borough Council, after due consideration of the proposed ordinance at a duly advertised public meeting, has determined that the health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of Perkasie Borough will be served by this amendment to the Perkasie Code of Ordinances.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED** by the Borough Council of the Borough of Perkasie, Bucks County, Pennsylvania, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of same as follows:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. The Perkasie Borough Code of Ordinances (Section 180-48 **Schedule XIV: Stopping, Standing and Parking Prohibited**), is hereby amended by adding the additional parking prohibition as follows:

Name of Street	Side	Time	Location
West Spruce Street	Westbound	No time limitation	From a distance of 56'10" from the stop sign at the intersection of South 7 <sup>th</sup> Street

**SECTION 2.** All ordinances or parts of ordinances that are inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed, it being understood and intended that all ordinances and the Borough Code of Ordinances that are not otherwise specifically in conflict or inconsistent with this Ordinance, shall remain in full force and effect, the same being reaffirmed hereby.

**SECTION 3.** The Council of the Borough of Perkasie does hereby reserve the right, from time to time, to adopt modifications of, supplements to, or amendments of this Ordinance, including this provision.

**SECTION 4.** If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional, by any court of competent jurisdiction, such provision shall be separate, distinct and independent, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 5.** The failure of the Borough of Perkasie to enforce any provisions of this Ordinance shall not constitute a waiver by the Borough of its rights of future enforcement hereunder.


**SECTION 6.** This Ordinance shall take effect immediately and be in force from and after its enactment as provided by law.

**SECTION 7.** Under the authority conferred by the Pennsylvania Borough Code at 8 Pa.C.S.A. § 101 *et seq.*, and other relevant statutory law, the Council of the Borough of Perkasie in the County of Bucks, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania does hereby enact and ordain this Ordinance for the Borough of Perkasie.







#### 2023 Year to Date Wholesale Power Summary





# Perkasie Borough Council accepts resignation of Perkasie Regional Authority board member

PERKASIE — The Perkasie Borough Council Monday evening accepted the resignation of Ben Rainear from the boards of the Perkasie Regional Authority (PRA) and the Pennridge Wastewater Treatment Authority (PWTA).

Rainear was first appointed to the PRA board in 1998, serving until 2016. He returned in 2020 to fill a vacancy and was re-appointed by the Borough in 2022. His term was set to expire in 2026, while his term on the PWTA board was set to expire this year.

Council president Jim Ryder requested a sense of urgency about filling the vacancy, while solicitor Jeff Garton noted the absence of any timeline for appointing a replacement. Borough manager Andrea Coaxum said the borough will start advertising for the position this week.

Public Works Director Jeff Tulone reported that PRA will complete water main construction on Highland Drive by Friday, enabling the Authority to begin road and concrete work. He announced that road work is complete on Buttonwood Street, Elm Avenue, Cedar Avenue and Arthur Avenue, with a handful of roads to go. He added that PennDOT will start patching 5th Street next year before doing tar and chip resurfacing the following year.

Council also approved proposals to improve the borough's cybersecurity and sign a software subscription agreement with ET&T for upgraded telephone equipment. Council additionally approved three upcoming events, including the Pennridge Crop Walk on October 8, the Perkasie Fire Company Open House on October 12 and the Pennridge High School Homecoming Parade on October 13.

The next Perkasie Borough Council meeting is on October 2 at 7 p.m. For more information, visit perkasieborough.org.

# Heralding Our History: Perkasie site of nation's first Christmas tree-lighting event

Perkasie is known in Upper Bucks County for its public events that draw thousands of visitors to town each year. But no event outshines Perkasie's oldest event: the annual community Christmas Tree lighting.

On a winter day each December, more than 5,000 people gather at 7th and Market streets to watch Santa Claus and Mrs. Claus arrive on a borough-owned electric-service bucket truck. The crowd cheers as Santa climbs in the bucket to the tree's top and it roars after Santa hits a switch to light the tree — continuing a tradition dating back more than 100 years.

The annual event has gained popularity over time and is one of the few post-Victorian traditions still observed in Perkasie. Samuel R. Kramer, one of the Perkasie Central News's founders, started the community tree event more than 110 years ago. Kramer organized the early events along with the Perkasie Owls' Santa Claus Committee.

Perkasie did not invent community Christmas tree events during the December holiday season. In Sterling, Illinois, the Lions Club sponsored a holiday tree for children in December in the 1870s, as did some California towns a decade later. Community trees were known in New England, North Dakota, and other states before Perkasie had its event.

Perkasie's unique claim is that the borough was the first town with a community tree with electric lights. As of today, no conclusive evidence has emerged to dispute that claim.

