MUNICIPAL REPORT from YOUR PENNRIDGE COMMUNITY CENTER 2025

The Pennridge Community Center is one of the four full-service centers governed by the Bucks County Association for Retired and Senior Citizens. The Center serves all residents over age 55 in the municipalities of Bedminster, Dublin, East Rockhill, Hilltown, Perkasie, Sellersville, Silverdale, Telford, and West Rockhill and welcomes participants from other municipalities.

Our current facility, which opened in June 2007, includes a billiard room, library/computer room, game room, arts and crafts room, gift shop, patio, basement game room, conference room, and offices. Also available is a state-of-the-art kitchen and a community room (Legacy Room) both of which are available for use by the community. Because the facility is climate controlled and handicapped accessible, a safe, comfortable year around environment is provided. Also serves as an Emergency Center when determined by the County.

Membership to the Pennridge Community Center is available to all individuals aged 55 and older. The senior population of the Pennridge area is continually growing. The following is a summary of the population of the Pennridge Communities according to the 2010 census and a summary of the membership in the Center as of December, 2024:

Programs/Activities

Since its inception in 1964, the mission of the Pennridge Community Center has evolved from providing a place for senior citizens to meet friends and acquaintances to providing for the needs of the more active senior citizens of the 21st century. The mission has expanded over the years to provide relevant information, services, and activities necessary to assure aging with health, independence, and dignity.

Under the direction of Center Manager Peggy Lewis and Assistant Manager Carol Tyson, various services, educational programs, and recreational activities are provided to meet the needs of the community's retired and senior citizens. A variety of services is provided to assist participants with relevant information regarding health and personal issues. Health screening services include blood pressure checks and diabetes and hearing screening. Income tax preparation and insurance counseling are provided. Through lunch programs, Meals on Wheels, and produce vouchers, nutritional concerns are addressed. Family care-giver support and transport services are also provided.

The educational needs of seniors are addressed through many informational programs. Speakers' forums present information on topics such as the PACE Pharmaceutical Program and the Pennsylvania Rent Rebate Program. Direct instruction is provided in the art, computer, and writing classes as well as other topics which are requested by the Center's members.

The Center is the only facility in the Pennridge area solely dedicated to providing recreational opportunities for individuals over age 55. Among the activities offered on a regular weekly schedule are: aerobic classes, art classes, billiards, bingo, line dancing, tai chi, chair yoga, writing class, book club and card and board games including pinochle parties. Special recreational activities such as dances, concerts, and cultural activities are also held regularly.

Using the Copilot System, each person entering the Center, registers by name and indicates the purpose of his/her visit. The following is a summary of those registering in the Center from January, 2018 through December, 2024:

Finances

The Pennridge Community Center is minimally funded through the Bucks County Area Agency on Aging, the Pennsylvania Department on Aging, the federal food program, and self-supported projects. The Bucks County Association for Retired and Senior Citizens is responsible for the salary of the Manager and Assistant Manager. All other staff members are volunteers.

All operational expenses are the responsibility of the Center. These expenses include the costs for maintenance of the building and grounds, utilities, administrative expenditures, and expenses for programs and activities. In addition, the Center is responsible for the monthly mortgage payment of \$860.58. Because of the anticipated mortgage payments, the Center will need to raise \$10,327. to meet its yearly obligations.

Since the operational expenses are the responsibility of the Center, the Executive Committee, Advisory Board, and Center Manager investigate and pursue all possible sources to generate income. The following is a list of activities through which funds were generated during the past year:

Council President Jim Ryder convened the meeting at 7:00 PM. An invocation was given by Mayor Hollenbach, which was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC HEARING: NPDES STORMWATER DISCHARGES FROM MS4 POLLUTANT REDUCTION PLAN

A Public Hearing was held to hear public comments pertaining to the Borough's NPDES Stormwater Discharges from MS4 Pollutant Reduction Plan (PRP).

The Borough Engineer explained that PA DEP has required that all municipal separate storm sewersheds (MS4) that discharge to impaired streams in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania prepare a PRP for any and all impaired watersheds. Perkasie Borough discharges to several unnamed tributaries of the East Branch Perkiomen Creek, as well as Pleasant Spring Creek (also a tributary to East Branch Perkiomen Creek), all of which are impaired for sediment. As such, PA DEP required that over the 5-year NPDES permit cycle, sediment loadings into these tributaries be reduced by at least 10%.

The previously-approved PRP explained the strategy for which the Borough planned to follow to meet the 10% sediment reduction. The PRP has since been revised to update the location of streambank stabilization along Pleasant Spring Creek and to add two underground sediment removal device locations. PA DEP required the Borough to provide a public comment period for the updated PRP. The Public Hearing and public comment period, which ends October 2, 2025, were advertised appropriately. A hard copy of the report has been available for review at Borough Hall, and an electronic copy of the report has

been accessible on the website, since September 2nd. Following any public comment and any modifications that may result from those comments, the Borough will resubmit the PRP to PA DEP for review and approval.

There were no comments from the public. Upon a motion by Rose, seconded by Faulkner, the Public Hearing was closed at 7:22 pm.

PUBLIC FORUM

Mary Antczak from 718 Shadywood Drive informed Council that she was recently surprised when someone from the Borough's Electric Department knocked on her door to let her know that they were going to be replacing her electric meter, adding that she had no idea this was going to take place. Ms. Antczak told Council that her meter was replaced 10 years ago, so she didn't understand why it was being replaced again. The Borough Manager and Council President explained the current Borough-wide meter replacement process began a few years ago, because the technology is obsolete on the previous meters, and the meters need to be replaced to ensure that they are being read properly. The new meter technology will allow meters to be read from in-house, without someone from the Electric Department having to drive around to obtain the meter readings.

PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

Council President Ryder reminded everyone to be safe on the roads with school back in session.

The Finance Committee meeting started at 4:00PM and Councilman Bomboy led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC FORUM

DRAFT BUDGET 2026

Councilman Bomboy opened the meeting.

The Borough Manager gave a brief introduction and noted that important decisions need to be made as we go through the budget process.

The Finance Director presented a budget summary that showed the 2026 draft budget in comparison to the 2025 budget. In summary, expenses exceed revenue by \$477,061 and \$461,282 is needed to meet fund balance requirements. The total deficit is \$938,343.

Councilman Bomboy asked for a brief explanation of the fund balance policy for the audience.

Ms. Coaxum and Ms. Deemer explained that the fund balance represents a percentage of each fund's operating expenses. As your expenses increase, your fund balance requirement increases. It is set aside for unexpected expenses and capital planning, and it also impacts our ability for borrowing. The fund balance policy was set by resolution and is a reasonable and responsible number.

Ms. Deemer presented highlights of Revenues and Expenses for all funds. Revenues are increasing slightly by 2.2% and Expenses increase by 7.6%. There is no tax increase included in this draft.

Ms. Deemer advised the committee on the following Revenue changes in each fund:

- General Fund .4% increase in revenue. While most of the revenue remains flat, slight adjustments were made based on current and prior year's actuals.
- Menlo Fund 9.5% decrease in revenue as a transfer from Electric in not needed to support this fund in 2026. Revenues are sufficient to cover all the budgeted expenses.
- Refuse Fund .5% increase in revenue as we are seeing more residents participating in the toter program as opposed to the bags.
- Electric Fund 2.8% increase revenue for sale of electricity. Additional revenue is determined by the projected load for 2026 that AMP provided.
- Fire Fund .7% increase in revenue. The pass-through of tax funding to the Fire Dept. is based on the current assessment for the Borough.
- Road Improvement Fund .2% increase in revenue. A slight increase in the current assessment will provide additional funds for the road program.
- Capital Fund 29.6% decrease in revenue. Fund Balance reserves and grant funding will help to offset projects and expenses, but additional funding is needed for other vehicle and equipment purchases.
- State Highway Aid No change as we have not received notice from the state about our 2026 Liquid Fuels Funding.

Ms. Deemer advised the committee on the following Expense changes:

- Salaries are increasing overall by 5.9%.
- Health and Dental Insurance reflect a projected increase of 8.3%.
- Worker's Compensation Insurance is based on a 6% increase.
- Property & Liability Insurance remains flat, based on guidance from DVIT. We could see a reduction in costs with the final figures.
- Pension Obligations are increasing by 1.49%.
- Electric Power Purchases are increasing by 2.4%. The installed capacity is increasing by \$465,800 and energy purchases are decreasing by \$310,865 for a net increase of \$147,629.
- Capital Purchases are increasing by 29.6%.
- Annual Debt payment for the Menlo Aquatics Center is \$429,366.

There was discussion about the remaining debt and if there are specific needs that may require the Borough to seek additional financing.

Ms. Coaxum mentioned that the next large purchase would be to replace the transformers at the electric sub-station.

Various trends related to salaries, pension costs, and insurance premiums were reviewed and discussed with the committee.

Councilman Ryder asked if the 4.5% increase for AFSCME is what is being proposed in the current contract negotiations and if it is the same for all 4 years of the next contract. Andrea stated that we are not far enough along in the process for her to be able to publicly comment.

Ms. Deemer went through changes in the General Fund related to Administration. In addition to salaries and wages other increases in expenses are related to meetings & conferences, auditing, solicitor professional services, contracted IT Networking, and engineering for MS4 compliance.

The Police Chief addressed council regarding his budget for 2026. The highlights of his budget are related to salaries, contracted IT services, ongoing capital purchases, the Civilian Community Relations Specialist and the contribution from Sellersville for police services.

Police Capital items in the draft include:

•	Replacement of Mobile Data Terminals		\$ 12,402
•	Body Cameras & In-Car Cameras		\$ 50,254
•	Replacement of Police Vehicle		\$ 79,000
•	Reserves for roof replacement		\$ 45,600

Councilwoman Schilling asked about the pension costs related to police and if we will see those costs remain flat or will they increase.

Ms. Deemer explained that this year the costs remained flat due to an officer in the DROP program who is no longer contributing to the plan. We will see the costs go up as new members are enrolled.

Chief Schurr talked about the Civilian Community Relations Specialist and said that the position will be funded with a grant. They submitted the grant application in September and will find out in December if they receive the grant. He highlighted all the things that this position is responsible for and that it has a significant role in the police department.

The committee discussed the need to fund the position if we do not receive grant funding.

Chief Schurr also talked about contracting with a new vendor for IT services. A copy of the proposal with the new vendor was shared with the committee. The new vendor would address any network issues that may arise and provide additional security features above what the current vendor provides.

Chief Schurr discussed the need to replace one of the vehicles. He provided options to purchase either a Ford Explorer or a Chevrolet Tahoe. The Tahoe will cost approximately \$ 12,000 more than the Ford Explorer. The benefit to purchasing a Tahoe is the ability to keep them in service for a longer period of time.

There was discussion amongst the committee about the vehicle purchase.

Ms. Deemer provided some highlights for Public Works and Refuse. We are recommending the addition of a new F/T position. Increases are recommended in the different public works departments related to materials, supplies, and maintenance and repairs. Disposal fees are increasing for refuse, recycling, and yard waste.

Public Works Capital items in the draft include:

• Diagnostic software annual subscription

•	Annual testing of backflow preventers	\$ 4,000
•	Replacement of a 2011 Chevy Utility Truck	\$ 93,000
•	Replacement of a 2003 John Deere w/ Brush hog & flail mower	\$ 144,000
•	Replacement of the Menlo Rental House roof	\$ 16,980

The Public Works Director has expressed the need to have a reliable used trash truck added to his fleet. We have funds that have been set aside for the replacement of a dump truck. We would like to reallocate those funds for the purchase of the used trash truck. We would like to replace the dump truck with a Hook Truck, and we plan to seek LSA funding for that purchase.

There was discussion about the public work's capital purchases, and the capital plan was reviewed with the committee.

Councilman Weaver asked if there was any value in the used vehicles.

Mr. Tulone stated that there is value, and we would sell them on Municibid.

With no further items to address, the Borough Manager reminded the committee that the next budget meeting is scheduled for Monday, October 6th and a third meeting is scheduled for Monday, October 22nd.

The Finance Committee meeting started at 4:00PM and Councilman Bomboy led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC FORUM

John Gatter, of 601 Spruce Street, addressed the committee. He expressed his appreciation for the pickleball courts and noted some maintenance needs that he hopes will be included in the 2026 budget. He also suggested forming a subcommittee much like the Skate Park Committee.

DRAFT BUDGET 2026

Councilman Bomboy opened the meeting. He did not make any specific comments about the budget but wanted to thank the Finance Director and Borough Manager for all the work that has been put into preparing the draft.

The Finance Director presented a budget summary that provided a breakdown of the culture and recreation budget as it is shared between the parks and recreation department and special events.

Revenue associated with Culture & Recreation:

- Recreation Program Fees \$70,000
- Special Events Revenue \$50,000
- Basketball League \$9,300
- Pavilion Rental Fees \$6.000
- Other Fees/Sponsorships \$6,000

Expenses associated with Culture & Recreation:

- Parks & Recreation Wages, Program Costs & Operating Costs \$196,421
- Special Events Wages, Events expenses & Other Operating Costs \$135,431

The Parks and Recreation Director talked about all the different programming and courses that are provided throughout the year. Over 200 kids were enrolled in camps this year. There were an additional 725 individuals enrolled in the other programs that were offered. There was a lot more marketing that took place this year that helped with filling the programs.

Councilman Worthington mentioned that Ms. Moll has had the foresight to know when school is closed to take advantage of those dates to run programs.

Councilwoman Laustsen asked about the time of day for the different camp sessions.

Ms. Moll stated that most of the camps are typically run in the morning from 9-12. The fees associated with a full day camp is very high for the community and have seen lower registration for those camps.

Councilwoman Laustsen recommended doing afternoon camps from 1-4 also.

Ms. Moll stated that we did include additional funding in the park's maintenance line item to address some of the concerns of the pickleball community. We will also be adding to a revenue line that will allow us to accept donations that can be used to help offset those costs and/or other costs related to the park system.

Park's capital items in the draft include:

•	Kulp Park Infield Groomer	\$	5,400
•	Kulp Park Camera System	\$	27,000
•	Lenap Park Skate Park Cluster 4	\$	46,000
•	Covered Bridge Camera System	\$	25,350

Councilman Bomboy recommended the National Preservation Society funding for the camera system for the covered bridge.

There was further discussion about the camera systems as far as the connection requirements and that the covered bridge camera covers costs to be able to run a live feed during the reconstruction of the bridge.

Councilman Brooks asked if there is the ability for joint use of equipment with Pennridge High School.

Ms. Moll stated that we could use equipment that is owned by Pennridge but the field is still used for recreation purposes, and we would want to have the proper equipment to handle that.

Councilwoman Laustsen asked for clarification on the Skate Park piece.

Ms. Moll provided an overview of the entire replacement project that has been ongoing in the skate park.

Councilwoman Schilling asked about privacy regarding the camera systems, specifically how often is the footage deleted.

Ms. Coaxum stated that the system does delete the data on a regular basis, but he can speak to specifics at a future meeting. The data is only retained if there is an incident. The cameras have proven to be very beneficial when trying to identify subjects responsible for vandalism.

Councilman Rose asked about funding towards flooding in the park.

Ms. Coaxum discussed the ongoing streambank stabilization project and the streambank maintenance plan that is in the draft budget.

The Finance Director provided an overview of the Menlo Budget. A 2025 year to date summary was provided. Overall, revenues were 4.2% higher than budgeted. Expenses are expected to come in 1.4% under budget. The anticipated surplus is \$97,032. \$65,102 of that surplus will be needed for the pool to meet its fund balance requirement. The remaining \$31,903 will be used for needed repairs in the off season. The 2026 draft budget does not include any increase in membership fees or daily admissions. Revenue projections are based on how the pool performed this year and we do not anticipate any major increases in expenses.

Councilman Worthington commented that adding online purchasing for daily passes and offering payment plans helped to make things more functional for the public.

Ms. Coaxum added that with the addition of the pool manager that it allows the staff to start planning things well in advance. This includes swimming lessons, birthday parties and other programming at the pool.

Menlo capital items in the draft include:

•	Replacement of Backwash valves	\$ 7,000
•	Feature Replacement	\$ 10,500
•	Pool Pump Replacements	\$ 36,100
•	Reserves for Diamond Brite	\$ 82,500

Ms. Moll mentioned that with the anticipated surplus for 2025, they can have the Tot/Baby Pool pump and feature replacements done and remove those items from the 2026 capital plan.

Councilwoman Schilling asked if there is an opportunity to offer subsidized pricing for pool memberships. There was further discussion on this topic.

Councilman Brooks commended Lauren on her budget presentation.

Ms. Deemer presented budget highlights for the Electric Fund. There is an increase in revenue of 2.8% and an increase in expenses of 4.3%. A summary of the 2026 Capacity Plan was provided. Energy purchases are decreasing by \$310,865, while Installed Capacity is increasing by \$465,800. The net impact of these changes results in an overall increase of \$147,629. A copy of the Borough's energy supply plan was provided.

The Electric Superintendent mentioned that we had a discussion earlier in the day with GDS about whether we need to do a fall power purchase. GDS is recommending that we consider long-term purchases. They are currently seeking indicative pricing for Chambersburg and will let us know what that pricing looks like to determine if now is a good time for us to seek pricing.

Councilman Weaver asked about the remaining life span of the transformers.

Mr. Stone said that they were installed in 1995, and we were told they could last 25-30 years. Periodic testing can be done to see if there are any signs of deterioration. He stated that the Borough's load is split between the two transformers and if need be, the town can run off of 1 transformer.

Electric capital items in the draft include:

•	Replacement 2014 Bucket Truck	\$ 331,634
•	Replace Electric Man Doors/Windows	\$ 18,000
•	Bank Circuit & Feeder Circuit Breaker Relays	\$ 78,000
•	Substation SCADA system	\$ 20,000
•	Reserves for future	\$ 227,667

Councilman Weaver asked if \$70,000 in bank fees is typical.

Ms. Deemer explained that last year we had considered passing some of those fees onto the customers and it ended up not being cost efficient, so we are bringing that expense in line with the actual costs.

Councilman Rose asked if we are planning to increase electric rates this year.

Ms. Coaxum stated we aren't at a point to make that recommendation yet but to keep in mind that Council did approve to create a separate line item for installed capacity on the customer's bill so perhaps Council could consider passing that charge on again. Since we are still in the working draft of the budget that discussion will take place at the third budget meeting.

Councilman Bomboy stated that it is worth noting that based on the survey by PMEA Perkasie Borough rates are lower than PPL and PECO. PPL announced this week that they are adding an 8% increase on the distribution fee to their customers.

Councilwoman Schilling asked if there was a way for us to reduce our peak capacity.

There was further discussion on the peaking generators.

Ms. Coaxum addressed the committee regarding the Borough's Fund Balance Policies. Several years ago, capital purchases for the Electric Fund were being made from the Capital Fund. A transfer from the electric fund would be done to accommodate those capital purchases. At the end of the year the auditors would move those capital expenses back to the Electric Fund to capitalize and depreciate those assets since it is an enterprise fund. However, the funding was not credited back to the Electric Fund. Therefore, we started to account for capital purchases related to electric in the electric fund. Since then, the capital purchases and transfers to other funds have been included in the fund balance calculation. Since the fund balance policy only requires 14% of "Operating Expenses" we were able to determine that we have been setting aside more reserves than what is necessary due to the capital items and transfers.

There was further discussion regarding the fund balance calculations.

Ms. Coaxum stated that we will prepare a summary for everyone for the next budget meeting for a better understanding of the impact.

The next budget meeting is scheduled for Monday, October 20th.

- 1. Per Mr. Faulkner's conversation with Larry Nacarella (owner of The Perk restaurant), Mr. Nacarella is going to have a sign made this week asking customers to be aware of / keep neighbors in mind when they park for the Perk.
- 2. The Committee supports single 4-foot lines (or whatever length Mr. Tulone says they should be) at the sides of each driveway delineating that cars can't park beyond those lines. The Committee does not recommend marking out individual parking spaces on the street.
- 3. Mr. Faulkner will be reaching out to the neighbor that came to the Council meeting. He would like to get her and neighbors' support PRIOR to doing the lines. Or, if she wants Mr. Faulkner to talk to the neighbors effected (rough count of 13 driveways).
- 4. Per Mr. Tulone this would be on the 2026 calendar due to leaves and debris in the fall.
- 5. Mr. Tulone estimated this would be \$1300.

Curb Painting – Visual Sight Lines

- 1. Chief Schurr reached out to PENNDOT regarding mirrors
 - i. PENNDOT was against them due to distortions in rain, convex design gives false distances, could fog over and make the borough liable for accidents.
- 2. A few intersections have been designated to add curb painting to reduce parking close to the intersections.
- 3. Pine St and 9th (pulling out of police station)
- 4. 3rd and 4th and Market
- 5. Others?
- 6. These would also be a 2026 project due to leaves / debris.

Parking Fines

- 1. Chief Schurr suggested \$20 tickets, the Committee was leaning more towards \$25. The Mayor mentioned his \$300 parking ticket in Philadelphia.
- 2. It was suggested that the Borough amend the Borough code to refer to the yearly fee resolution for ticket rates. That way we don't have to issue an ordinance every time we

- want to change ticket costs. Likely the current Ordinance requirement is the reason tickets are still \$10 dating back to the 1980's.
- 3. Chief Schurr showed a new ticket design and will add borough fines for inspection stickers and registration.
- 4. It was discussed that the Borough consider a more up-to-date method to pay tickets. Currently fines must be paid via check or money order. Many people don't have check books nor know where to get a money order. Chief Schurr is going to look at other options.

Two-Hour Parking Signs

- 1. Primarily has to do with 7th street retail businesses
- 2. Looking at cost estimates for 2026 of possibly painting curbs green within the two-hour parking areas.
- 3. Many violators are workers at the area businesses. Chief Schurr has talked to business owners without much luck.
 - i. Mr. Faulkner commented Possibly the higher ticket prices will make this a little more painful?
- 4. Chief Schurr noted that there are a number of towns that have used the green curbs successfully as a reminder that this is "two-hour parking".
- 5. Add some updated parking signs to emphasize the two-hour parking.