When that first Christmas event was held in Perkasie remains unclear today, based on three published accounts. In 1934, Kramer told the Central News the first event was in 1909. "Christmas morning, 1909, found about two hundred children in front of the post office in Jos. G. Moyer's building, and about nine o' clock a team of black horses, hitched to an antique high back sleigh, loaded with gifts. ... At Sellersville, the same program was enacted, only with new characters."

However, the Central News's first report of that event placed the celebration in December 1910. "Christmas morning, about 8 o'clock, several hundred children were gathered at the post-office corner to see Santa Claus. Suddenly up Market street came

an old-fashioned sleigh with pound boxes of candy, and oranges," the newspaper said. "About the same program was observed at Sellersville."

In 1939, Central News editor John Sprenkel recalled the first ceremony, and he thought it was held in 1910. "It was S.R. 'Dick' Kramer, former publisher of The Central News, ... who conceived and successfully promoted the plan here," Sprenkel wrote. "It was at this time we first heard of a Community Christmas program with a great big tree, outdoors, attractively illuminated with electric lights."

Regardless of the event's first date, a community Christmas tree ceremony with electric lights was celebrated in Perkasie at least three years before Philadelphia adopted the custom to use electricity to light its community tree. Philadelphia's tree debuted with "thousands of bulbs" on Christmas Eve in 1913, said The Philadelphia Inquirer.

In the following years, some tree ceremonies in Perkasie had additional significance. In 1918, World War I veterans were the special guests at an expanded holiday event, which included patriotic songs. During the 1920s and 1930s, the tree made its debut on the first weekend of December at the Reading Railroad station, "resplendent with colored lights and topped by a brilliant star." The annual Christmas Tree ceremony was a little dimmer in 1942 when outdoor lights weren't placed on the community tree due to blackout regulations.

During the 1950s, a 35-foot high tree remained at the train station. Later, the Community Tree was located next to the South Perkasie Covered Bridge, which had been moved to Lenape Park in 1958. In 1981, Shelley and Sons donated the use of its land at 7th and Market streets for the planting of a permanent community Christmas tree sponsored by the Pennridge Chamber of Commerce.

In 1991, the Perkasie Olde Town Association, a group formed to rebuild downtown Perkasie after a devastating fire in 1988, started the current version of Perkasie's community Christmas tree event. "We prayed and held our breath to see the community support," recalled co-organizer Neil Schwan in 1995.

In recent years, Perkasie Borough has taken over the event after it outgrew the Olde Towne group. This year's ceremony will be held from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Saturday Dec. 2. Santa Claus and Mrs. Claus will arrive on a Perkasie Electric Truck to light the tree at 7 p.m. with the help of one lucky child picked from the crowd. Samuel "Dick" Kramer would be proud.

#### Generators ruining idyllic afternoons on Valley View Lane

I've lived on Valley View Lane in Perkasie for 20 years. My home is technically in East Rockhill Township, but the land just behind my house is situated in Perkasie Borough. We are a neighborhood tucked behind Revivals, a Christian ministry site off Ridge Road, built in the mid-1990s.

It's a quiet location with lots of kids and neighbors who spend time and effort keeping their little houses and properties maintained. Most families spend much of their free time outside in the summer, having friends and families on their decks and patios, with kids splashing in pools, folks barbecuing and spending evenings enjoying the downtime. It's been quite idyllic. Until the Perkasie generators came.

Now, when those eight nearby diesel engines fire up and run through the afternoon and early evening, the noise is thundering. The ground reverberates, and windows and floors in our homes vibrate. When we are in our back yards, it's like sitting next to eight running locomotives in a train yard.

There are no barriers or buffers (natural or otherwise) around this substation to minimize or control sound. Perkasie Borough has made no effort to manage or contain/reduce the noise.

I've been in written contact with Andrea Coaxum from Perkasie Borough since last year. She indicated that the company would perform a sound test but it may "take a while" since the company that installed the generators was located out of state, and the test needed to be conducted while the generators were running. That was months ago. I emailed Ms. Coaxum again this week because the engines have been running daily due to electric demand. I'm waiting for a reply. Another neighbor has emailed the borough asking for assistance and updates as well.

Many of our neighbors are upset about the generators and I am encouraging them to write to the borough to understand what will be done to correct the noise menace. There is a healthy thread of posts on the Next Door app about the generators. People have heard and felt the generators as far as the borough below Ridge Road. Since the emails have not been effective form of communication, we will be arranging to attend a Perkasie Borough Council meeting to discuss the subject. The general consensus is that we will do everything we can, but the borough hasn't been responsive and will somehow find a way to avoid rectifying the situation.

I'm trying to get the issue in front of as many people and public media forums as possible.

I've also filed a request for assistance with Congressman Fitzpatrick's office.