Crosswalk Signs / Lights

- 1. Mayor Hollenbach is concerned about street crossing on 5th across from where the new Starbucks is located across at Giant shopping center.
- 2. Mr. Faulkner would like to see better crossing lights at McDonald's and Lenape Park and the trail crossing on Callowhill. Possibly at Spruce St crossing to Lenape Park.
- 3. Chief Schurr reached out to Macungie Borough, and heard that they received a Penndot ARLE grant for \$224,000.00 and spent \$207,000.00 to upgrade five pedestrian crossings. That included engineering and the new signs and lighting. That grant is closed for 2025.
- 4. The Mayor noted that Shelby Labs told him that she might be able to help with funding projects.
- Mr. Faulkner mentioned that maybe Park and Recreation Director Lauren Moll could pursue Trails money as the crossing on Callowhill and McDonald's are certainly trail / park-related and could maybe use for trails on 5th Street by Giant.
- 6. We need to have the Borough Engineer, Doug Rossino, involved in the who/what/how to get approvals for the crosswalks.

Dear Zoning Hearing Board,

Thank you for considering our application for a zoning variance permitting us to hang 8 local business advertisements on the interior fence of our property.

The signs primarily help and support the few small businesses by generating exposure for them while washing their vehicles at the car wash. We charge a very nominal amount for these businesses to hang their signs as we recognize and feel the dramatic effects of the cost of doing business during the recent years of soaring inflation. This has cause a severe hardship for many small businesses, ours included.

The cost of our products and vendor services, post covid, have gone up at an alarming rate. For example a 5 gallon jug of a wash solution in 2020 was \$61, in 2025 it is now over \$105. Insurance is more than \$2,000 over what it was in 2021. Mortgage rates have spiked to over 7%. Perkasie electric bill was approximately \$600 per month in 2021, today it is over\$1,000 per month. This is only a small portion of the increased costs we are experiencing.

These increased expenses are not able to be passed onto our customers, nor do we want to pass along high costs. When we purchased the wash in 2020 wash packages ranged from \$6-\$12. We have kept costs from \$6-\$15. Our commitment to the community and our customers is to provide a good and affordable service. Recently this has become more and more difficult.

Furthermore, year after year, we have contributed tens of thousands of dollars to sponsoring local civic activities such as the major sponsor for Under The Stars Car Show, year after year, The Christmas Tree Lighting, Pennridge Little League, Community Day, Good Time Motortvators, the Perkasie Fire Company, Harelys Haven, the Rotary Club as well as providing car washes to the Perkasie Police at cost (with increased product cost we actually do not even break even on this civic charity). This list does not include the host of various one off sponsorships we commit to as they are presented to us. Without the small income we derive

from these signs, there is no fiscal way that we will be able to continue to sponsor these activities.

We graciously ask that you consider all these variables when making your decision on our zoning variance application.

RE: 2026 Budgets

Members and Contributors:

We are pleased to submit the Calendar Year 2026 Operating Fund, Capital Projects Fund and MIPP Fund Budgets for the costs of operation, maintenance, and improvements to the Treatment Plant and the Southside Interceptor. These Budgets were prepared pursuant to Sections 6.12 and 6.13 of the Treatment Plant Agreement and Southside Interceptor Agreement, respectively, signed November 17, 1975.

In the sections cited, the Pennridge Wastewater Treatment Authority covenants to prepare an annual operating budget for total estimated annual costs in connection with operating the treatment plant and the Southside Interceptor. Each budget is to set forth the following:

- a. Debt Service Requirements, if any;
- b. Total costs of operating and maintaining the facilities; and,
- c. Each contracting party's share of cost estimates (a) and (b) above.

1. TREATMENT AGREEMENT AND INTERCEPTOR AGREEMENT

Wastewater treatment and transportation services to be provided to contracting parties by the Authority are outlined in Section 6.01 of the Agreements. They are as follows:

- a. The treatment and transportation of sewage wastes from the sewage collection system of each party;
- b. The reservation of a portion of the capacity in the treatment plant for treatment, and in the interceptor for transportation of sewage wastes for each party in the amounts designated in Section 3.02 of the Agreements.

2. OPERATIONS AND MAINTENANCE COSTS

- a. For the costs incurred under item 1-a, Pennridge Authority will charge each contracting party on the basis of the actual costs to the Authority for operation and maintenance of the treatment plant and the interceptor, less any federal or state grants applicable. Such charges are billed quarterly in advance.
- b. The transportation charges for each party, except for the Telford Borough Authority, shall be determined by computing the ratio which the flow discharged by the respective party bears to the total amount of flow discharged into the Southside Interceptor, and applying it to the "total cost of operating and maintaining the Southside Interceptor, less any costs incident to the cost of operating and maintaining the meter station installed for Telford Authority". The Telford Authority will, in addition, pay any costs to operate and maintain the meter station installed to record its flow to the treatment plant.
- c. At the October 26, 1998 meeting of the Board of the Pennridge Wastewater
 Treatment Authority it was decided that the Operating Budget would be allocated
 to the Municipalities in proportion to the EDUs connected.
- d. Total estimated treatment plant and interceptor operations and maintenance costs for calendar year 2026 are itemized under "2026 OPERATING FUND DISBURSEMENTS" in the amount of \$3,113,749. The net cost of \$3,113,749 is to be billed to the contracting parties. A complete breakdown of costs is shown under "2026 BUDGETS."
- e. The Treatment Plant Agreement provides that, "bills of one-quarter (1/4) of the charges with respect to the total cost of operating and maintaining" the treatment plant and the Southside Interceptor, "shall be delivered by Pennridge Authority to each party hereto on the first day of January, April, July and October". The bill delivered to each party on April 1 of each year will be adjusted to reflect any overpayment or underpayment made by the billed party for preceding year. The April 1 billing adjustment satisfies the provision of Section 6.02 that billings be based upon "actual" costs and metered flows. Quarterly billings for calendar year 2026 are shown under "2026 BUDGETS."

3. CAPITAL PROJECTS FUND

The Capital Projects Fund was established by the Authority to fund services and equipment that fit one of the following categories:

- a. Additions to or upgrading of capital equipment in the conveyance and treatment systems.
- b. "First fill" expenses or start-up supplies and services for a new Capital addition.
- c. Items unrelated to equipment purchases, which are deemed by Pennridge Authority to be one-time only expenditures for permanent improvements or savings.

Capital projects approved for funding during 2026, in the amount of \$325,000, are listed under "2026 CAPITAL PROJECTS FUND".

4. MAINTENANCE RESERVE FUND

The Maintenance Reserve Fund balance will be held at the current level of \$25,000, with interest accruing to the Operating Fund in accordance with Section 6.09 of the Treatment Plant Agreement.

5. INDUSTRIAL PRETREATMENT FUND

The Authority has been issued a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) which requires the Authority to develop and implement an Industrial Pretreatment Program to comply with Federal and state regulations.

Accordingly, the Authority has established an Industrial Pretreatment Fund to receive revenues from permit fees, surcharge fees and Act 9 fines imposed upon the industrial/commercial discharges to the wastewater treatment facility. The revenues are restricted and to be used for the development and implementation of the pretreatment program and to reimburse the Authority for operating fines and expenses incurred due to NPDES effluent violations caused by inadequate treatment of industrial/commercial wastewater.

The Industrial Pretreatment Program budget adopted for 2026 in the amount of \$30,400, is detailed under "2026 MIPP FUND".

Dear Review Committee,

Perkasie Borough respectfully submits this request for \$1,928,200 in Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside (TASA) funding for the W. Park Avenue Pedestrian & Stormwater Improvement Project. While the TASA program establishes a soft cap of \$1.5 million, guidance allows for higher awards—up to \$3 million—for projects that demonstrate exceptional value. We believe this project clearly meets and exceeds that threshold.

Addressing Safety Needs: Today, pedestrians and cyclists must navigate a narrow 20-foot roadway shared with more than 5,700 vehicles daily, compounded by steep grades, sharp curves, and flooding hazards. This project resolves those risks by adding ADA-compliant sidewalks and crossings, stormwater improvements, sharrows, and a modernized intersection—creating a safe, accessible corridor for all users.

Advancing Equity and Economic Vitality: The project creates safe non-vehicular access for residents in Perkasie's northwest neighborhoods, connecting them to civic amenities, community events, and downtown businesses. In addition, improved trail access is expected to increase property values, strengthen small business revenues, and attract visitors from across the region. Perkasie's position between Philadelphia and Allentown makes it a natural midpoint for future Liberty Bell Trail users and a vibrant small-town destination for dining, shopping, and events.

Closing a Critical Transportation Gap: The project will complete the final 1/3-mile missing link of the Liberty Bell Trail within Perkasie Borough, a corridor of regional and statewide significance. When finished, this segment will enable uninterrupted non-motorized travel from Norristown to Quakertown and beyond, connecting directly with the Schuylkill River Trail and Saucon Rail Trail. This connection has been prioritized in multiple regional and statewide plans, including DVRPC's Circuit Trails plan and the Pennsylvania Statewide Outdoor Recreation Plan.

Readiness and Commitment: The Borough has secured almost \$2.06 million in Congressionally Directed federal CPF HUD funding. Perkasie Borough intends to use a combination of Liquid Fuels, in-kind labor and local funding to carry out pre-construction and construction activities per the TASA grant guidelines. Conceptual designs and cost estimates have been prepared and shared with residents and local stakeholders to create community buy in. The Borough is well-positioned to deliver this project on time and within scope.

For these reasons, we respectfully request that PennDOT and DVRPC consider advancing this application at the full request amount of \$1,928,200, recognizing the exceptional value of this project for regional connectivity, safety, community equity, and economic vitality.

Thank you for your consideration and for your continued partnership in strengthening Pennsylvania's active transportation network.

TASA Narrative 2025

Statement of the Problem

The proposed Park Avenue Pedestrian & Stormwater Improvement Project will address long-standing safety, access, and infrastructure challenges along a 1,400-linear-foot section of roadway in Perkasie Borough. The corridor's 5–9% grade, narrow lanes, and lack of sidewalks make it one of the Borough's most hazardous areas for non-motorized users.

Lack of Safe Connections:

Currently, residents in and to the northwest of Perkasie Borough have no pedestrian access into town. This area is disconnected from the Borough's otherwise comprehensive trail and sidewalk system, which links civic, cultural, economic, and recreational assets across the community and into neighboring municipalities. Pedestrians and bicyclists attempting to travel into or out of town are forced onto the edge of W. Park Avenue, which carries an average daily traffic volume of 5,756 vehicles. At its narrowest point, the roadway provides only 20 feet of cartway width, leaving a single 10-foot lane shared by vehicles, bikes, and pedestrians. The absence of sidewalks, bike lanes, and ADA-compliant infrastructure, combined with steep grades, sharp curves, and outdated inlet grates, creates unacceptable risks for all users. This missing sidewalk also represents a gap in the Liberty Bell Trail, a regionally significant greenway planned to extend from Norristown to Quakertown.

Stormwater and Flooding Concerns:

In addition to unsafe conditions for pedestrians and cyclists, residents along the southeast side of W. Park Avenue continue to experience water damage from roadway runoff. Heavy rains routinely send water across private properties, creating both property damage and roadway hazards. The need for stormwater improvements became especially urgent following two federally-declared disasters—Hurricane Ida and Hurricane Ian—which brought "100-year floods" within a short timeframe. W. Park Avenue was directly impacted when the above-ground stormwater basin overflowed and the spillway failed, causing debris to collect on the roadway and further erode steep grades. Left unaddressed, these issues jeopardize the safety of road users and further degrade Borough infrastructure.

Proposed Solutions and Actions

The project will establish safe pedestrian access to the central area of the Borough by constructing new sidewalks along Park Avenue, with ADA-compliant curb ramps and crossings at Jefferson Drive, S. 12th Street, and Parkridge Drive. The location of the sidewalk requires the relocation of several utility poles and fire hydrants, as well as the construction of retaining walls to accommodate the steep grades, maintain improvements within the legal right-of-way, and reduce impacts to neighboring properties.

Project improvements include the installation of bicycle-safe inlet grates and curbing on both sides of the roadway to capture runoff; milling and overlay of the existing pavement to provide a safe riding surface for bicyclists with sharrow pavement markings; and upgrades to the existing signalized intersection at W. Park Avenue and Ridge Road (SR 0563) to provide ADA-compliant curb ramps and crossings, linking users to a recently installed multi-use trail section on the northwest side of Ridge Road.

The project also converts the existing, failing above-ground stormwater detention basin into an underground detention system. This improvement will eliminate the public safety risks associated with the steep basin slopes (2:1 or 50%), minimize ongoing maintenance requirements for the Borough, prevent debris accumulation, and improve overall stormwater management efficiency, particularly during increasingly frequent extreme rain events.

In addition to addressing safety and stormwater needs, the project supports the Borough's economic development goals by creating a walkable connection to small businesses, community events, and activities. It will alleviate parking demand in the town center and expand access for low-income residents

of Perkasie, Sellersville, and surrounding communities to the Revivals Outreach Center on Ridge Road. Importantly, the project will close a critical transportation gap in the historic Liberty Bell Trail, positioning Perkasie as a regional destination for recreation, shopping, dining & tourism.

Brief Project Description

The proposed project focuses on creating pedestrian access, increasing stormwater resilience, improving Drainage and addressing public safety concerns along a 1,400 linear foot section of roadway in the Borough with a challenging 5% to 9% grade. The total estimated project cost, with inflation projected over the next 2 years, is \$4,585,177. In 2023, Perkasie Borough secured federal funding for this project of \$2,058,180 in Congressional Community Project Funding.

Project Location Description

The project is located along West Park Avenue in the northwest section of Perkasie Borough. W. Park Avenue is a two-lane local roadway with an approximate width that varies from less than 20 feet to 31 feet between Jefferson Drive and Ridge Road and has an average daily traffic volume of approximately 5,756 vehicles per day according,to PennDOT's Traffic Information Repository (TIRe). The adjacent land uses consist of mainly residential properties, with one large parcel owned by the Borough that contains an existing stormwater management basin.

Network Connectivity

The Park Avenue Pedestrian & Stormwater Improvement Project will complete an approximately 1/3-mile missing link in the Liberty Bell Trail within Perkasie Borough, closing a gap that has long been identified as a local and regional priority. This connection is vital for expanding the active transportation network, ensuring that pedestrians and bicyclists can move safely through a corridor that currently offers no sidewalks, bike markings, or safe space for non-motorized users.

Regionally, the project advances the vision for the Liberty Bell Trail as a spine trail linking Norristown to Quakertown, with further extensions north to Bethlehem and Allentown via the Saucon Rail Trail and south to the Schuylkill River Trail—one of Pennsylvania's most significant multi-use trails. When fully constructed, the Liberty Bell Trail will provide seamless, non-motorized travel across Montgomery, Bucks, Lehigh, and Northampton Counties.

This project directly implements recommendations from the Liberty Bell Trail Feasibility Update (adopted by Perkasie Borough in 2020) and is supported in both the Circuit Trails Plan and the Pennsylvania Environmental Council's Gap Analysis of the Circuit Trails. The Circuit Trails network identifies the Liberty Bell Trail as a core regional connector, with the same role in linking communities that the historic Liberty Bell Trolley once provided.

At the local level, the project provides critical connectivity between Perkasie's northwest neighborhoods, its downtown core, and regional trails in Sellersville, East Rockhill, and Hilltown. By extending safe pedestrian and bicycle access into the Borough's commercial and civic center, the project supports both community mobility and broader regional trail continuity.

Community Context

The Park Avenue Pedestrian & Stormwater Improvement Project is fully consistent with Perkasie Borough's land use vision, community character, and transportation goals. The Borough's 2014 Comprehensive Plan established the economic development vision of PlayShopDineUnwind, emphasizing active and healthy lifestyles while leveraging the Borough's extensive parks, trails, and open space system. Central to that vision is walkability and the ability to access shops, restaurants, breweries, and cultural amenities in a mixed-use, small-town setting. By adding sidewalks, bicycle-safe features, and stormwater infrastructure, this project directly advances those priorities and strengthens Perkasie's role as a vibrant, connected community and regional destination.

The project aligns with and supports a broad range of local, regional, and statewide planning initiatives. At the local level, it implements recommendations from the Perkasie Borough Comprehensive Plan (2014) and the Open Space Plan (2010). At the county level, it supports the Bucks County

Comprehensive Plan (2011) and the Bucks County Open Space and Greenways Plan (2011), while also furthering the Bucks County Bicycle Master Plan (2012) by expanding greenway and trail connections. At the state level, it advances the goals of the Pennsylvania Statewide Outdoor Recreation Plan (2020–2024), which prioritizes accessible active transportation and expanded trail networks.

Regionally, the project reflects the priorities of the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission's Connections 2040 Plan, which emphasizes multimodal connectivity, sustainability, and livable communities. Importantly, Perkasie Borough also worked collaboratively with six neighboring municipalities, the Pennsylvania Environmental Council (PEC), and professional planners and engineers to prepare the Liberty Bell Trail Feasibility Study Update in 2020. That study underscored the trail's regional importance and identified this specific link as a critical gap to be addressed.

Finally, the project has been formally recognized within regional transportation planning frameworks. It has been submitted to the Bucks County Planning Commission for inclusion in the Bucks County Transportation Improvement Inventory (BCTII), which helps prioritize projects for funding and implementation. This recognition ensures that the project is considered within county and regional planning initiatives and underscores its importance both as a local connector and as a segment of the regionally significant Liberty Bell Trail.

In short, the Park Avenue Pedestrian & Stormwater Improvement Project strengthens local land use objectives, complements Perkasie's community identity, and fulfills long-standing planning goals at the municipal, county, regional, and state levels. It represents a vital step toward advancing active transportation connectivity while reinforcing Perkasie's role as a walkable, economically vibrant, and regionally connected community.

Collaboration with stakeholders

The project reflects extensive stakeholder engagement and multi-municipal collaboration. Beginning in 2021, Perkasie Borough initiated public meetings with Park Avenue residents, presenting concept sketches and gathering feedback on sidewalks, stormwater management, and access. Residents expressed concerns about flooding, cut-through traffic, truck traffic, and right-of-way, leading to compromises on easements, buffering, and design features that shaped the project now proposed. At the regional level, Perkasie partnered with the Pennsylvania Environmental Council and six neighboring municipalities—Quakertown, Sellersville, Telford, West Rockhill, East Rockhill, Hilltown, and Richland—to update the Liberty Bell Trail Feasibility Study in 2020. This effort, funded through DCNR and DCED grant programs, required broad public participation, including workshops, steering committees, and key-person interviews. The resulting plan identified Park Avenue as a missing link critical to advancing the trail network.

These collaborative steps ensure that the project is not only locally supported but regionally aligned. By integrating community input with regional planning priorities, the Borough has built consensus and demonstrated the cooperative framework needed for successful delivery of a project of this scale.

Leveraging of other projects or funds

The Park Avenue Pedestrian & Stormwater Improvement Project demonstrates strong financial leverage through a combination of federal and local commitments. In 2023 Perkasie Borough worked with Congressman Fitzpatrick's office to secure \$2,058,180 in Congressionally Directed Community Project Funding. In April 2025, Perkasie Borough executed the contract with HUD, completed a full Environmental Review of the project, and submitted a project Action Plan to HUD for review. The Environmental Review determined that the project is EXEMPT, and the Action Plan was approved by HUD meaning that these CPF funds are ready for draw down against project expenses. This provides a secure federal foundation for the project.

Per the attached EOPC, Perkasie Borough intends to use \$311,217 of CPF funding for Pre-Construction and the balance of \$1,746,963 for Construction. Perkasie Borough will set aside \$139,580 in Liquid Fuel funding. The Perkasie Borough Electric Company will provide labor as in-kind match to relocate electric

poles, and the balance of the \$148,000 needed to cover Utilities and Right of Way costs will be set aside in the Borough's General Fund.

The approach demonstrates fiscal responsibility and readiness to deliver. The Borough is not relying on a single source of funding but has built a coordinated package that has secured federal investment while strategically aligning local resources.

This application for Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside (TASA) funding is an essential part of that strategy.

Cost Estimating

The project cost estimate was developed and reviewed by licensed professional engineers with extensive experience preparing estimates for PennDOT projects, including roadway, sidewalk, and traffic signal improvements. The estimate relies on unit costs derived from two reliable sources: the ECMS Bid Item History and recently awarded contractor bid tabulations. This approach ensures that the estimate reflects both historical pricing trends and current market realities.

Given the volatility of material and labor costs in recent years, this method provides the most accurate and defensible basis for estimating. By grounding the unit prices in PennDOT's own historical data and validating them against live market bids, the Borough and its engineering team can demonstrate confidence that the proposed budget is realistic, competitive, and sufficient to deliver the project scope. This methodology aligns with PennDOT best practices and ensures fiscal responsibility in the use of federal and state transportation funds.

Project Value

The project represents exceptional value by meeting local connectivity needs while completing a regionally significant trail corridor. It closes the final 1/3-mile gap of the Liberty Bell Trail in Perkasie, ensuring continuity for a route that will ultimately connect Norristown to Allentown and tie into the Schuylkill River Trail. Locally, it links northwest neighborhoods to civic, cultural, and recreational assets—including the Borough pool, library, amphitheater, and downtown core—without reliance on vehicles. Unique challenges underscore the project's significance. The steep 70-foot grade change requires retaining walls and safety fencing, and chronic flooding necessitates curbing and stormwater controls. These elements increase costs but are essential to long-term safety and functionality. The economic case is equally strong. The project brings tourists and trail users within walking distance of Perkasie's growing downtown, improves property values, and strengthens business retention and attraction. As a midpoint between Philadelphia and Allentown, Perkasie is strategically positioned to benefit from expanded trail traffic. By combining regional trail connectivity, local access, safety upgrades, and economic benefit, this project delivers extraordinary return for statewide TA Set-Aside funding.

Safety

The Park Avenue Pedestrian & Stormwater Improvement Project directly addresses a documented safety gap in Perkasie Borough. Currently, no sidewalks exist along W. Park Avenue between Ridge Road and Jefferson Drive, forcing pedestrians and cyclists to share a 20-foot-wide cartway with more than 5,700 vehicles per day. Combined with steep grades, sharp curves, and deteriorated pavement, this creates unsafe and inaccessible conditions, particularly for residents with mobility challenges. Research underscores the danger: FHWA studies show that sidewalks can prevent up to 88% of pedestrian crashes on roadways without facilities. By introducing a sidewalk network with ADA-compliant curb ramps and crossings, the project provides immediate, measurable safety improvements. Sharrows will be added at closer intervals than federal minimums, enhancing driver awareness of cyclists and reinforcing shared-road expectations.

Residents have repeatedly raised concerns about speeding, cut-through traffic, and stormwater washouts that push debris into travel lanes. Addressing these hazards directly, the project integrates curbing,

drainage improvements, and bicycle-safe inlets that reduce flooding and protect all users. Collectively, these measures transform a hazardous walking route into a safe, reliable active-transportation corridor.

Project Delivery

Perkasie Borough anticipates utilizing its long-standing municipal engineer, Gilmore & Associates, Inc. (G&A), for the design and permitting of the Park Avenue Pedestrian & Stormwater Improvement Project. G&A has extensive experience in delivering PennDOT-funded projects and has worked closely with the Borough for many years on transportation and infrastructure improvements. Their demonstrated success in meeting PennDOT design and permitting requirements, combined with their familiarity with Borough procedures, positions this project for efficient and timely delivery.

Conceptual layout plans have already been prepared by G&A and served as the foundation for the project's preliminary cost estimates. These designs reflect both the technical requirements of the corridor and the feedback received during community consultations, ensuring that the project is practical, context-sensitive, and informed by local priorities.

The project will require right-of-way acquisition to accommodate construction of retaining walls and modifications to the existing traffic signal at Ridge Road and W. Park Avenue. Approximately seven properties are anticipated to be impacted. In several cases, this process will be streamlined by formal acceptance of right-of-way that was previously offered for dedication through earlier land development plans. Coordination with affected property owners has already begun and the Borough aims to finalize agreements in the near term.

Utility coordination is also underway, as existing poles and hydrants within the corridor must be relocated to accommodate new sidewalks and stormwater improvements. Borough staff and G&A have initiated early discussions with utility providers to ensure this work is integrated into the construction schedule. No railroad involvement is anticipated within the project area.

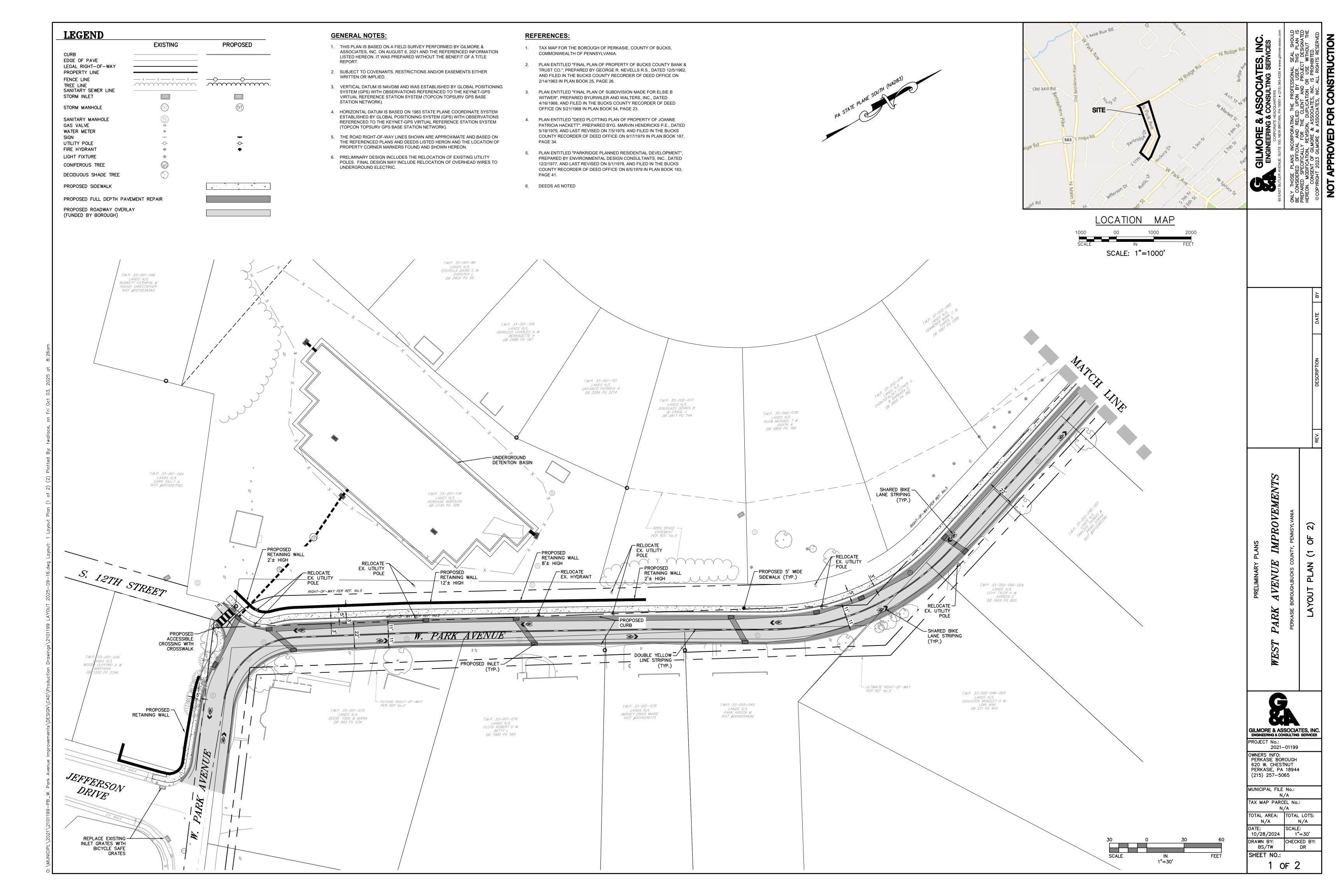
With G&A's prior involvement in conceptual planning, their proven record of delivering PennDOT projects, and the Borough's proactive approach to right-of-way and utility coordination, the project team is well positioned to deliver these improvements on time and within scope. Perkasie Borough's long history of successfully managing federally and state-funded projects further demonstrates its ability to oversee this project to completion.

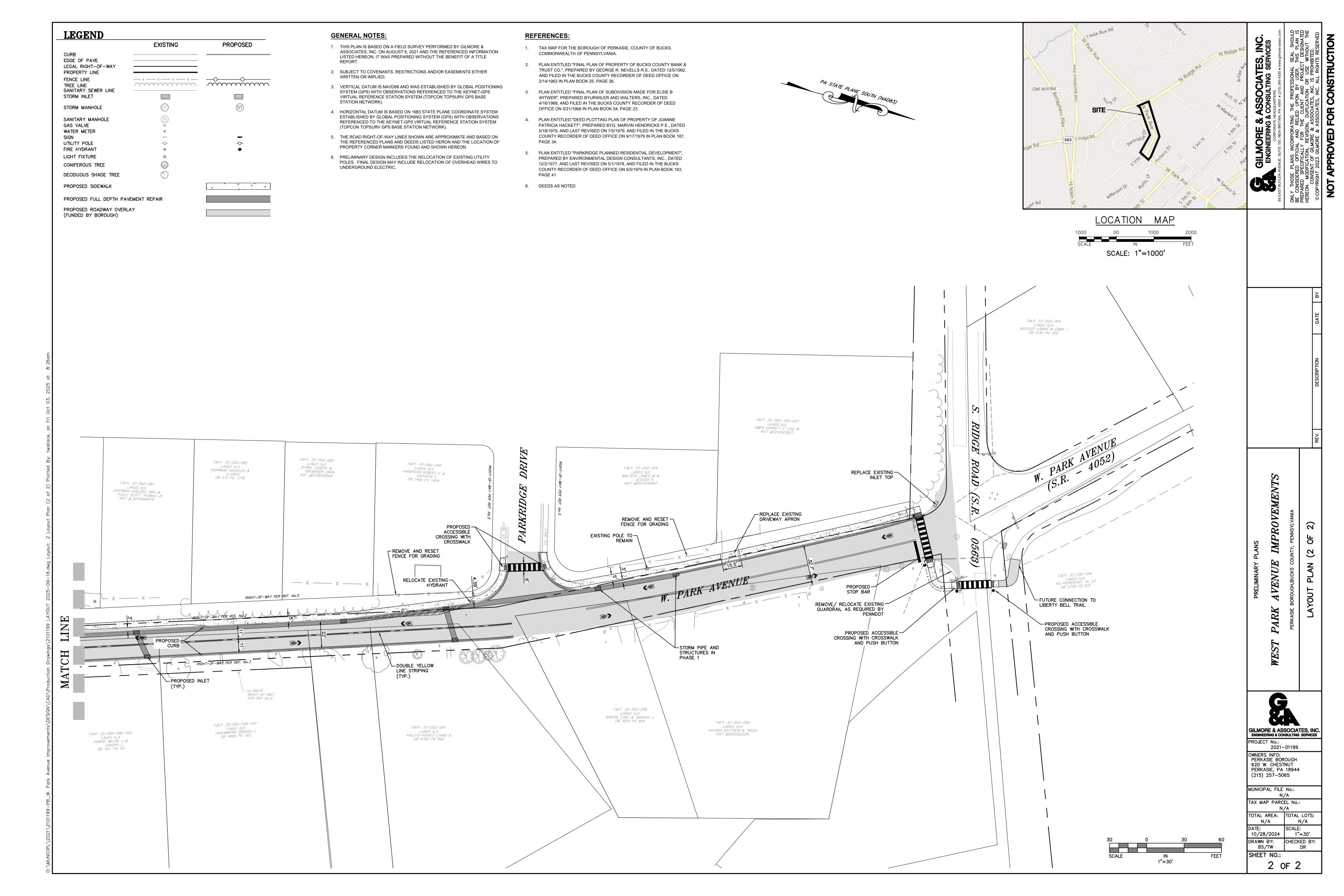
PennDoT Connects environmental screening

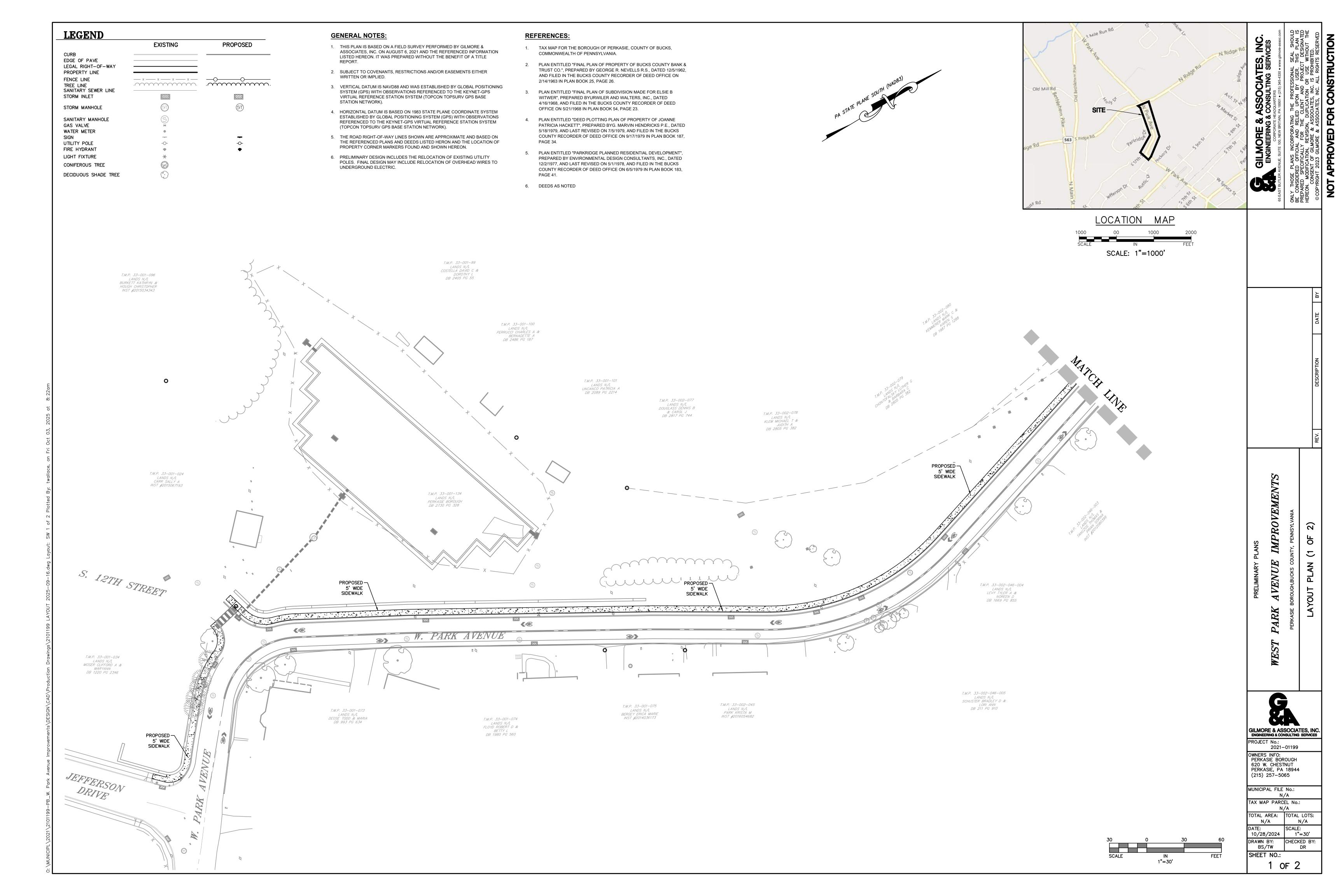
An Environmental Review was completed in 2025 as part of the CPF HUD federal funding requirements for the project and determined the project to be EXEMPT, with no anticipated impacts to environmental, historical, or cultural resources. While PennDOT's One Map indicates wetlands near the project area, the proposed improvements remain within the existing cartway and right-of-way, eliminating the potential for direct impacts. Standard erosion and sedimentation controls will be implemented during construction to ensure protection of surrounding resources.

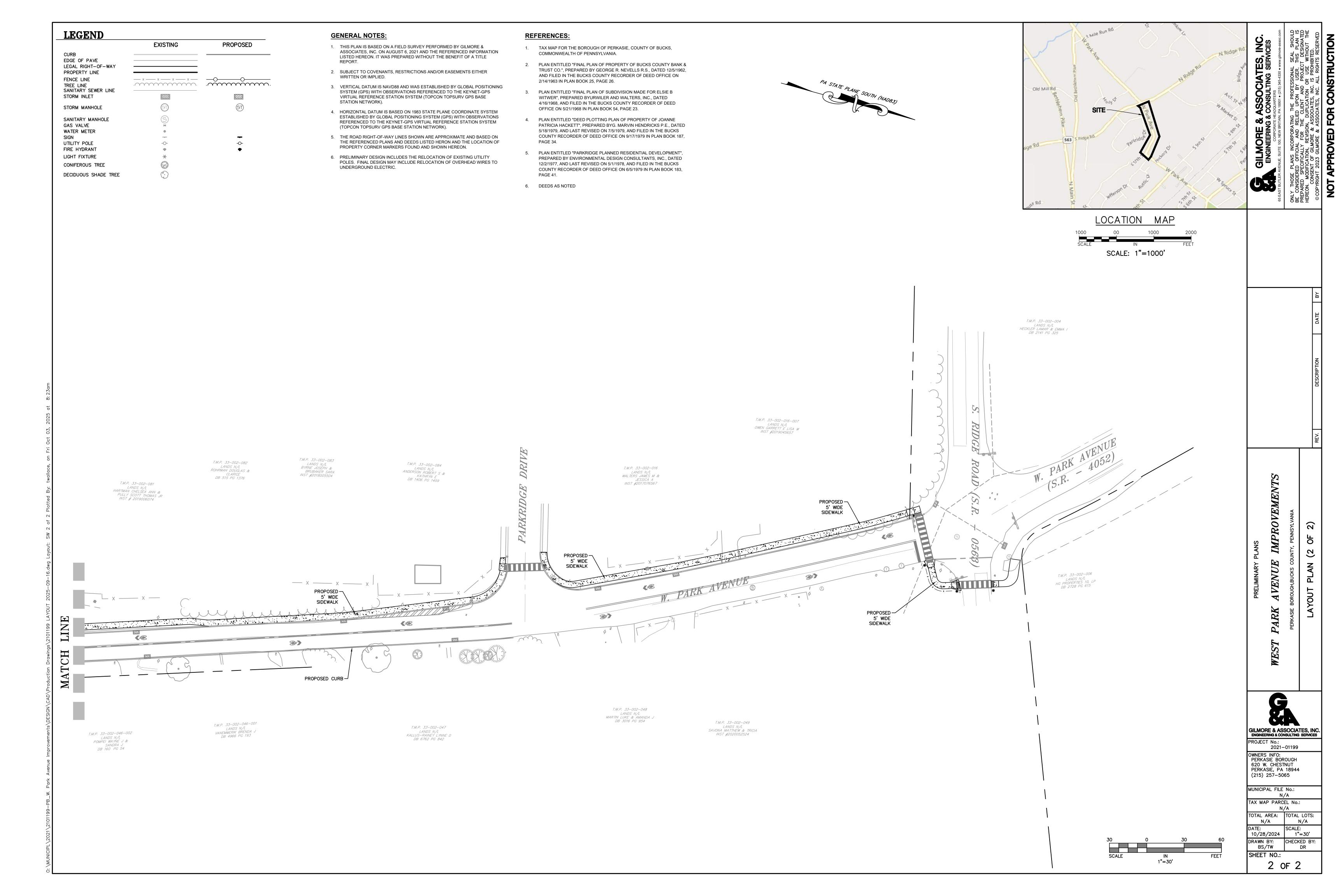
With respect to right-of-way, the project requires limited acquisitions related to retaining wall placement and intersection improvements. Approximately seven properties are anticipated to be affected, though several of these involve the Borough formally accepting ultimate rights-of-way offered through prior land development plans. The Borough has proactively begun discussions with impacted property owners, with the goal of completing acquisition and dedication agreements well in advance of construction. Utility coordination is also underway. The relocation of several utility poles and fire hydrants is necessary to accommodate the new sidewalk and retaining wall construction. The Borough and its consulting engineers have initiated coordination with the Perkasie Borough Electric Utility to sequence this work in a manner that minimizes disruption and ensures compatibility with the final design.

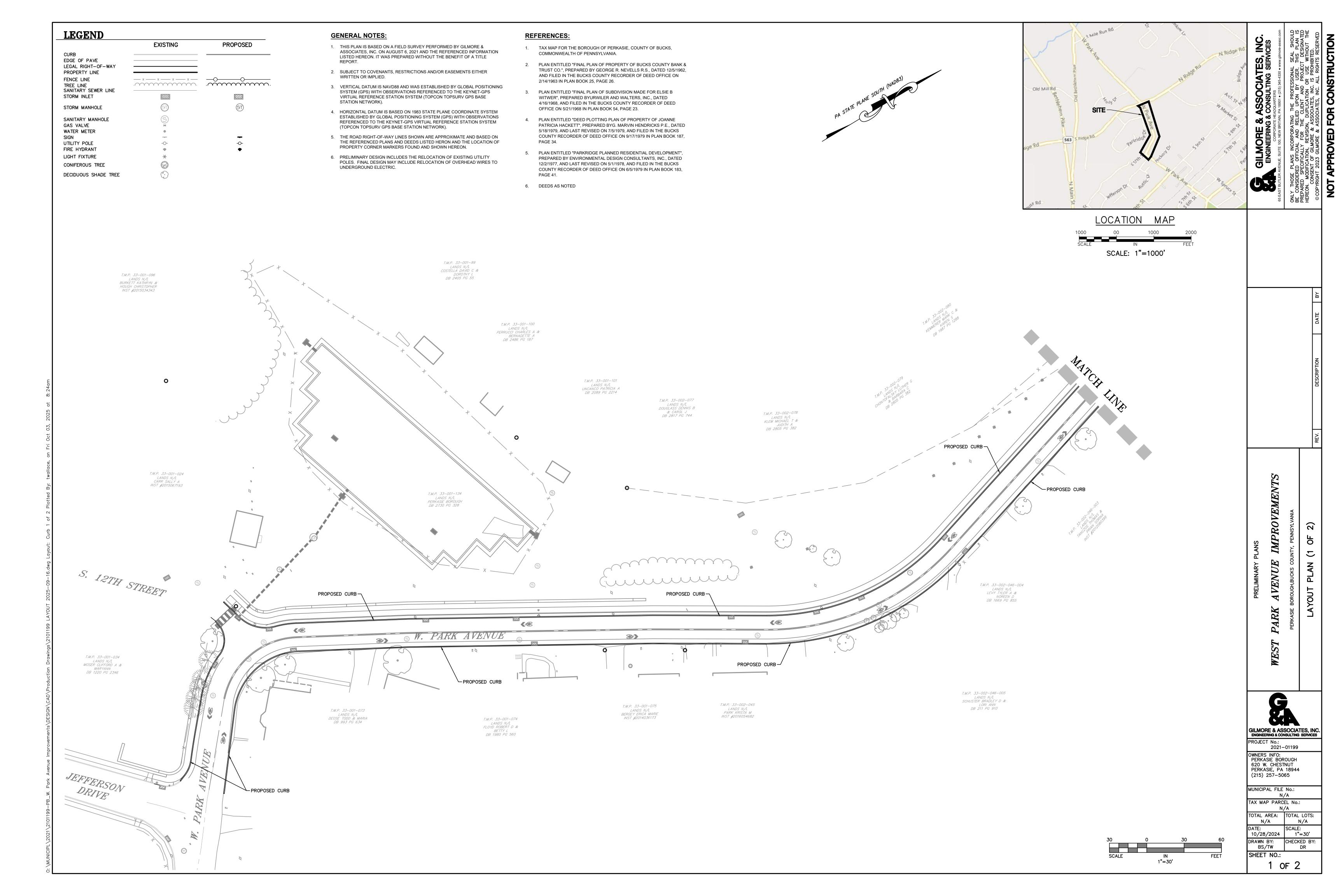
Together, these efforts demonstrate that the Borough has taken a proactive, coordinated approach to environmental clearance, property rights, and utility adjustments—positioning the project for a smooth transition into the final design and construction phases. Perkasie Borough and its consulting engineer, Gilmore & Associates, have successfully managed ROW acquisition and utility coordination on multiple PennDOT- and federally funded projects, providing confidence in the Borough's ability to deliver this project on schedule.

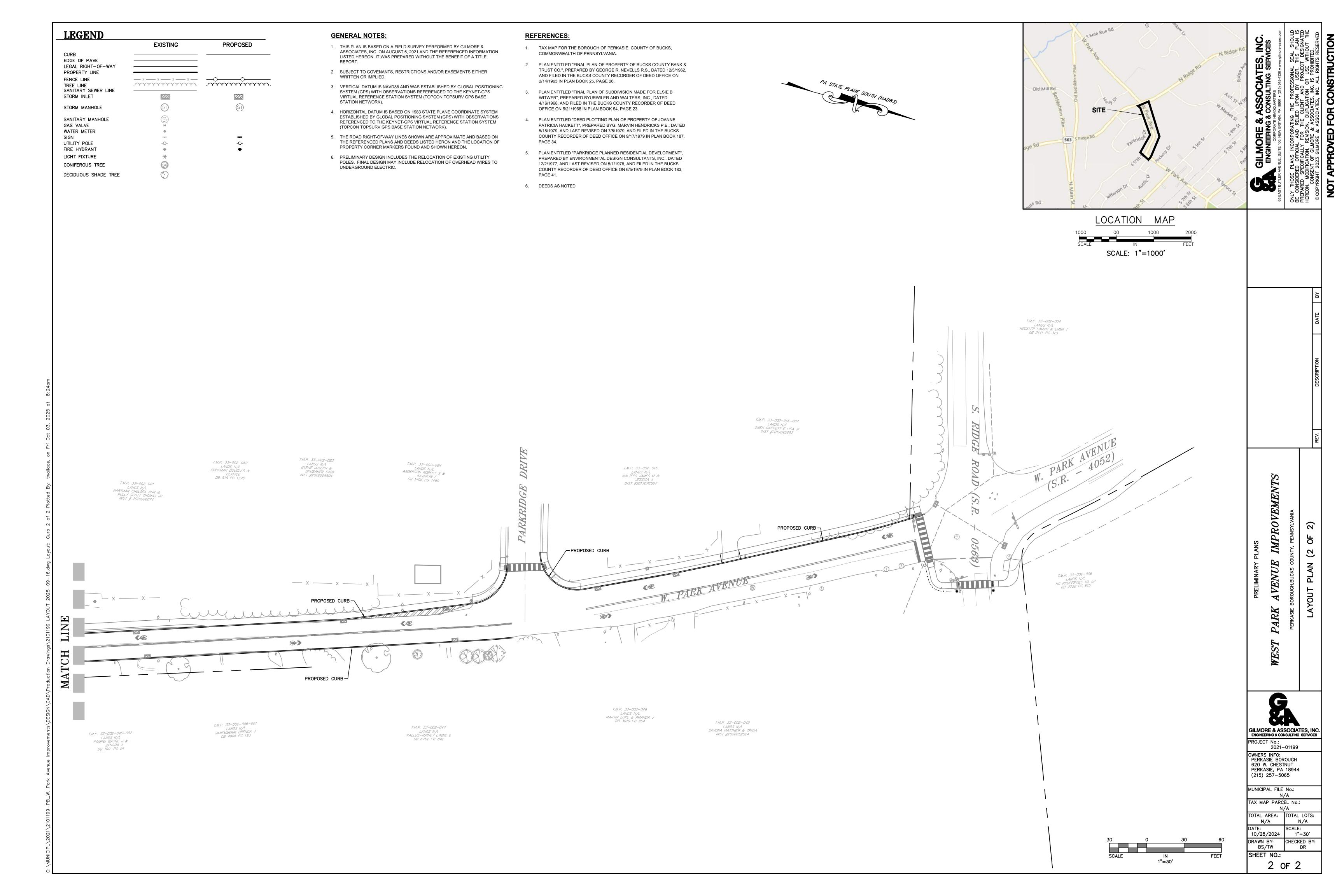


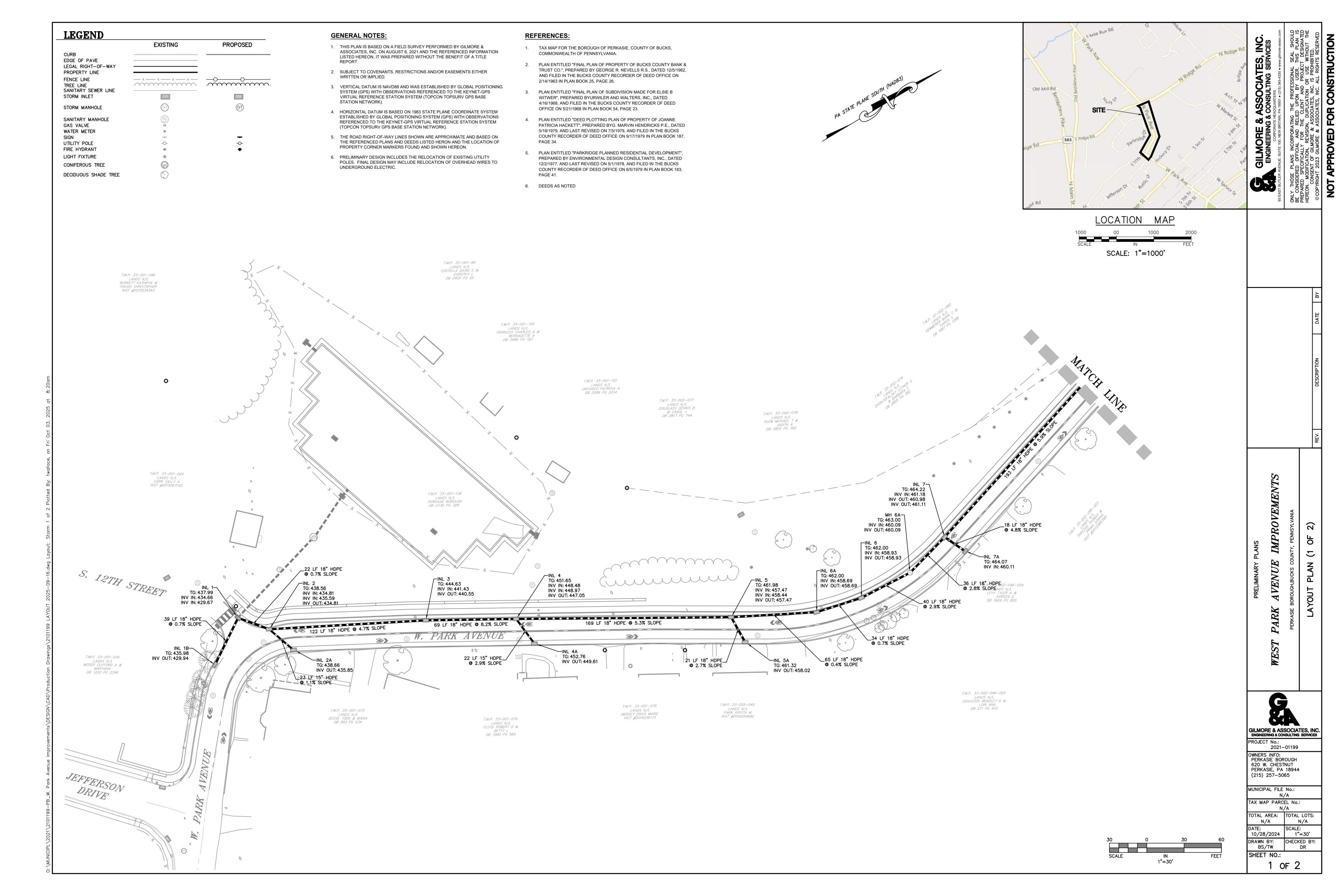


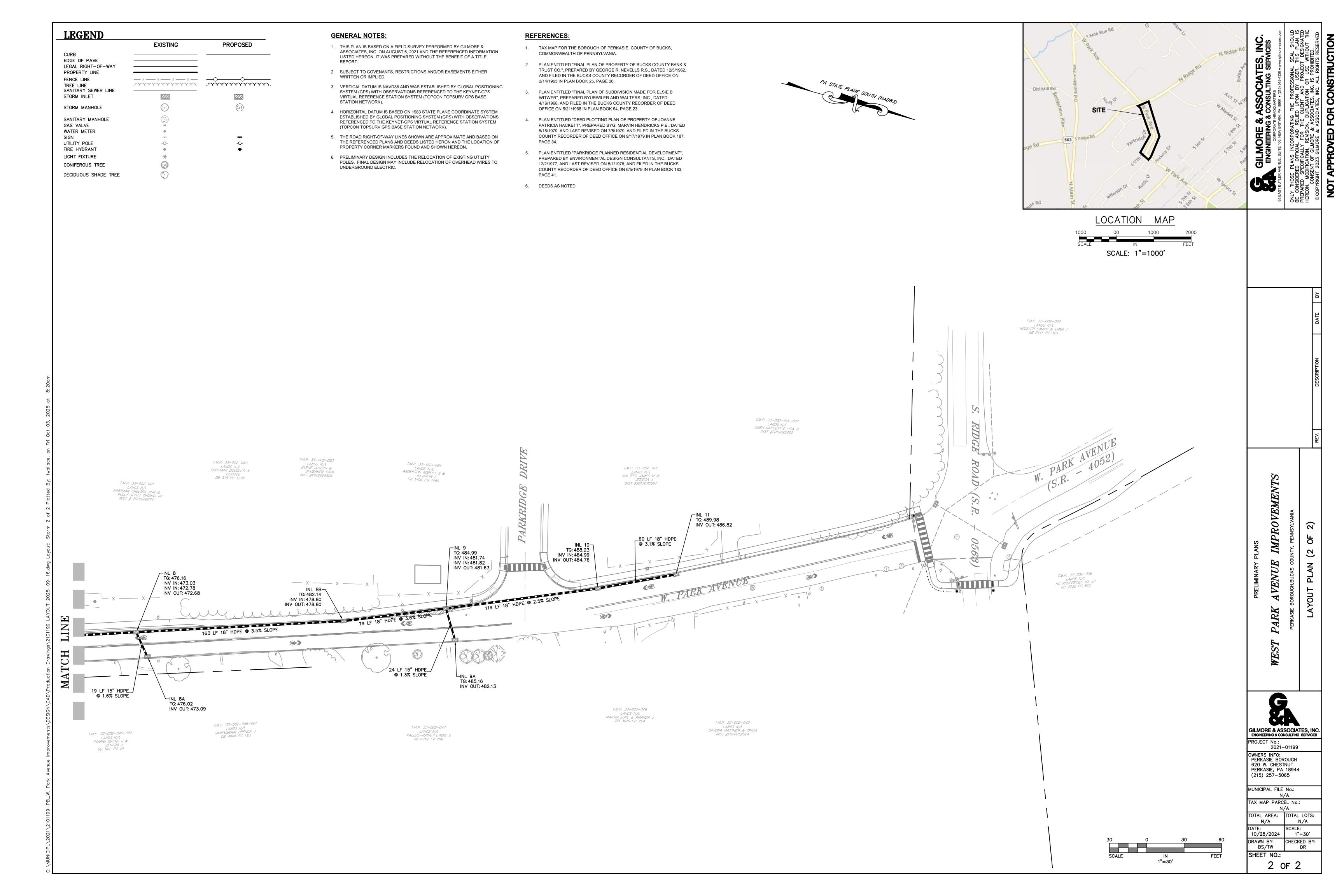


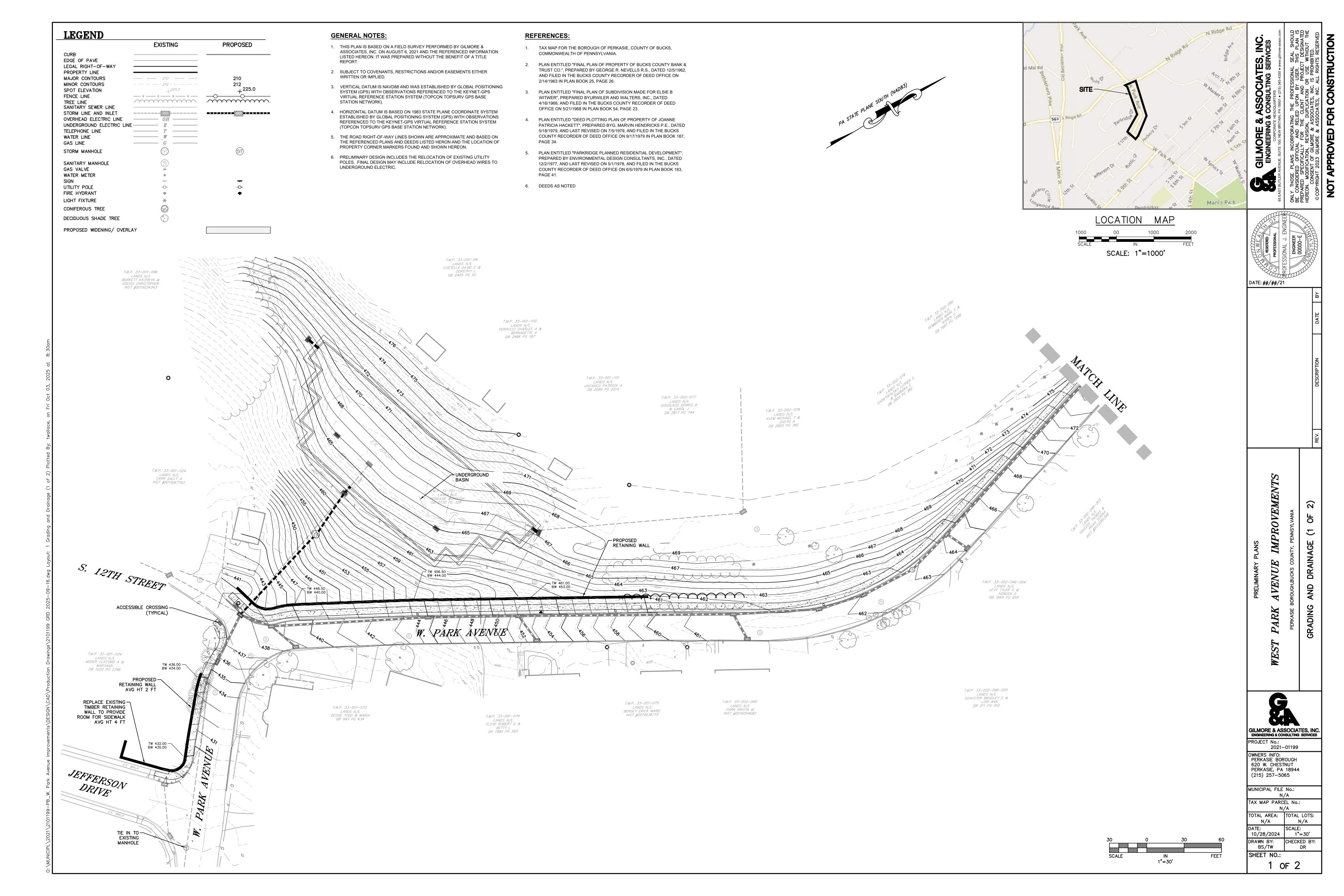


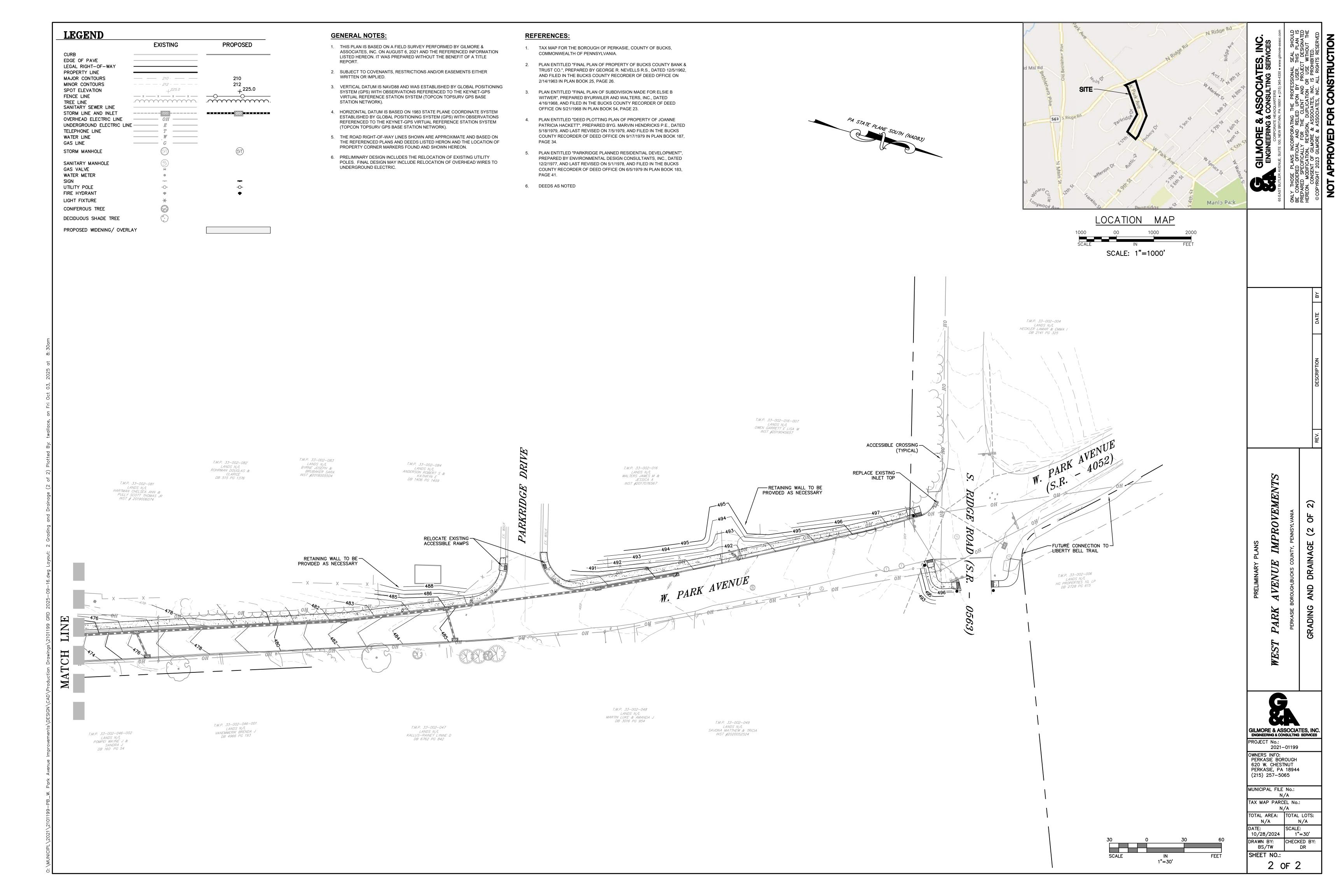


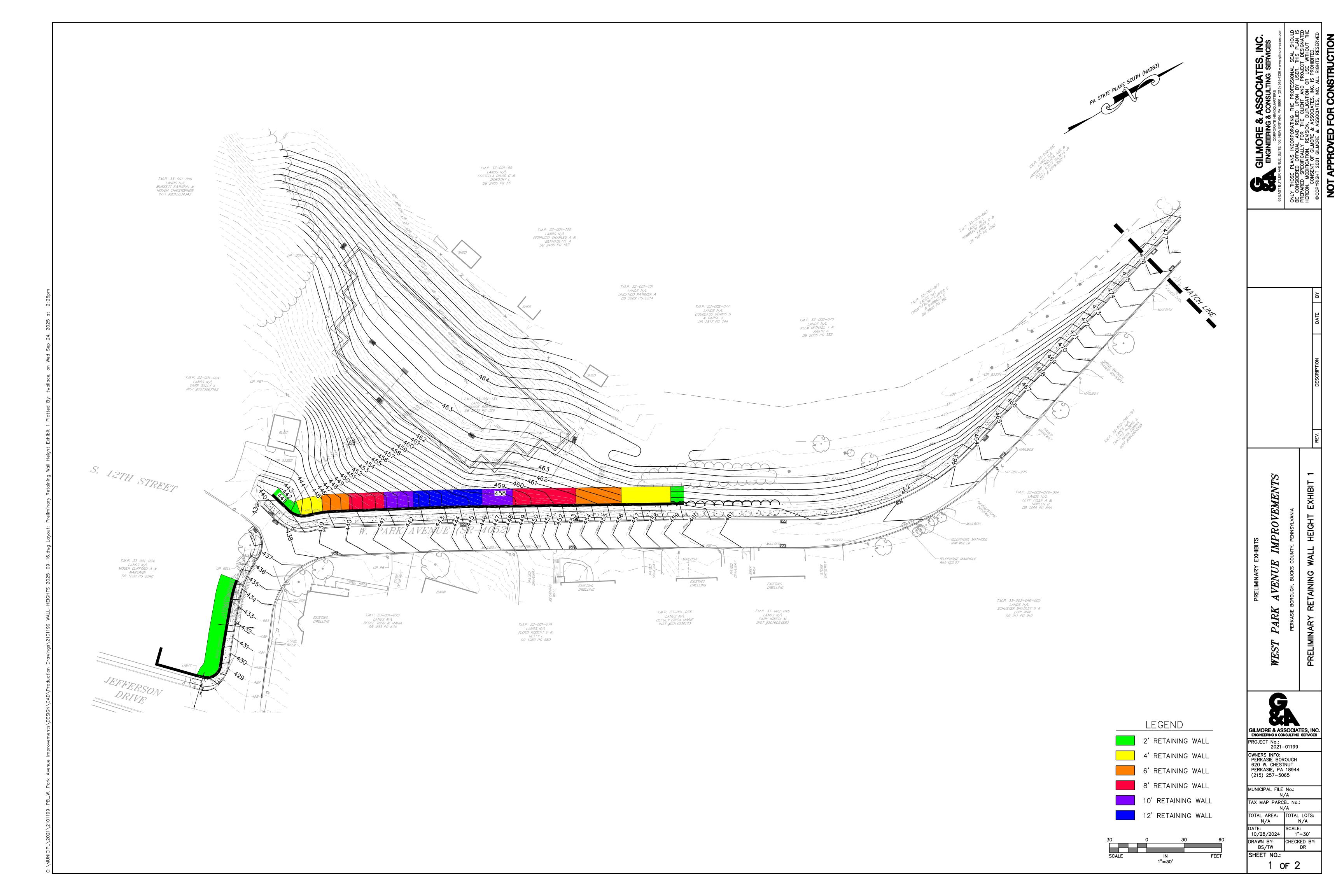


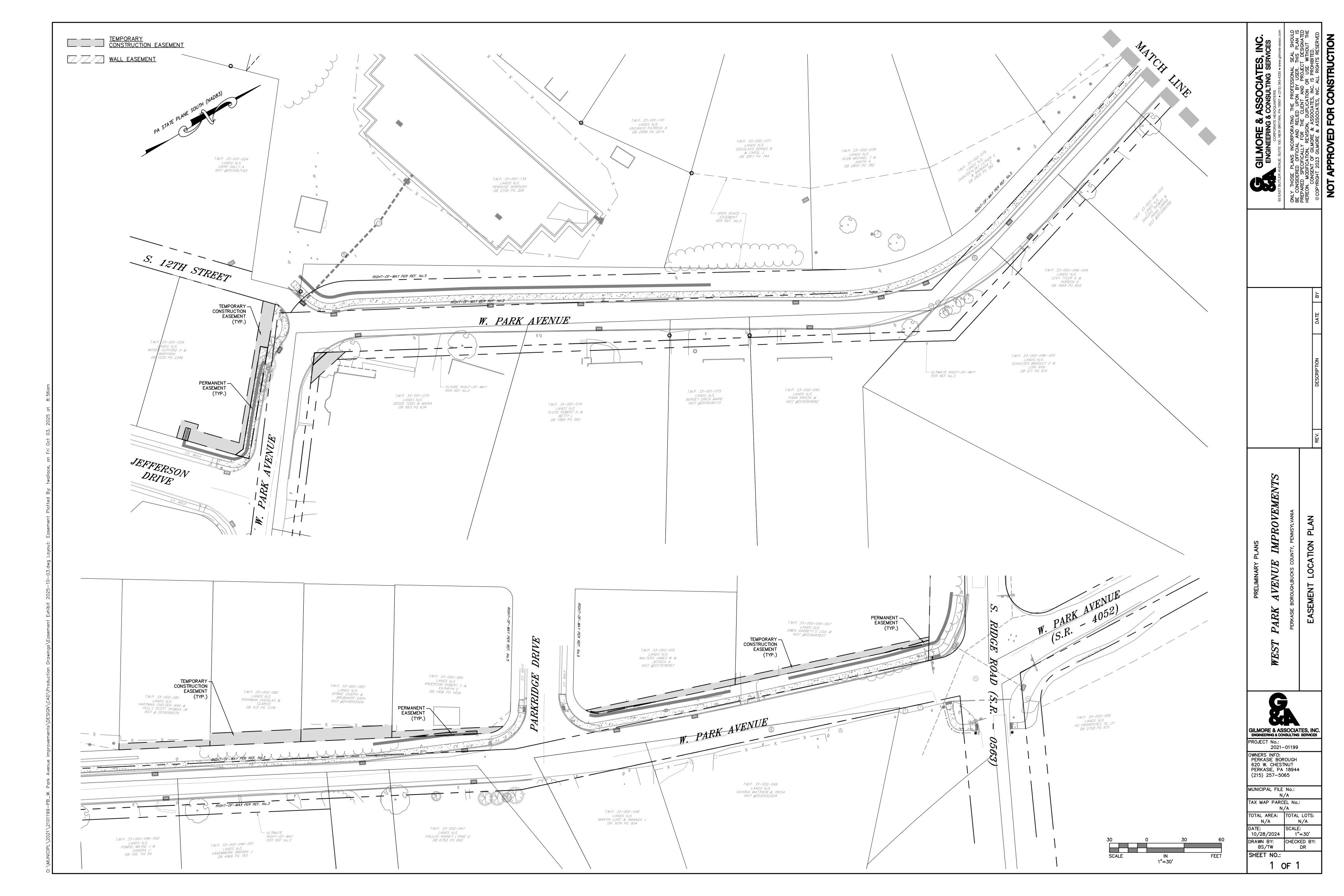


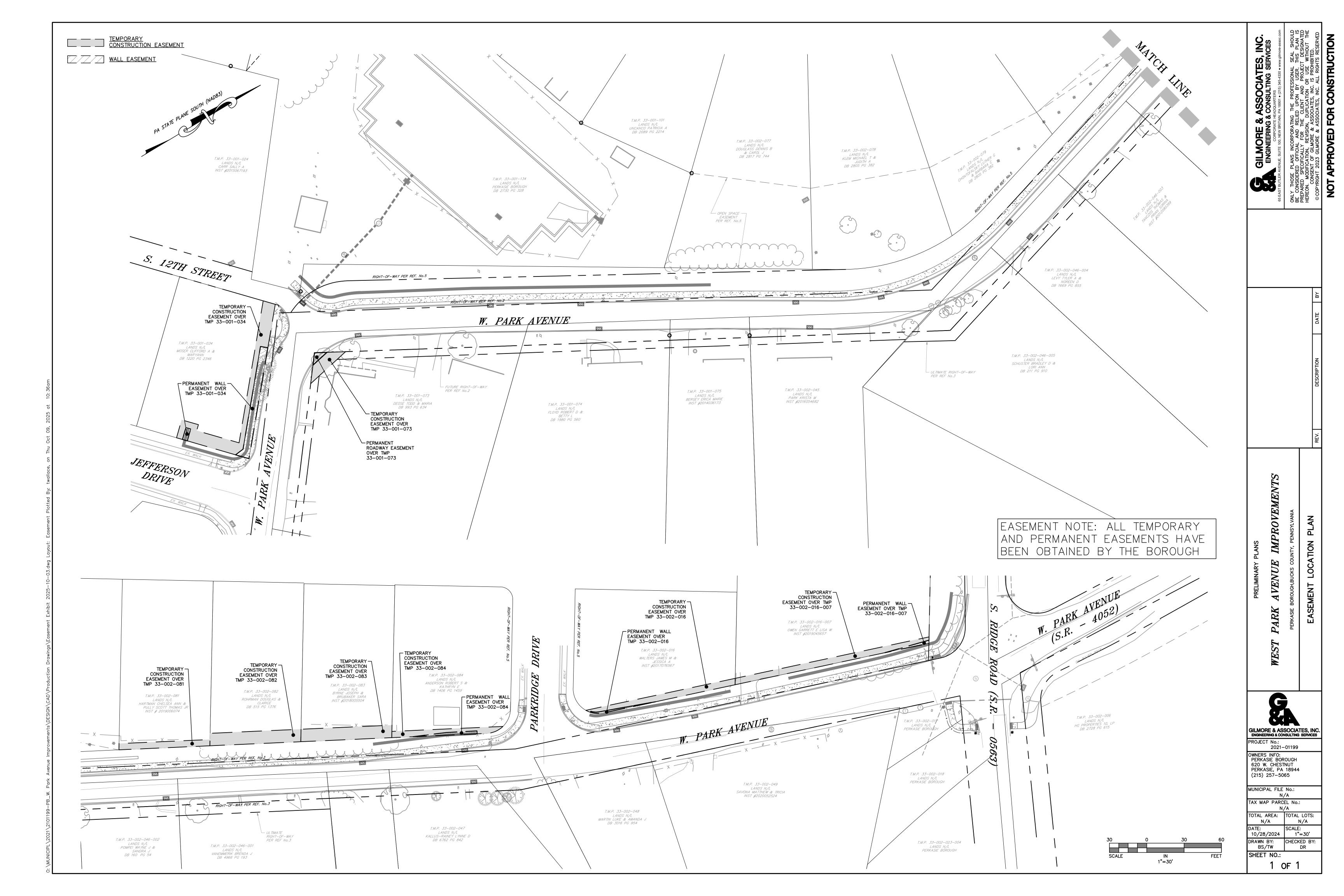

Park Avenue Neighborhood Meeting May 10, 2021

The meeting was held at the Menlo Park Pavilions at 5:00pm.

Attendees/Presenters included:

- Andrea Coaxum, Borough Manager
- Jim Purcell, Council Vice President (Ward 2)
- Steve Rose, Council Member (Ward 2)
- Jeff Tulone, Director of Public Works
- Doug Rossino, Borough Engineer
- Judy Stern Goldstein, Borough Planner

Approximately 17 residents also attended (sign-in sheet is attached)

Andrea Coaxum and Judy Stern Goldstein gave a brief presentation about the potential project and explained that it is in the conceptual planning phase. The purpose of the meeting was to obtain feedback, input, and comments from residents that would be potentially impacted by the project.

Concerns / Discussion Items included:

- Overall concerns:
 - Stormwater management and flooding were major issues. Several residents noted that stormwater flows down Park Avenue and has been a constant concern for many years. Frustration was expressed with the roadside ditches, water flowing into/onto properties, and icing in the winter. It was noted that vehicles get stuck in the ice and are not able to make it up the hill.
 - Request for Traffic Calming. Several residents expressed frustration with truck traffic navigating the steep hill and curving roadway. The amount and frequency of truck traffic were both noted as concerns, as was the speed of traffic in general. There was much discussion about potential reasons for truck traffic. One resident noted that a Dominoes truck uses Park Avenue on a regular basis. This was noted by the Borough and inquiries will be made to determine if the route could be changed.
 - Snow shoveling Several residents wanted to know if they would be responsible for snow shoveling for any new sidewalk.
 - Public water. One resident asked if this project (if it went through) would then create a situation in which she would be forced to connect to public water.
 - Wildlife. Several residents expressed concern with the existing wildlife present in the detention basin. Some were concerned and wanted to make sure the wildlife did not migrate into their properties and others were concerned that wildlife would have a safe place to relocate.
 - When asked, no residents present were opposed to a sidewalk along Park Avenue, if their concerns could be addressed.
 - When asked, no residents present were opposed to a switchback trail connecting Parkridge Drive to S. 12th Street.

Property-specific concerns included:

- 280 Parkview concerned with snowplowing. Currently, the plows bury the corner, including the fire hydrant along Park Avenue.
- 276 Parkview concerned that any improvements along Park Avenue might have a negative impact on their existing row of mature arborvitae.
- 270 Parkview concerned about the steep bank at the rear of their property and wanted to make sure that any sidewalk along Park Avenue would not be on top of the bank. Would prefer the sidewalk be closer in elevation to the roadway.
- 268 Parkview concerned that there is no curb reveal along Parkview at their property and that stormwater runs down the road and into/through their property.
- 264 Parkview concerned with his existing shed. Does not want to have to move/relocate it if the existing basin is redesigned.
- 260 Parkview stated that they do not want any trees to be planted as part of this project that would interfere with their view. They currently have an excellent view and they want to make sure that it remains uninterrupted.
- 1225 Park Avenue very concerned with current flooding/drainage issues along Park Avenue.
 Stated that flooding (due to stormwater runoff) is a major concern for 1225, 1225, 1217, and
 1213 Park Avenue. Stated that prior paving projects caused stormwater to flow into their garage.
- 1217 Park Avenue concerned with stormwater / flooding. Stated that stormwater runs down Park Avenue and doesn't follow the road when it turns the water then runs into their property. Stormwater ponds in their front yard and then runs to rear of property as cars drive along the roadway.
- 1213 Park Avenue concerned with stormwater / flooding. Stormwater runoff flows down the road and then ponds in her front yard.

Meeting began at 5:30 pm and ended at approximately 7:15 pm. Sign in sheet was completed by attendees and is included in the file.

The beginning of the meeting consisted of a project overview by Andrea and Judy, followed by a description the engineering design by Doug. Project timeline and possible funding through grants for the Liberty Bell Trail and other sources were also discussed but it was noted that no funding has been secured at this time.

It was also discussed that the switchback trail originally proposed between 254 and 256 Park Ridge Drive is unlikely to be installed unless there is significant community support due to the additional cost and grading challenges to install a trail at this location. The proposed sidewalk along W. Park Ave will serve as the primary pedestrian route for residents from the Park Ridge and Cedar Ridge Developments and from the Liberty Bell Trail connection at S. Ridge Road to the Borough's Town Center.

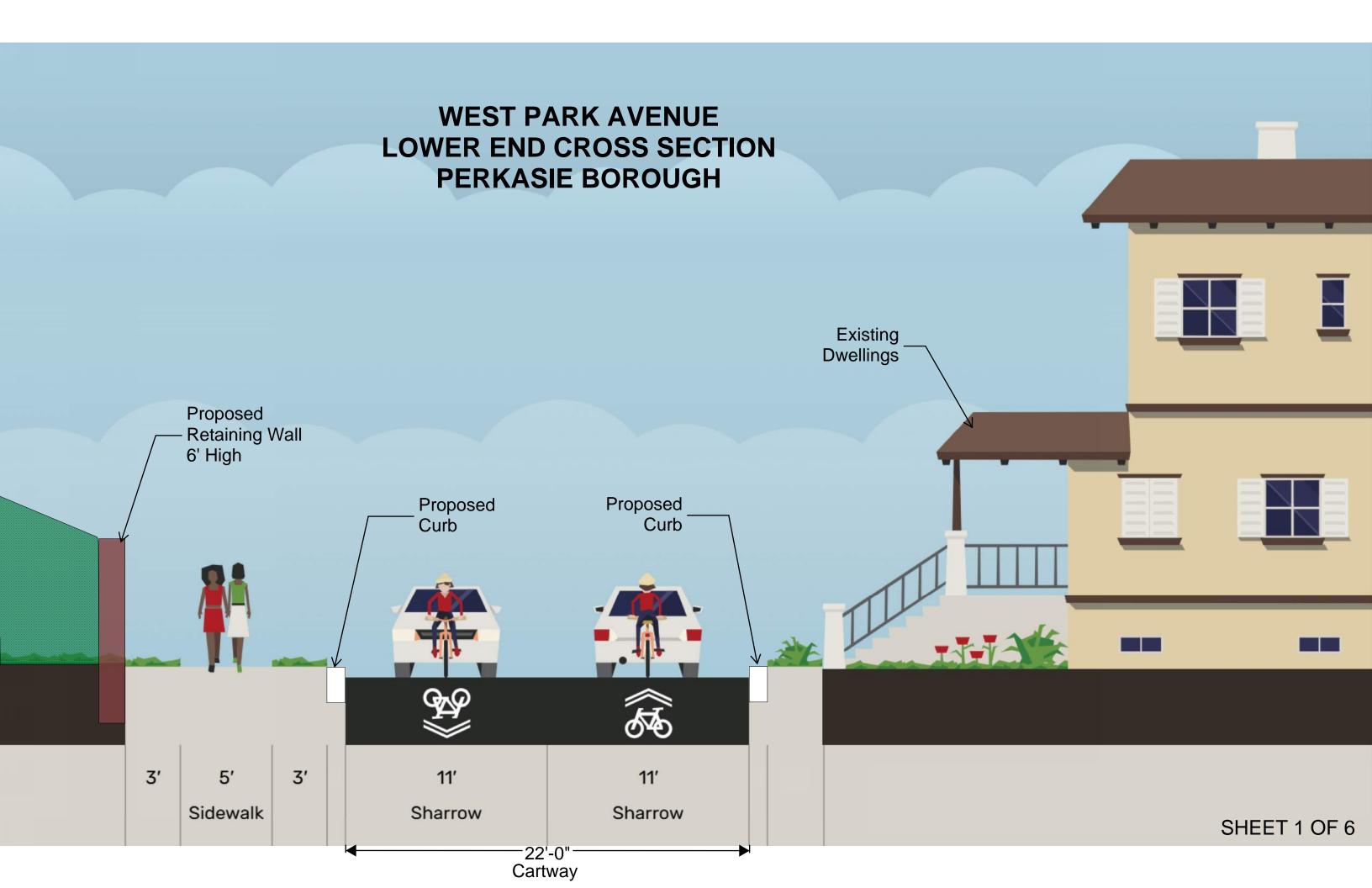
Concerns / Discussion Items included:

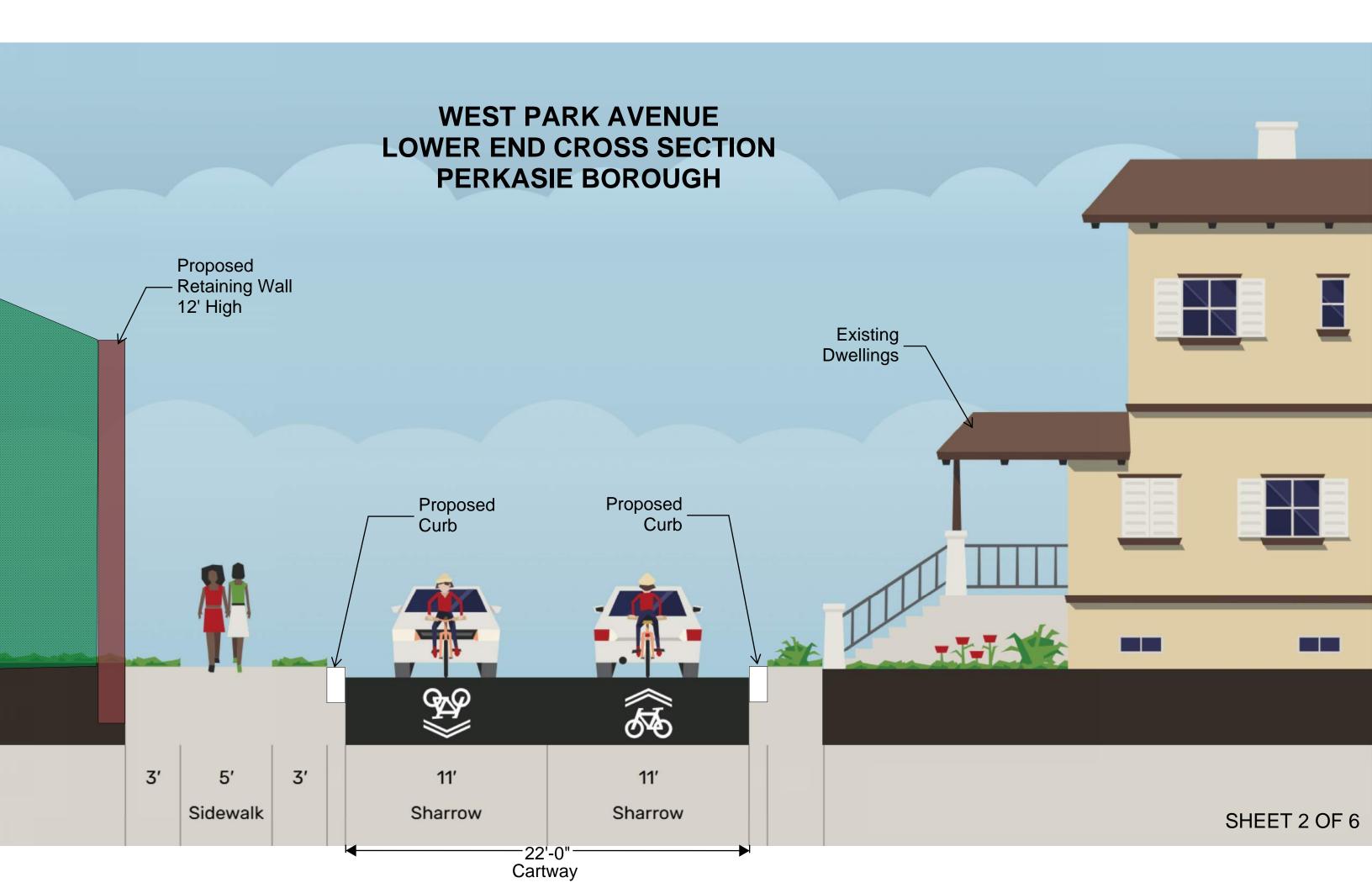
 A majority of the residents at the meeting expressed concerns related to the speed of traffic on Park Avenue and large truck traffic using the road as a cut through. Noise from truck traffic is also a major concern.

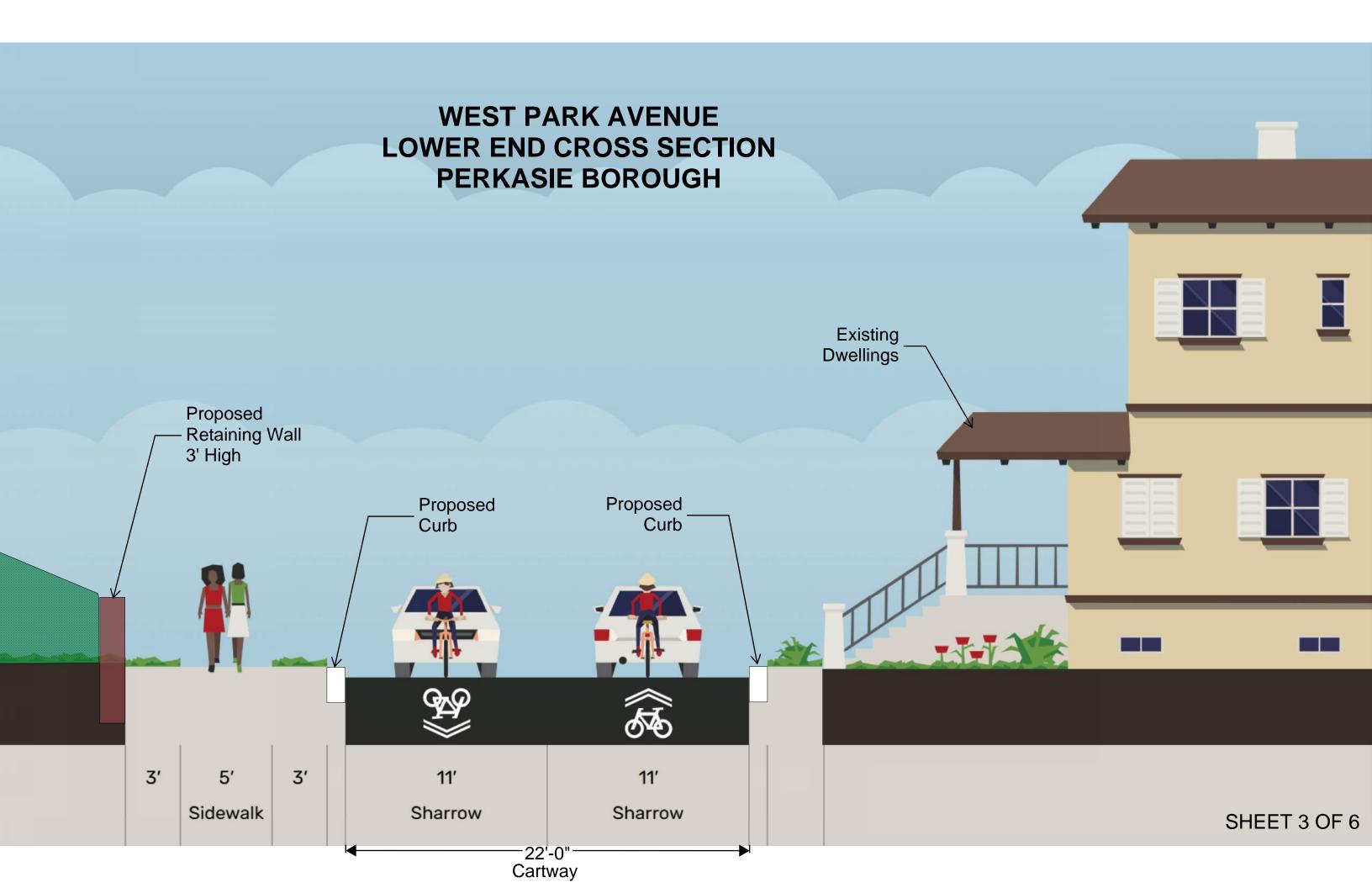
- The owner at 217 Park Avenue stated that she always sees vehicles not stopping on Park Ave when the bus stops to pick up/ drop off her child.
- Residents requested stop signs, flashing red lights and additional signage to slow traffic down and restrict access to large trucks.
- Additional traffic calming measures such as speed humps were suggested but Doug did not recommend speed humps due to the grade of the roadway, stating they could result in greater traffic accidents.
- It was also noted by the Residents that traffic down Park Avenue and through the intersecting streets do not obey the traffic signs/signals, creating hazardous driving conditions during early morning commutes.
- Andrea said she would contact the police about monitoring the speed of vehicles on Park Avenue and also having the police department conduct a speed study to determine the average speed of vehicles along Park Ave.
- The Borough will also investigate other traffic calming measures to address these concerns.
- The owner at 278 Park Ridge Ave expressed continued concerns regarding the removal of the Arborvitae screen they have along the rear of their property that fronts on Park Avenue.
 - They stated that the trees provide both a visual and sound barrier from the truck traffic along Park Avenue.
 - It was determined prior to the meeting that the trees are outside of the right-of-way and on their property.
 - They acknowledged that the trees would likely need to come down as part of the proposed improvements and Judy confirmed that we would not be able to save these trees due to the sensitive nature of the tree roots.
 - The owner was agreeable to the idea of a replacement arborvitae buffer being provided by the Borough. New trees would only have a height between 8 to 10 feet but grow quickly. Andrea asked the owner to begin considering the type and location of a replacement buffer.
 - o It was discussed that the buffer could possibly be installed prior to the start of construction to allow the trees time to grow but the timeline was still open to discussion.
- Residents expressed concern over the height and location of the retaining walls. Doug
 noted that any wall exceeding 30 inches will have fall protection. He also noted that the
 grading from the rear of the homes along Park Ridge Drive to the retaining wall could be
 viewed from the road and from the homes along Park Ridge Drive which would not allow it
 to be used as a hiding spot/ hangout. Additional precautions may be necessary to prevent
 kids from walking on top of the wall.
- Residents on the southern side of Park Avenue were also concerned with stormwater runoff.
 Doug explained that the proposed roadway design included curb and inlets along Park
 Avenue which would capture the runoff from the roadway before it gets to their driveway.
 Also, the road would contain a crown to try and keep the upslope runoff on the north side of
 Park Avenue. The possibility of building up the driveways along the south side of Park
 Avenue to help keep drainage in the roadway was also briefly discussed with one resident.
- One resident expressed concern over the sidewalk/trail connection at the intersection of Park Avenue and Ridge Road. Doug noted that intersection improvements are forthcoming as part of the Liberty Bell Trail improvements to make the crossing at the intersection safer.
 - Residents also expressed concern over the speed of traffic along Park Avenue.
 Particularly where the speed drops from 35mph down to 25mph.
 - One resident noted that some vehicles use North Lane as a cut through to Park Avenue to avoid the traffic light at the intersection of Ridge Rd and Park Ave. She also stated that the vehicles cutting through speed down North Lane and do not stop for buses. Jeff

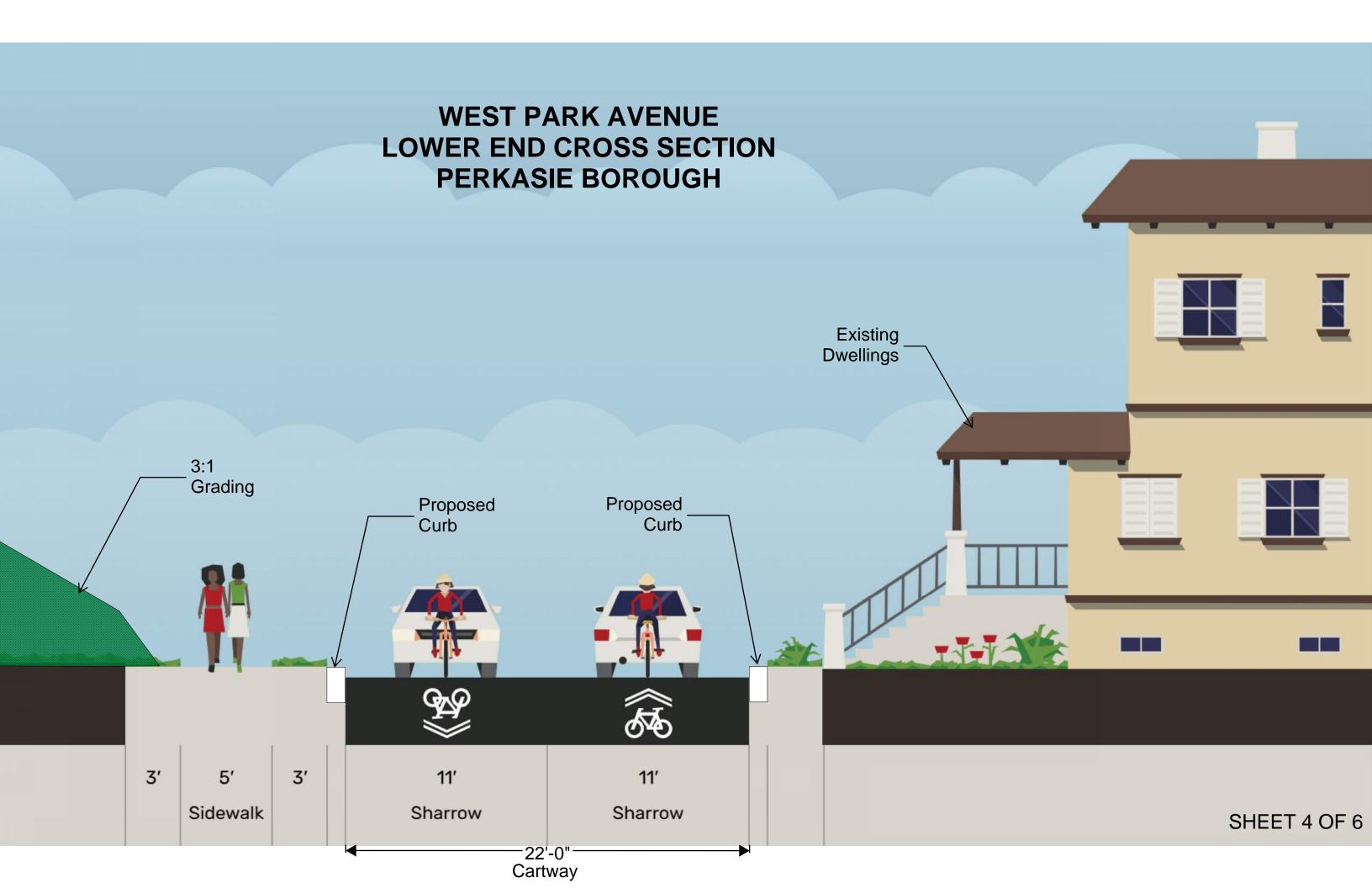
and Andrea said they would look into this issue and have the police monitor the situation.

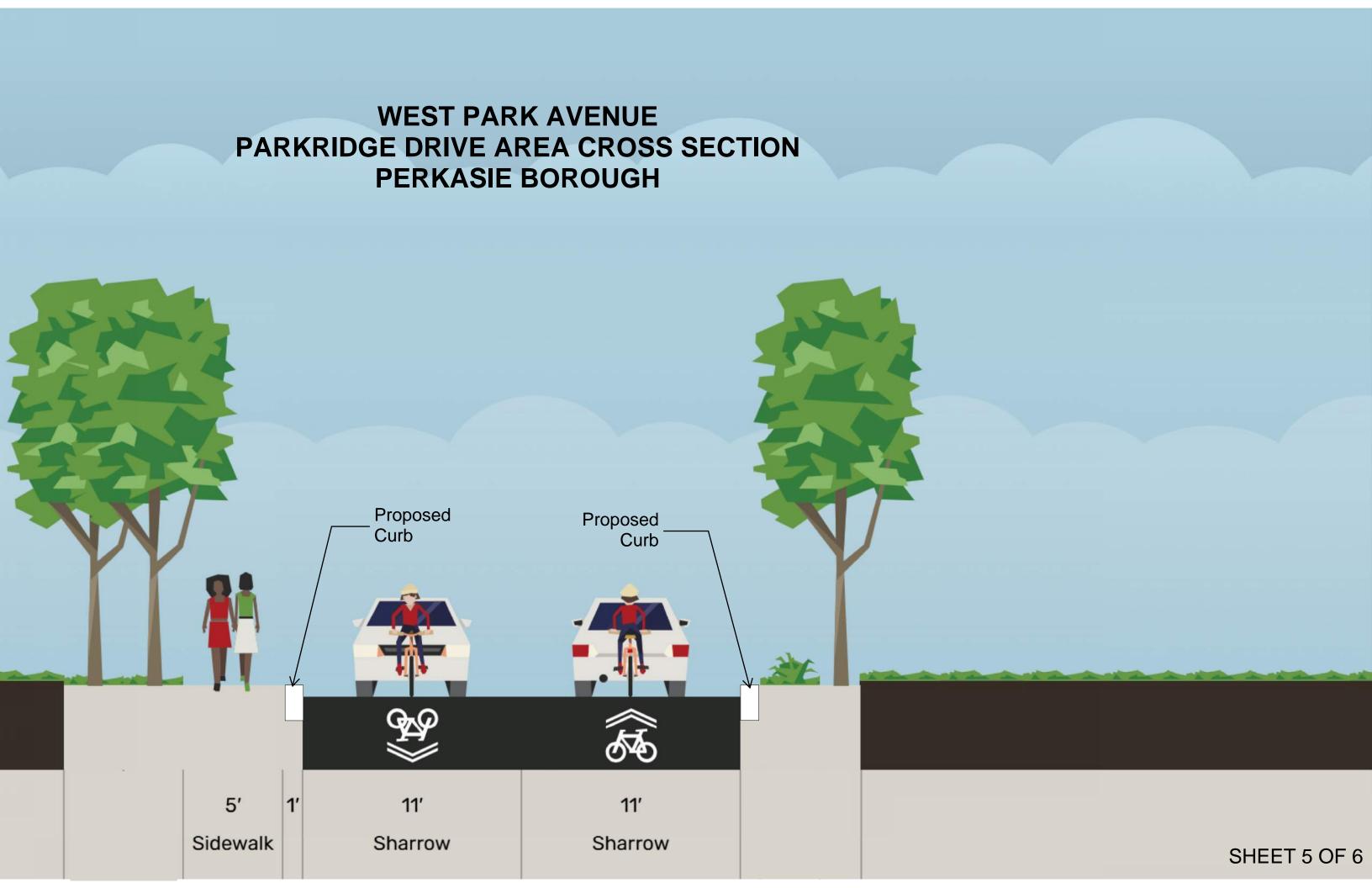
- Residents in the Park Ridge Development along the existing basin expressed concern related to the appearance/ maintenance of the existing basin.
 - They noted that in addition to the overgrown vegetation, garbage can also be seen in the basin. I informed him that the appearance and maintenance issues are the reason behind the Borough switching the existing basin to an underground system which will allow the Borough to maintain the grass slope and create and improve the appearance of the open space.
 - Another resident expressed concerns about erosion of the existing grade behind her house near the basin. I informed her that moving the basin underground and smoothing the slope behind these homes would help address this issue.
- It was also discussed that the project may need to be phased based on funding and that the
 roadway improvements and sidewalk would be the top priority and the basin improvements
 would be secondary as the budget allows. The Borough would maintain ownership and
 maintenance responsibilities for the new sidewalk along Park Ave and the open space over
 the basin.
- Residents also agreed that the current basin does not function properly. It is not clear if it is
 an issue with the outlet structure grate being blocked by debris/ vegetation, the size of the
 outlet pipe or downstream pipe capacity/ issues. Since the stormwater improvements will be
 combined with the flow into the basin in the existing system along Park Avenue, further
 investigation on the existing pipe networks and discharge point will be necessary.
 Emergency overflow for the basin should also be considered.
- The resident at 256 Park Ridge Drive noted that the inlet in the grass area adjacent to his
 home is filled with debris and has excessive vegetation growth around it which is impacting
 its ability to function and asked that it be maintained.
- One resident stated a manhole cover along the lower section of Park Ave (through town) is too low and holds water which freezes over during the winter.



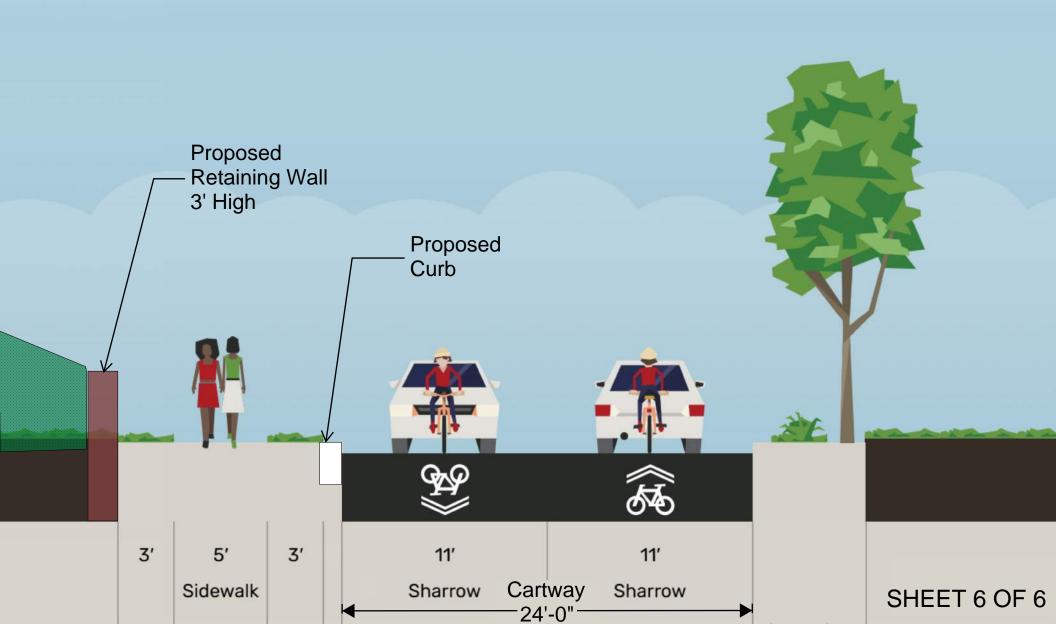


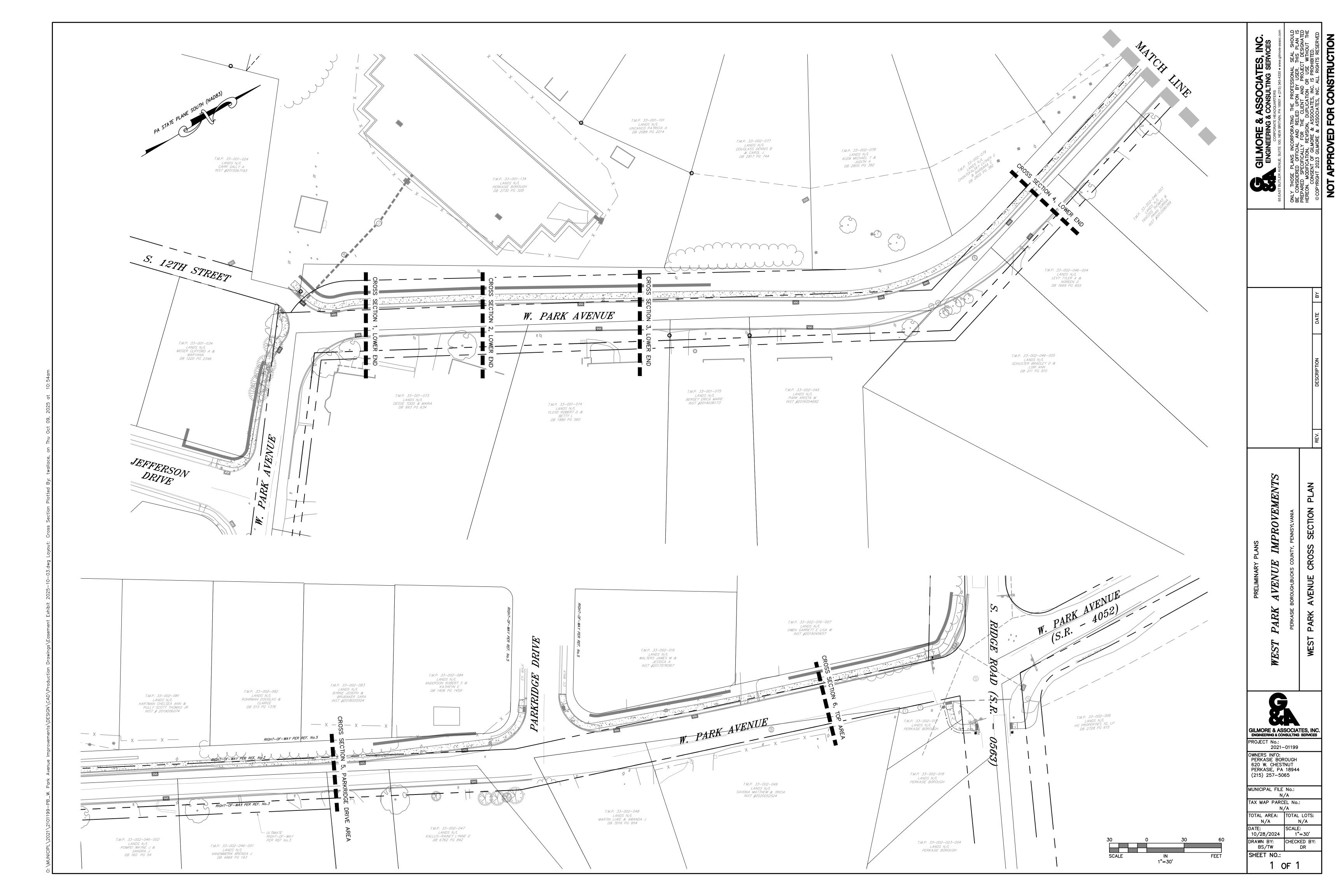






WEST PARK AVENUE TOP AREA CROSS SECTION PERKASIE BOROUGH

PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT September 2025

RECREATION

- Outdoor Zumba ended on 9/29. Zumba moves indoors to the Perkasie Fire Department in October and continues indoors through the end of the year.
- First in-house Parent's Night Out program ran on 9/12 with 7 participants. Children ages 5-9 can register for an evening of crafts, games, and pizza while parents can enjoy a night out. This program runs once a month on Friday evenings.
- Fall Community Yard Sale was held on Saturday, 9/13 alongside the Perkasie Farmers Market. Over 10 sellers
 were registered, and more were interested but due to new safety measures in place with hard road closures
 space is limited.
- Multi-Sport Sundays started its fall session on Sunday, 9/14. Program runs weekly through the end of October. All age groups are running and the 3-4.5 age group has the highest enrollment numbers.
- New School's Out Day Camp ran on Tuesday, 9/23. Based upon enrollment from summer camps we partnered with the same contractor to offer a new Pokémon Engineering with Legos day camp during a Pennridge School District no school day. Enrollment maxed out at 14.
- Organized and scheduled new fall theater programs with local theater company. New programs include fall creative drama youth class, Halloween makeup workshop, and adult improv 6-week program.
- Finalizing last of 2025 programs and started coordinating winter 2026 programs and ideas.

Included in the Council Packet for the meeting on October 20th, 2025, is a draft Resolution formally requesting funding of \$435,503.25 from the Local Share Account grant program to purchase a 2026 Freightliner 108SD Plus, up fitted with a SL330 Swap Loader, a Fink Box Spreader, a Dinkmar One Man Single Axle Hook Lift Leaf Vac, and a Falls Power Reversible E-2 Model PR1043 Plow. The truck is intended to replace the Borough's 2012 International WorkStar dump truck, which is nearing the end of its life, and is limited in use to leaf collection and winter plowing & salt spreading.

The new multi-purpose Freightliner truck will be up fitted with a hook attachment, making it a multi-putpose vehicle. The new truck can be used for leaf collection, snow plowing and salt spreading and — with the purchase of new compatible containers for use at the Recycling Center, for the hauling and disposal of comingled recycling and yard waste.

The new system has numerous benefits for the sustainability, safety and efficiency of Public Works operations:

- The leaf vacuum requires one man to operate the leaf vacuum (instead of three) from the cab (instead of manual operation of the hose curbside), significantly reducing staff time and salary costs and addressing safety issues. Staff time saved is projected to be 591 man hours per year.
- The new spreader will distribute and direct salt distribution evenly and with more precision, reducing safety hazards for drivers, and the amount of sodium chloride washed into the stormwater system.
- Owning truck-compatible containers for the collection of comingled recycling and yard waste at the Recycling Center reduces our dependence on 3rd party haulers and will eliminate lease fees and hauling fees for these materials. Savings are projected at almost \$167,484 over the next 5 years.
- The new containers for comingled materials are covered, meaning that residents will dispose of
 recyclables through a chute from ground level, enhancing safety for Center users (DVIT has noted safety
 concerns with residents using metal steps to load the existing open top containers). Staff also project that
 the covered containers will help reduce the number of non-recyclable items, thereby cleaning the stream
 and reducing disposal costs.
- Using the truck to haul recyclables extends its use to 12 months of the year, the current truck is only used from October through March.

Project Description – Perkasie Borough Event Safety Barricade Program

A 2019 report from the Counter Extremism Project found that in the prior decade there had been at least 62 vehicle-ramming attacks in cities across the world with 240 people killed and more than 1000 injured. These numbers have only continued to grow since that time and do not reflect the number of people hurt by vehicles due to careless driving and medical emergencies. The recent attacks in New Orleans, New York City, Waukesha, and Charlottesville have highlighted a need for preventative methods to address the dangers posed by vehicles to pedestrians in jurisdictions all around the country. In considering this new type of threat, Perkasie Borough has come to the realization that more effective methods of prevention are necessary to ensure lasting safety and security at public events and functions that have become an integral part of our social and economic development. Examples of large-scale annual events that require significant levels of security include the Annual Christmas Tree Lighting with approximately 9000 attendees, Fall Festival with 3,000 attendees, the Cars Under the Stars show with 4,000 attendees, and the Celtic Festival with 3,000 attendees. There are other events held by the borough and third-party organizers which include examples such as the Perkasie Fire Department Open House, Pennridge School District Homecoming Parade, the Indian Valley Soap Box Derby, The Ram Autism Fundraiser, weekly farmer's markets, and many more. Current trends indicate that there have been 37 non-borough events hosted this year with the potential for more events to occur during the holiday season. Perkasie Borough has made consistent efforts to promote itself as a center of family-friendly fun and community events in the Southeastern Pennsylvania region. While critical to the development of our region, these events

raise concerns for the possibility of bad actors to inflict harm which the borough seeks to address through these grant funds.

The event safety program will utilize the state-of-the-art MVB3X Modular Vehicle Barrier System developed by Advanced Security Technologies. Perkasie Borough will purchase two 72unit trailers which include enough coverage for 10 lanes of traffic each and totaling \$386,640. Also included in each trailer are 40 pivot units, 4 large storage boxes, and 4 packs of magnetic sequential lighting. The manufacturer also provides equipment training to staff at no additional charge. This training is important to ensure that each system is utilized properly to meet the standards set forth by the US Department of Homeland Security SAFETY Act. The systems will be operated by the Perkasie Borough Police Department which provides services for both Perkasie and Sellersville Boroughs. Due to the modular nature of the barrier systems, a wide variety of different road and event access closures can be made in addition to gate functions which allow emergency vehicles access to an event during an emergency situation. These systems will be deployed during all events requiring road closures or having direct access from roadways. Trained personnel at the police department will be required to plan for barrier deployment as part of each events operations plan and will work with the planning authority to determine the appropriate number of barriers needed for the event as well as the placement of each barrier system. Following the conclusion of the event, barrier systems will be dismantled and placed into secure storage by the police department for future events. Utilizing the barriers in this comprehensive and preventative fashion will assist the police department in preventing acts of terror along with unintentional accidents from medical emergencies and other situations.

The Perkasie Borough Police Department has been serving the Perkasie Borough community since 1924 and expanded to include Sellersville Borough in January 2003. This combined area serves a population of approximately 14,000 residents and acts as a midway point between the major metropolitan areas of Philadelphia and the Lehigh Valley cities of Allentown, Bethlehem, and Easton. While the road barrier systems will be primarily utilized by the police department in Perkasie and Sellersville Boroughs, Perkasie Borough would also seek to establish a system of temporary loaning of equipment to surrounding jurisdictions if awarded the grant funds. One of the defining features of what is known as the "Upper Bucks" region encompassing Perkasie Borough is the lack of access to financial support, high staffing levels, and other resources which are dedicated to jurisdictions of higher population density in other areas of the county. As a result, the rural communities of Upper Bucks often work together to create alliances to promote safety and economic development across local jurisdictions. By creating a system to share the barrier systems, Perkasie Borough hopes to increase the event safety of the surrounding jurisdictions which helps to promote economic development and safety of our borough at the same time.

As stated previously, the borough has made significant efforts over the past decade to establish itself as a hub of family friendly community events and fun for all ages. Alongside this push for new and exciting community events has come a strong increase in economic development for the borough and its residents. The local area is seeing a large increase in residential and commercial building projects and creating a strong sense of community has been critical to ensuring that this progress, as well as the broader identity of small-town Perkasie, is not lost. One thing that makes our events so popular is the sense of safety that

events would cause many years of fear which would result in a downturn in attendance that simultaneously leads to a lack of economic development. By taking a proactive stance towards event safety, the borough seeks to continue our trend of building upon the strong sense of community to establish further economic development not just for our borough, but also the surrounding Upper Bucks area. The use of barrier systems also creates positive economic development by limiting the amount of police officers and other safety personnel and vehicles that are needed to attempt to secure community events. By utilizing the trailer systems, we will be able to provide a much more effective safety solution at a much lower per-hour cost. These savings will allow for the approval of more community events as well as the expansion of existing events to new areas. As a result, we expect to see significant positive impact felt by both the community and the local economy.

If awarded, Perkasie Borough will develop appropriate use policies and guidelines within 15 days of funding. The purchase of two MVB3X trailer systems will occur within 30 days of funding. Borough staff will then coordinate with the manufacturing company to secure appropriate equipment training within 90 days of purchase. Following the receipt of the barrier systems, the police department will implement the use of the barriers at the first applicable event and will conduct regular reviews to adjust usage and ensure the most effective planning and implementation strategies. Quarterly checks will be completed to ensure that all equipment is operational and the borough seeks to continue the event safety program throughout the entire operational cycle of the MVB3X barrier systems.

Within the last decade there has been a significant increase in the prevalence of acts of terror involving vehicles. The 2025 New Orleans Truck attack, 2017 New York City bike path attack, 2021 Waukesha Christmas parade attack, and the 2017 Charlottesville car attack are all strong examples of how dangerous a regular vehicle can become in the hands of someone who intends to harm others. The rise of this method of violence can be directly contributed to the ease of access to vehicles by everyday residents within the United States. Other factors include the rise of mental health struggles, political turmoil, and economic distress. Vehicle based acts of terror are a direct threat to the physical safety of residents while also indirectly leading to a reduction of economic activity from fear of harm at large public events that are often targets of violence. Preventative methods are critical to ensuring the physical and economic well-being of Perkasie and Sellersville Boroughs residents.

How do you plan to accomplish it? Required Field

The borough will utilize Hostile Vehicle Mitigation strategies to decrease the amount of borough vehicles and staff required to block and maintain safe roads during outside events. In addition, the borough seeks to improve attendance at events by creating a safer and more controlled environment. With quick deployment of the MVB3X system, the borough seeks to create and permit more events to further economic development and build upon the sense of community in our region. The borough expects to see a 10% increase in the number of events in the year following implementation of this program. All police officers will receive training in the utilization of the barrier system and the system will also be deployed to neighboring localities when appropriate to further promote muti-jurisdiction safety initiatives.

How do you plan to use the funds? Required Field

If funded, the Event Safety Barricade Program will purchase two trailers of 72 MVB3X Modular Vehicle Barriers (\$193,320 per unit for a total of \$386,640). Each trailer contains 72 barrier units, 40 pivot units, 4 large storage boxes, and 4 packs of magnetic sequential lighting. This purchase will also include equipment training from the manufacturer at no additional charge. Vehicle barriers will be utilized for all applicable borough and community events that require

road closures for safety purposes. The barriers will be placed on each closed roadway and access point to provide comprehensive protection to pedestrians in attendance of an event. The police department will also have access to the barriers for any emergency response necessities that arise during law enforcement duties. The barriers will also be available for loan to local jurisdictions to increase cross-region safety efforts and promote cohesive safety responses.

Projected Schedule and Key Milestones and Dates

We appreciate your agency's positive interest in utilizing our certified system in protecting your events.



A. <u>Performance Based Specifications</u>:

LAND LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT OF LEASE ("Lease") is made as of the _____ day of _____, 2025, between THE BOROUGH OF PERKASIE, a municipal corporation, with an address of 620 West Chestnut Street, Perkasie, PA 18944, ("Borough" or "Landlord"), and the COUNTY OF BUCKS, a County of the Second Class A with an address of 55 East Court Street, Doylestown, PA 18901 ("County" or "Tenant"), collectively, the "Parties."

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Borough owns, possesses, and has title to a certain tract of land within Perkasie Borough known as Menlo Park and identified as Bucks County Tax Map Parcel ("TMP") #33-004-092. The parcel is 44.321 acres and contains a park, swimming pool, and other recreational areas.

WHEREAS, in 1987, the Pierce Library Association, Inc. ("PLA") became a tenant on the Menlo Park parcel leasing approximately 32,420 square feet to build an 8,000 square foot public library. The County partnered with PLA through a separate agreement and the library became part of the Bucks County Free Library System ("BCFLS") when it was finished in 1988. The lease between the Borough and PLA expires on June 30, 2027. The library is now fully incorporated into the BCFLS practices and procedures. Upon execution of this lease, the leased premises will be subleased to the BCFLS.

WHEREAS, Landlord hereby leases to Tenant, and Tenant hereby desires to lease from Landlord, the same approximate 32,420 square feet, consisting of certain real property with improvements known as the Samuel Pierce Branch of the BCFLS, located in Perkasie Borough, Bucks County, Pennsylvania, within TMP # 33-004-092 as indicated on Exhibit A (the "Leased Premises").

NOW, THEREFORE, the undersigned, intending to be legally bound hereby, agree as follows:

1. <u>LEASED PREMISES.</u>

- a. The Landlord hereby agrees to lease, and the Tenant hereby desires to lease from Landlord, the Leased Premises for use by Tenant and the residents of the County and Borough. The Leased Premises consist of the library building, the adjoining parking lot, and the yard surrounding the library. The Tenant understands that it may not restrict the use of the parking lot by the residents and guests of the rental property owned by the Borough located adjacent to the library.
- b. Excluded from the Leased Premises are all portions of TMP # 33-004-092 not identified in Exhibit A, including the borough owned rental property located adjacent to the library.

- 2. **TERM.** The term of the Lease shall be for a period of forty (40) years (the "Term") commencing on _______, 2025 (the "Lease Commencement Date") and ending on _______, 2065 (the "Lease Expiration Date"). The term shall automatically renew year to year until either party provides notice of termination at least 365 days prior. The prior lease between the Borough and PLA due to expire on June 30, 2027, is terminated immediately upon this lease being fully executed.
- 3. **TERMINATION**: If the Tenant shall not comply with the terms set forth herein for a period of 90 days after written notice from the Landlord, or its Solicitor, the Landlord may, without further notice to the Tenant, terminate this Lease and take possession of the Leased Premises. The Landlord shall have the right to exercise any and all other remedies available to it at law or in equity. The Tenant may terminate the lease at any time after providing the Landlord 180 days' notice.
- 4. **RENT.** The rent shall be \$1.00 per year.
- 5. **GENERAL USE.** It is understood and agreed that the Leased Premises is to be used for the operation of a library. The Leased Premises will be open to the public under the same terms and conditions generally applicable to the other libraries in the BCFLS. The Tenant agrees to make the meeting rooms in the library available on reasonable terms and conditions to community groups and organizations on the same basis as meeting rooms in other libraries with the BCFLS are made available. The Tenant shall pay all costs of operating the library without any assistance from the Landlord.
- 6. <u>ALTERATIONS AND MINOR IMPROVEMENTS.</u> Tenant is not restricted from making alterations, repairs, or minor improvements to the Leased Premises. These alterations are normally cosmetic changes or routine repairs and maintenance.
- 7. **CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS**. Capital improvements are defined as
 - a. substantially adding to the value of the real property, or appreciably prolonging the useful life of the real property;
 - b. becoming part of the real property or is permanently affixed to the real property so that removal would cause material damage to the property or article itself; and
 - c. are intended to become a permanent installation.

Any proposed capital improvement shall have Landlord's prior written permission. All costs for capital improvements shall be borne by the County.

8. MAINTENANCE. Maintenance of the Leased Premises shall be Tenant's sole responsibility and Tenant shall bear all expenses and risk thereof. This maintenance includes but is not limited to grass mowing, landscaping, security lighting, sidewalk maintenance, snow plowing, and trash removal. After consulting with Landlord, the Tenant will perform all tree maintenance and removal on the Leased Premises. The Tenant will follow all Borough ordinance requirements regarding snow removal and property maintenance. Any maintenance work performed by the Borough may be billed to the

- Tenant for the reasonable costs of the work, provided the Borough allow the Tenant a minimum of 30 days to complete the necessary work.
- 9. <u>UTILITIES.</u> To the extent any utilities are consumed by Tenant on the Leased Premises, such cost of the same shall be billed to the Tenant.
- 10. **ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLEASING.** Tenants may sublease to the BCFLS and no other person. No other assignment or sublease is permitted.
- 11. NO HOLDOVER. Tenant further covenants that it will peacefully and quietly vacate and surrender the Leased Premises to Landlord at the expiration of the Term hereof, or at any earlier termination thereof, and that it will not hold over beyond such expiration or earlier termination. If Tenant remains in possession of the Leased Premises after the expiration of the Term without execution of a new lease, it shall be deemed to be occupying the Leased Premises as a Tenant from year-to-year, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and obligations of this Lease. In the event Tenant is "holding over" pursuant to the provisions of this paragraph, such holding over shall continue Tenant's obligations hereunder.
- 12. COVENANT TO COMPLY WITH GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES. At Tenant's sole cost and expense, Tenant agrees to comply with all ordinances, rules, regulations, codes, and laws of all Federal, State, or local government and/or public authorities or regulatory bodies and officers enforcing said laws, having jurisdiction over the Leased Premises and to the use to be made of Leased Premises by Tenant. Without limiting the foregoing, Tenant shall promptly cure all violations of law for which Tenant has received notice or a public notice of violation has been issued, and pay all fines, penalties, interest, or other costs imposed by any governmental authorities in connection with any violation or requirement of any law.
- 13. **TENANT'S COVENANTS.** Tenant covenants and agrees that it will, without demand:
 - a. keep and maintain the Leased Premises in good order;
 - b. use every reasonable precaution against casualty;
 - c. will include information regarding this library's operations and patronage during the regular scheduled board meeting of the BCFLS;
 - d. permit the Landlord to enter the Leased Premises at reasonable times for the purpose of inspecting the Leased Premises; and
 - e. give to Landlord prompt written notice of any damage occurring to the Leased Premises.
- 14. **LANDLORD'S REPRESENTATIONS.** Landlord represents and warrants that:
 - a. Landlord has fee simple title to the Leased Premises;

- b. the individuals executing this Lease on behalf of Landlord are duly authorized to execute and deliver this Lease on behalf of Landlord, and all necessary action to authorize the execution and delivery of this Lease by Landlord has been properly taken;
- c. to Landlord's knowledge, Landlord has not received written notice from any governmental authority of any violations of a Federal, State, County, or Municipal law, code ordinance, order, regulation, rule, or requirements relating to the Leased Premises including, but not limited to, those relating to zoning, subdivision, environmental, building, fire and health, which violations have not previously been cured or remedied or which notice has not previously been withdrawn; and
- d. to Landlord's knowledge, there is no pending litigation affecting the Leased Premises which would have any material adverse effect on this Lease or the Leased Premises.
- 15. **NO IMPAIRMENT OF LANDLORD'S TITLE.** Tenant shall not permit the Leased Premises to be used by any person at any time or times during the Term of this Lease in such a manner as would impair Landlord's title to or interest in the Leased Premises or in such a manner as would cause a claim or claims of adverse possession, adverse use, prescription, or other similar claims of, in, to, or with respect to the Leased Premises.

16. INSURANCE.

- a. Tenant shall provide at its sole cost and expense, and shall keep in force during the Term of this Lease, public liability insurance covering the Leased Premises in the amount of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) or in such other reasonable amount as may be required by Landlord. Landlord shall be named as an additional insured under the Tenant's public liability insurance policy.
- b. Tenant shall provide at its sole cost and expense, and shall keep in force during the Term of this Lease, property damage insurance covering the Leased Premises in the amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) or in such other reasonable amount as may be required by Landlord. Landlord shall be named as an additional insured under the Tenant's property insurance.
- c. All insurance required to be maintained herein shall be issued by a reputable company authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and shall be effective prior to Tenant taking possession of the Leased Premises. Such insurance may not be cancelled without thirty (30) days prior written notice to Landlord.
- d. All insurance policies named herein shall expressly waive any right on the part of the insurer against the other. As to any loss or damage that may occur upon the property of a party hereto and be covered (or required by the terms of this Lease to

- be covered) under any insurance policy, such party hereby releases the other from any amount of liability for such loss or damage.
- e. Tenant agrees to increase the amount of insurance coverage on the leased premises every five years as required by Landlord. The increase shall be determined by utilizing the Consumer Price Index (CPI-U) for the Philadelphia area which specifically tracks costs for wage earners. The amount of additional insurance required should not exceed 7% per year.
- 17. **ESTOPPEL.** Each party agrees at any time and from time to time, not later than thirty (30) days following written request by the other party, to execute, acknowledge and deliver to the requesting party a statement in writing direct to such party as is directed by the requesting party certifying that: (i) this Lease is unmodified and is in full force and effect (or if there have been modifications, that the same is in full force and effect as modified, and stating the modifications); (ii) that there have been no defaults thereunder by the requesting party (or if there have been defaults, setting forth the nature thereof); (iii) the date to which the Rent and other charges have been paid, in advance, if any; (iv) the amount of Rent and other charges then being paid pursuant to the terms hereof; and (v) such other matters with respect to this Lease as may be reasonably requested by the requesting party. It is intended that any such statement delivered pursuant to this paragraph may be relied upon by any prospective purchaser or mortgagee of all or any portion of Landlord's interest herein, or mortgagee of all or any portion of Tenant's interest herein.

18. DEFAULTS; REMEDIES.

- a. The occurrence of any one or more of the following events shall constitute a material default and breach of this Lease by Tenant (an "Event of Default"):
 - i. The failure by Tenant, or its Subtenant, to observe or perform any of the covenants, responsibilities, conditions, or provisions of this Lease to be observed or performed by Tenant, other than as described above, where such failure shall continue for a period of thirty (30) days after written notice thereof from Landlord to Tenant, provided, however, that if the nature of Tenant's default is such that more than thirty (30) days are reasonably required for its cure, then Tenant shall not be deemed to be in default if Tenant commenced such cure within said 30-day period and thereafter diligently prosecutes such cure to completion.
 - ii. (A) the making by Tenant of any general arrangement or assignment for the benefit of creditors; (B) Tenant becomes a "debtor" as defined in 11 U.S.C. § 101 or any successor statute thereto (unless, in the case of a petition filed against Tenant, the same is dismissed within sixty (60) days); (C) the appointment of a trustee or receiver to take possession of substantially all of Tenant's assets located at the Leased Premises or of Tenant's interest in this Lease, where possession is not restored to Tenant within sixty (60) days; or (D) the attachment, execution, or other judicial seizure of substantially

- all of Tenant's assets located at the Leased Premises or of Tenant's interest in this Lease, where such seizure is not discharged within sixty (60) days.
- b. In any such Event of Default or breach by Tenant, Landlord may at any time thereafter, subject to any applicable notice or cure periods, and without limiting Landlord in the exercise of any other right or remedy which Landlord may have by reason of such default or breach, take any one or more of the following actions, each and all of which shall be deemed effective, cumulative, and non-exclusive:
 - i. Terminate Tenant's right to possession of the Leased Premises by any lawful means, in which case this Lease shall terminate and Tenant shall immediately and peaceable surrender possession of the Leased Premises to Landlord. In such event Landlord shall be entitled to recover from Tenant damages incurred by Landlord by reason of Tenant's default which shall be limited to the cost of recovering possession of the Leased Premises, necessary but reasonable renovation of the Leased Premises, actual attorneys' fees, and an amount equivalent to the unpaid rent for the balance of the Term, not to exceed six (6) months, and any other amounts payable by Tenant under this Lease, but less any amounts actually received by Landlord from a replacement Tenant.
 - ii. Maintain Tenant's right to possession, in which case this Lease shall continue in effect whether Tenant shall have abandoned the Leased Premises. In such event Landlord shall be entitled to enforce all of Landlord's rights and remedies under this Lease, including the right to recover the Rent and any other amounts payable by Tenant under this Lease as it becomes due hereunder.
 - iii. Perform, on behalf of and at the expense of the Tenant, any obligation under this Lease that Tenant has failed to perform, the reasonable cost of which performance by Landlord shall be deemed Rent and shall be payable by Tenant to Landlord upon demand.
 - iv. Accelerate Rent and all other sums payable hereunder for the next six (6) months under the current Term, which shall immediately become due and payable as if by the terms of this Lease they were payable in advance, and may immediately proceed to distrain, collect, or bring action for said rents and other sums, as being in arrears.
- c. Any costs and expenses incurred by Landlord (including, without limitation, actual attorneys' fees) in enforcing any of its rights or remedies under this Lease shall be deemed to be Rent and shall be repaid to Landlord upon demand.
- 19. **INDEMNITY.** Tenant shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Landlord and its agents and employees from and against all liabilities, obligations, damages, penalties, claims, costs, charges, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, which may be imposed

upon or incurred by or asserted by any failure on the part of Tenant to perform or comply with any of the covenants, agreements, terms, provisions, conditions, or limitations contained in this Lease after applicable notice from Landlord and the right to cure as detailed herein.

- 20. <u>CONSTRUCTION OF LEASE</u>. Words of gender used in this Lease shall be held to include any other gender and words in the singular number shall be held to include the plural when the sense requires. The headings as to the contents of particular paragraphs herein are inserted for convenience only and are in no way to be construed as part of the Lease or as a limitation of the scope of the particular paragraphs to which they refer.
- 21. **WAIVER OF BREACH.** The waiver by the Landlord of any breach of any covenant of this Lease shall be limited to the particular instance and shall not operate nor be deemed to waive any future breaches of the same covenant or covenants nor any other covenant or covenants.
- 22. **SEVERABILITY.** It is the intent and understanding of all Parties that the covenants of this Lease are severable and, therefore, if any one or more covenants, agreements, or stipulations to be kept, performed, or observed by either or both of the Parties, be declared or adjudged void, invalid, or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, then it is mutually agreed that the remaining portions of this Lease shall remain in full force and effect and the initial provisions merely be severed.
- 23. <u>NOTICE</u>. All required notices required to be sent under this Lease shall be in writing and shall be sent by (i) USPS certified mail, return receipt requested; (ii) a nationally recognized overnight carrier; or (iii) by hand delivery, addressed as follows:

- 24. **RELATIONSHIP.** Nothing contained herein shall be deemed or construed by any person as creating a relationship of principal and agent or of partnership or of joint venture between Landlord and Tenant. It is understood and agreed that neither the method of computation of Rent, nor any other provision hereof, nor any act of the Parties hereunder, shall create a relationship between Landlord and Tenant other than that of Landlord and Tenant.
- 25. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Lease contains the entire agreement between the Parties hereto and no representation or statement herein contained shall vary or modify this Lease in any way. This Lease shall not be effective between the Parties until the execution thereof and the required delivery of any and all resolutions to the Landlord by the Tenant.

- 27. **RECORDING.** This Lease shall not be recorded and the recording of this Lease shall be considered an Event of Default.
- 28. **FORCE MAJEURE.** Landlord and Tenant shall be excused for the period of any delay in the performance of any obligations hereunder when prevented from so doing by cause or causes beyond their respective control, which shall include, without limitation, all strikes and other labor troubles, governmental restrictions and limitations, scarcity, unavailability or delays in obtaining fuel, services, labor or materials, global pandemics, global epidemics, war or other national emergency, civil commotions, accident, defective materials, fire damage or other casualty, adverse weather condition, or floods or other Acts of God. Tenant's obligation to pay Rent shall abate during any period of time in which the Leased Premises is unavailable for Tenant's use as a result of any of the causes outlined herein.
- 29. **EXCLUSIVITY.** Landlord shall not enter into any similar lease with another party for the Leased Premises, however, this shall not prohibit or restrict Landlord and Tenant from mutually agreeing to the use of the Leased Premises by an educational institution.
- 30. <u>COUNTERPARTS.</u> This Lease may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

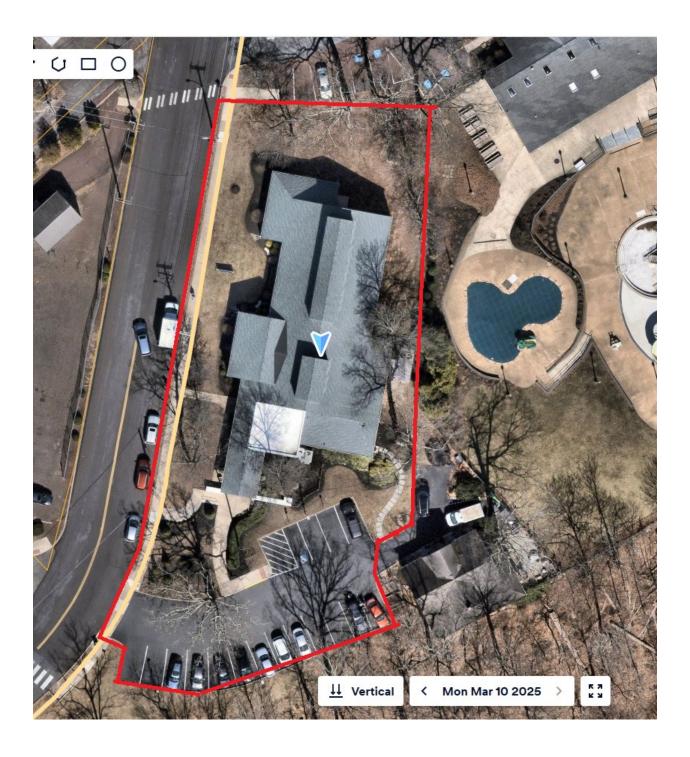

LEASE

THIS LEASE, made this 2 day of Novemben, 1987, by and between the BOROUGH OF PERKASIE, a municipal corporation organized under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, hereinafter referred to as the "Borough", and the Pierce Library Association, Inc., a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of Pennsylvania, hereinafter referred to as the "Corporation".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Borough owns, possesses, and has title to a certain tract of land within Perkasie Borough known as Menlo Park; and

WHEREAS, the Corporation desires to lease from the Borough approximately 32,420 square feet of land within the confines of the said Menlo Park, said leased land to be hereinafter referred to as the "Land" more particulary described in Exhibit "A", attached hereto and incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, the Corporation intends to construct on the Land an 8000 square foot library and adjacent parking facilities, collectively hereinafter referred to as the "Library".

NOW THEREFORE, the Borough and the Corporation, in consideration of the premises, rentals and covenants herein

contained and intending to be legally bound, do hereby agree as follows:

1. The Borough does hereby demise and let unto the Corporation the Land, as described above, being more particularly described on a certain plan prepared by Strothers Associates, Inc., bearing date the 4th day of September, 1987, being attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit "A", to have and to hold the same for a term of twenty-five (25) years beginning July 1, 1987, and ending June 30, 2012. Corporation, at its option may extend the term of this lease for a period of five years upon the expiration of the original term, and for additional periods of 5 year terms to a maximum term of 40 years, ending on

The Borough makes no warranty, express or implied, as to the condition of the leased premises.

2. The Corporation covenants with the Borough that the Corporation will use the Land solely for the construction and operation of the intended library which is intended to be leased to the County of Bucks and operated as part of Bucks County's system of free public libraries. The Library will be opened to the public on a non-profit basis under the terms and conditions generally applicable to the other libraries owned or managed by the County. In particular, the meeting room in the Library shall be available on reasonable terms and conditions, but free of charge, to Community groups and organizations. The Corporation

or its assignee or sublessee shall pay all costs of operating the library without any deduction from or credit against any rent or payment due hereunder.

- 3. The Corporation shall have the right to possess the Land during the term of this lease. The Borough shall have the right to enter upon the Land, and into the Library, when built, at reasonable times for the purpose of inspecting the Land and the Library.
- 4. The Corporation agrees to pay to the Borough the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) annually on the execution of this Lease and its anniversary date during the entire term, and any extensions of the term, of this Lease.

The Corporation also agrees to pay any additional rent which may be due under the terms hereof.

- 5. If any tax of whatever kind or nature is levied or assessed against the Borough in connection with the Land and/or the Library, its improvements and/or contents, the Corporation shall assume the payment of such tax as if it were primarily liable for the same and as additional rent under this Lease. The Corporation shall pay such tax directly to the proper taxing authority or pay or reimburse the amount thereof to the Borough if the Borough pays the tax.
- 6. The Corporation agrees to provide to the Borough on an annual basis a report of the operation of the Library, including the number of patrons, number of books and other items

circulated, hours of operation, major maintenance expenditures, staff and other operating costs. Such report may be prepared by Bucks County during its normal intended operation of the Library, and forwarded to the Borough.

- 7. Capital improvements to the Land or Library shall be undertaken by the Corporation, its sublessees or assignees, only with the prior written consent of the Borough. Any and all capital improvements, including, but not limited to, the construction of a Library building and parking facilities, whether undertaken by the Corporation or its assignees or sublessees, shall become a part of and inseparable from the land owned by the Borough.
- 8. The Corporation agrees at all times during the term of this Lease to maintain the Land, and any and all capital improvements constructed thereon, at its own expense, in a first class operating condition and to make all necessary repairs thereto, including but not limited to such capital improvements as may be required for the maintenance of the intended Library.
- 9. The Corporation agrees at all times during the terms of this Lease to maintain such insurance against loss or damage by fire or other casualty upon the capital improvements constructed thereon, as is customarily carried upon similar structures. All such insurance shall be for the benefit of the Borough and the Corporation as their respective interests may appear. The Corporation agrees that in the event of fire or

other casualty, it shall repair or remove the capital improvements constructed thereon, as it may decide, either of which shall be completed promptly and within a reasonable period. The Corporation also agrees at all times during the term of this Lease to maintain adequate public liability and property damage insurance, naming the Borough as coinsured.

The Corporation hereby releases the Borough, from any and all liability and assumes and agrees to pay all liabilities, costs, expenses and charges of any kind incurred by or imposed upon the Borough, and its agents, for injuries and damages to persons or property on the Land or any such capital or related directly constructed thereon, indirectly to the use and operation of the capital improvements constructed thereon for public purposes, whether resulting from the negligence of the Borough, and its agents, or otherwise, the Corporation shall pay all costs and expenses of the Borough its agents in defending against demands, claims and suits for such injuries and damage and shall indemnify and save harmless the Borough, and its agents, of and from any and all judgments, and other obligations in connection therewith. the release nor indemnity obligation contained in this shall arise if the liability, cost, expense, charge, judgment, award or other obligation is due directly or solely to willful misconduct of the Borough, or its agents. The public liability insurance covering the land or any capital improvements

constructed thereon shall name the Borough as an additional insured.

- term of this Lease it and/or its sublessees or assignees, will not create, or permit to be created, any mortgage, lien or encumbrance on all or any portion of the Land without the express prior written consent of the Corporation.
- 11. The Corporation agrees that it will at all times comply with all applicable requirements of the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and with all applicable lawful of any other agency, board or commission created under the laws of the Commonwealth or of any other duly constituted public authority with respect to the operation of the Leased premises for a public Library.
- 12. This Lease may be amended or supplemented only by a written instrument duly executed by the Borough and Corporation.
- assignees or sublessees shall be responsible for removing any and all ice and snow which may fall upon the sidewalks and parking facilities leased premises, described in Exhibit "A", attached hereto, subject to the Borough making the original arrangements with a snow and ice remover. The bill for such services shall be sent directly to the Corporation.

In additional thereto, the Corporation does hereby covenant that it, its assignees or sublessees shall maintain the landscaping, including trees, shrubbery and lawn, and any security lighting at its own cost and expense. The Borough may, at its own descretion, perform any required maintenance and charge the Corporation accordingly.

- 14. If the Corporation shall not comply with the terms set forth herein for a period of sixty (60) days after written notice from the Borough, or its Solicitor, the Borough may, without further notice to the Corporation, terminate this Lease and take possession of the Land, under and subject to any outstanding Lease agreement. The Borough shall have the right to exercise any and all other remedies available to it at law or in equity.
- 15. The term of this Lease may be extended by the corporation for additional periods of 3 years each, to a maximum total term of 40 years. If, ninety (90) days before the stated termination date of this Lease, the Corporation has not given notice to extend the Lease for an additional period of 5 years, this Lease shall automatically terminate on the then stated termination date. If the term of this Lease is extended or reextended, all references herein to the "term of this Lease" shall refer to such term, as extended or re-extended.
- 16. Upon the termination of this Lease under the provisions hereof, either by reason of default or upon expiration

of the term of this Lease, the Corporation agrees that it will deliver up peaceable possession of the Land, together with any capital improvements constructed thereon, without delay, upon demand therefore by the Borough, in good order and repair, reasonable wear and tear excepted, and without further notice which may now or hereafter be required by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Economic Development Plan Update

- Deliverables to date on the Borough's website: https://perkasieborough.org/departments/economiccommunity-development/
- Strategy phase so far: Conceptual Market Analysis & 3 draft transformational strategies were presented for feedback to the Steering Committee on 9/17/25, to the Perkasie Planning Commission on 9/24/25 and to wider and regional stakeholders on 10/8/25.
- Next steps are confirming strategic priorities and implementation planning.
- This project is partly funded with a DCED Keystone Communities Planning Grant of \$25,000.

Economic News

- Anticipating receipt of construction permit applications from WP Perkasie for the Starbucks building.
- The *Highly Mystical Creations* retail store at 21 N. 7th St held a successful soft opening during the Perkasie Fall Festival on 10/5, and has a grand opening and ribbon cutting scheduled in October.
- The Olde Towne Tanning Salon is under new ownership and is working on a U&O.
- Adrienne's Academy of Dance has received a Use Variance from the Zoning Hearing Board and is planning to open on the 2nd floor of the old Cigar Factory on 4th St.
- Received a U&O application from a small publishing/advertising company, also for the Cigar Factory on 4th St.
- Construction work continues at the "Glassworks" campus, owned by Kingdom Partners LLC. The campus will house a thrift store and office space.
- The "Pacaz" parcel the vacant area adjacent to the Landis Shopping Center and Mavis Tire is under agreement of sale. Sketch plans were presented to the Perkasie Planning Commission in August. SUBJECT: Perkasie Farmers Market / special events

Since Perkasie Borough assumed management of the Perkasie Farmers Market in 2015, staff and volunteers have worked diligently to grow the market into a thriving, community-centered event. Through consistent outreach, vendor support, and creative programming, the market now features 30–40 vendors each week and enjoys a strong, loyal customer base.

Over the years, the Borough has experimented with hosting additional special events alongside the market—such as the Pride celebration and Community Yard Sales—to attract new visitors and broaden the market's appeal. These events were successful in raising visibility and bringing new audiences to downtown Perkasie.

As the market has continued to expand, however, operating multiple events simultaneously has become increasingly complex. Running both the market and adjacent events requires additional road and parking lot closures, limits accessibility for vendors and shoppers, and necessitates extra staffing outside regular hours, increasing operational costs.

To ensure that the Farmers Market continues to thrive and that staff resources are directed toward enhancing vendor and visitor experience, I recommend that we focus our efforts on the market itself and reschedule or relocate special events to separate dates or locations. This approach will:

- Strengthen the Farmers Market as a consistent, high-quality weekly destination;
- Improve vendor logistics and visitor parking; and
- Reduce overtime and operational costs for Borough staff.

The attached proposed schedule of events for 2026 reflects this approach.

HISTORIC DISTRICT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and concluded this _______ day of _______, 2025, by and between the BOROUGH OF PERKASIE, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, located at 620 W. Chestnut Street, Perkasie, PA 18944 (hereinafter referred to as "PERKASIE"), and ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN & RESEARCH, LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE, ENGINEERING & ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES, D.P.C., a business entity located at 217 Montgomery Street, Suite 1100, Syracuse, NY 13202 (hereinafter referred to as "CONSULTANT").

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, PERKASIE issued a request for a proposal related to services associated with PERKASIE'S desire to establish a Historic District; and

WHEREAS, CONSULTANT submitted a response to the RFP issued by PERKASIE, which said response from CONSULTANT was accepted by the Perkasie Borough Council, at its public meeting held on Monday, October 6, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the RFP issued by PERKASIE and the response to the RFP submitted by the CONSULTANT are herein incorporated by referenced as though more fully set forth at length; and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto are desirous of memorializing the terms and conditions of the agreement between the parties that are herein set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, intending to be legally bound and for the good and valuable consideration, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. Scope of Work

CONSULTANT shall do, perform and carry out, in a satisfactory and proper manner, as determined by PERKASIE, the complete scope of work set forth in the document entitled "Request for Proposal for Perkasie National Historic Preservation District Nomination", prepared for PERKASIE, and in the proposal entitled "Request for Proposal 2025-01, Perkasie National Historic Preservation District Nomination, prepared by CONSULTANT, dated September 23, 2025. The scope of work shall include, but shall not be limited to:

- Work with the Borough to address the outstanding questions posed by SHPO staff
- The Borough has prepared a preliminary inventory that identifies each property in the proposed district by property number, address and basic

building materials, type and design. The consultant will work with the Borough to finalize the resource inventory.

- Partake in public outreach and up to two in-person hearings about the district.
- Complete all portions of the nomination form, with input from the Borough Council's Historical Committee to be approved by the Borough Council before submission.
- Address any comments and concerns from the SHPO after its review of the nomination
- Consult with SHPO staff on the nomination's presentation to the state's Historic Preservation Board.
- Address any comments and concerns from the Historic Preservation Board after its consideration of the nomination, as well as comments from the Department of the Interior

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2. Time of Performance

The services of the CONSULTANT are to commence on or about November 1, 2025, and shall be undertaken and completed in such sequence as to assure their expeditious completion in the light of the purposes of this Agreement; but in any event the nomination shall be completed within ninety (90) consecutive days from the date of this Agreement, unless both parties agree to extend the deadline. The CONSULTANT shall address comments and concerns from the SHPO in a reasonable time to allow the Borough to present the nomination to the Historic Preservation Board.

3. Compensation

For the scope of work described in clause (1) PERKASIE shall pay the CONSULTANT all allowable and allocable costs that are incurred in the performance of this Agreement up to a cost ceiling of Fourteen Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty (\$14,960.00) Dollars, which will not be exceeded without formality amending the Agreement. Costs will be based on the attached rate schedule. Invoices will be paid within thirty (30) days of submission, assuming the submission is in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

4. Method of Payment

Invoices will be submitted on a monthly basis as work progresses. PERKASIE will withhold ten (10%) percent of each CONSULTANT invoice until such time as PERKASIE approves the CONSULTANT'S final work product.

5. Services Provided by PERKASIE

PERKASIE intends to assist CONSULTANT in the performance of its duties rather than direct and supervise the CONSULTANT'S work. PERKASIE'S primary contact for the CONSULTANT work shall be the Borough Manager. PERKASIE will also do its best to provide all relevant documents.

6. Compliance with Local Laws

CONSULTANT shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, and codes of the state and local governments, and shall commit no trespass on any public or private property in performing any contract work.

7. Termination

a. <u>Termination of Agreement for Cause</u> – If, through any cause, CONSULTANT shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner, its obligations under this Agreement, or if the CONSULTANT shall violate any of the covenants, agreements, or stipulations of this Agreement, PERKASIE shall thereupon have the right to termination this Agreement by giving written notice to the CONSULTANT of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof, at least five (5) days before the effective date of such termination. In such event, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies and reports prepared by the CONSULTANT under this Agreement shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed on such documents.

Notwithstanding the above, CONSULTANT shall not be relieved of liability to PERKASIE for damages sustained by PERKASIE by virtue of any breach of the Agreement by CONSULTANT, and PERKASIE may withhold any payments to the CONSULTANT for the purpose of setoff until such time as the exact amount of damages due PERKASIE from CONSULTANT is determined.

b. <u>Termination for Convenience of PERKASIE</u> – PERKASIE may terminate this Agreement at any time by a notice in writing from PERKASIE to CONSULTANT. If the Agreement is terminated by PERKASIE as provided herein, CONSULTANT will be paid an

amount which bears the same ratio to the total compensation as the services actually performed bears to the total services of the CONSULTANT covered by this Agreement, less payments of compensation previously made: provided, however, that if less than sixty (60%) percent of the services covered by this Agreement have been performed upon the effective date of such termination, CONSULTANT shall be reimbursed (in addition to the above payment) for that portion of the actual out-of-pocket expenses (not otherwise reimbursed under this Agreement) incurred by CONSULTANT during the Agreement period which is directly attributable to the uncompleted portion of the services covered by this Agreement. If this Agreement is terminated due to the fault of CONSULTANT, Section 1 hereof, relative to termination shall apply.

8. Changes

PERKASIE may, from time to time, request changes in the scope of the services of CONSULTANT to be performed hereunder. Such changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of the CONSULTANT'S compensation, which are mutually agreed upon by and between PERKASIE and CONSULTANT, shall be incorporated in written amendments to this Agreement.

9. Assignability

CONSULTANT shall not assign any interest in this Agreement and shall not transfer any interest in the same (whether by assignment or novation) without the prior written approval of PERKASIE; provided, however, that claims for money due or to become due the CONSULTANT from PERKASIE under this Agreement may be assigned to a bank, trust company, or other financial institution, or to a Trustee in Bankruptcy, without such approval. Notice of any such assignment or transfer shall be furnished promptly to PERKASIE.

10. Entire Agreement

The parties agree that the terms and conditions of this Agreement are the entire Agreement between the parties, to the extent that it relates to this Agreement, as well as the incorporated documents referenced previously.

11. Miscellaneous

The terms and provisions of this Agreement shall be subject to the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. To the extent any disputes occur between the parties hereto, the same shall be litigated in the Court of Common Pleas of Bucks County, Pennsylvania.

12. The parties hereto acknowledge and confirm that the persons executing this Agreement, on behalf of the parties, have authority to do so, and have received all authority from any governing body, or from the appropriate corporate office, as it relates to CONSULTANT, and therefore, both parties may rely upon the execution of this Agreement by an authorized representative of the other party.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, PERKASIE and CONSULTANT have executed this Agreement as of the date first written above.

Perkasie's fall leaf collection begins October 20

PERKASIE — Perkasie borough's annual fall leaf collection program will begin on October 20. Residents are encouraged to rake leaves to the curb for pick-up. In areas with no curb, residents should rake leaves to within 5' of the roadway edge. The borough is unable to collect leaves further from the edge, said a Perkasie borough press release.

The borough has advised residents that leaf piles should be free of rocks, large sticks and other debris which can damage the vacuum equipment. Residents should not block storm drains with leaf piles or park on top of the piles. There will be no call backs if the borough is unable to collect leaves because of parked cars.

Leaf collection will take place five days a week, weather permitting. The borough collects leaves according to the map on the Leaf Collection page of the borough's website at www.perkasieborough.org and will also provide a weekly update of where crews left off and where they'll be headed next on the same page, said the release.

The first few weeks in November are typically the peak time for leaf fall. The Public Works Department may not collect every leaf pile during these heaviest weeks and, as more leaves fall, the interval may lengthen to 10-12 days before crews return to your neighborhood. When the Department makes the final rounds in December, it will perform 'gutter wiping,' which includes vacuuming the majority of the leaf debris left behind from previous cleanups.

Leaf collection will continue until the Department needs to convert the trucks for winter road maintenance. The borough will run a leaf collection date in the spring 2026, said the release. Perkasie's leaves are transported to local DEP certified composting sites where they are turned into compost and mulch. Perkasie borough awards bids for South Perkasie Covered Bridge repairs

PERKASIE — The repairs to Perkasie's historical 1832 covered bridge have passed an important milestone as the borough has selected the firms that will rehabilitate the bridge's timber structure and abutments that were damaged by Hurricane Ida.

On September 22, contracts approved by Perkasie Borough Council were awarded to Eastern Highway Specialists Inc. of Wilmington, DE, for the timber structure and T. Schiefer Contractors, Inc. for the abutments. The awards are contingent upon Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) obligating final adjusted funds for the project. The contractors were selected in a competitive bidding process, said a Perkasie borough press release.

In recent years, Eastern Highway Specialists restored the Rapps Dam Covered Bridge, the Knox Covered Bridge in Valley Forge National Historic Park and the Speakman's Covered Bridge in Chester County as well as the Ashland Covered Bridge in Delaware. T. Schiefer Contractors, Inc. is a family-owned and operated construction business in Doylestown.

"The borough and our many project partners are looking forward to working with Eastern Highway Specialists and T. Schiefer Contractors in the efforts to rehabilitate the South Perkasie Covered Bridge in Lenape Park," said Scott Bomboy, chair of the Perkasie Borough Council history committee. "We are also grateful to FEMA and PEMA for working with us to make sure environmental and historical concerns are addressed today, so future generations will enjoy the bridge as a showpiece in our park system."

This year, Perkasie borough applied for a project change with FEMA to move the covered bridge about 50 feet away from its current location, taking the bridge from the FEMA regulatory floodway. The covered bridge also will be elevated by several feet and secured by tie-down fixtures.

The location change came after Perkasie's architectural and engineering consultant for the project, Wood Research & Development of Jefferson, OR, completed inspection reports and design plans, and the borough's engineers, Gilmore & Associates, Inc., evaluated FEMA flood maps for the bridge's current location, said the release.

Once FEMA completes the adjusted obligation process based on the proposed location change, construction is expected to begin in early Spring 2026.

The South Perkasie Covered Bridge rehabilitation project began in 2019 when the Perkasie Historical Society, Bucks County Covered Bridge Society and Perkasie Borough raised funds to repair a known issue with the bridge. The borough also received a Pennsylvania Historic Preservation Office grant for the project.

However, Hurricane Ida's remnants swept the bridge off its abutments in September 2021, and FEMA designated Perkasie borough as a recipient of FEMA and PEMA funds to return the bridge to its condition before the flood. The project's costs will be covered by funds from FEMA, PEMA, the Pennsylvania State Historic Office, and donations to the Perkasie Historical Society, as well as the society's funds.

The South Perkasie Covered Bridge is the oldest covered bridge in Bucks County and the seventh-oldest covered bridge in the United States. It was built in 1832 and moved by Perkasie's citizens in 1958 to save it from demolition by Bucks County. The bridge was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980, and it is a rare example of an early covered bridge using the original Town Lattice truss system, said the release.
